Fair Directors Start Plans For Next Year

The Oregon State Fair is over. It was a good fair. Next year it will be a better fair.

These were comments of Dr. Earl B. Stewart, chairman of the Oregon State Fair commission, Sunday as he and other commissioners met informally with Leo Spitzbart for a bit of recapitulation.

Plans for enlarging the pad-dock, for an improved water system and for better accommodations for fat beef livestock were being talked. A new rail around the race track was, in the commission's opinion, a must. "That flower and garden show we had was one of our best free entertainments. We want to improve conditions there, too," Dr. Stewart said as he remarked how "surprised" he was at the very big attraction this department proved to be.

"The 4-H and FFA were very happy with the new form of selling their fat livestock, too," Dr. Stewart continued. "May be some of the people who watch were a little disappointed at the lack of color, but the sealed bidding gave the buyers a better break and it kept the prices paid more in keeping with market—just a few cents over — so that the youngsters who are selling will get used to actual market selling. It makes for better business people. I'm sure the sales will be conducted that way again next year."

The complete revision of the midway this year, turning pitch-men toward the center rather than onto the walks and clearing the front of the Agricultural hall so that rest seats could be placed there, also proved successful, in the opinion of the chairman. The crowds were more easily handled, he believed.

Improvements noted as the fair closed will be taken up for further action at the December meeting of the fair, Dr. Stewart said.

Unaudited figures released Sunday showed that the total circus attendance this year was 29,850 as compared to the 1953 record attendance of 25,794. Revue attendance this year was 26,996, down a little from the 1953 attendance of 28,568. Races brought out 24,872 over the 1953 total of 21,378. The gate stood at \$35,340 compared to the 1953 figure of \$30,315.

Attendance at the circus brought in \$30,406; at the revue \$29,521 and the races \$11,061.
