WOODBURN — Agricultural and domestic exhibits will receive principle emphasis during the free 13th annual North Marion County Fair which opens Sept. 23 in Woodburn. The fair will last from 4 p.m. Thursday until 9:30 p.m. Saturday.

Something new featured this year will be pipe organ music in the floral department housed in the armory building. "Under the Harvest Moon" is this year's theme for the garden club booths. Also found in the armory will be the baked foods, textile and preserved foods division.

Specimens of grains, corn, grasses and vegetables will be displayed in the North Marion Fruit Co. warehouse where the Grange, Farmers Union and home extension exhibits will also be found. The various concessions and food booths will be located in both buildings.

**Kiddies to Parade**  
A high spot in the three-day celebration will be the kiddies' parade on Saturday. Found in the parade, entitled "Television Characters," will be costumed couples, decorated wagons, tricycles, doll buggies and bicycles, costumed boys and girls, clowns, horses and various other animals. Floats, both commercial and those done by high schools, will decorate the streets while several local bands provide music.

Three evenings of free amateur and professional entertainment have been provided, according to J. F. Lacey, fair board president. Opening night, Thursday, will be amateur night with Lyman Seely as master of ceremonies. Home talent may register with Ken Hagg at the Woodburn Music Store.

Two divisions for those under 12 have been provided for with cash prizes ranging from five to 15 dollars for first, second and third places. Friday evening's show will be presented by the "Journal Seniors" from Portland.

The final evening's entertainment will consist of professional vaudeville acts including Robert Enrico, clown and magician formerly with Ringling Bros. circus; Rex Story, comedy juggler; Stuart and Lee, musical novelty; Lemarettes, ladder act, and Cycling Vans, unicycle novelty.

Ribbons and cash prizes will be awarded in all the fair divisions except commercial where ribbons will be presented, said Lacey.

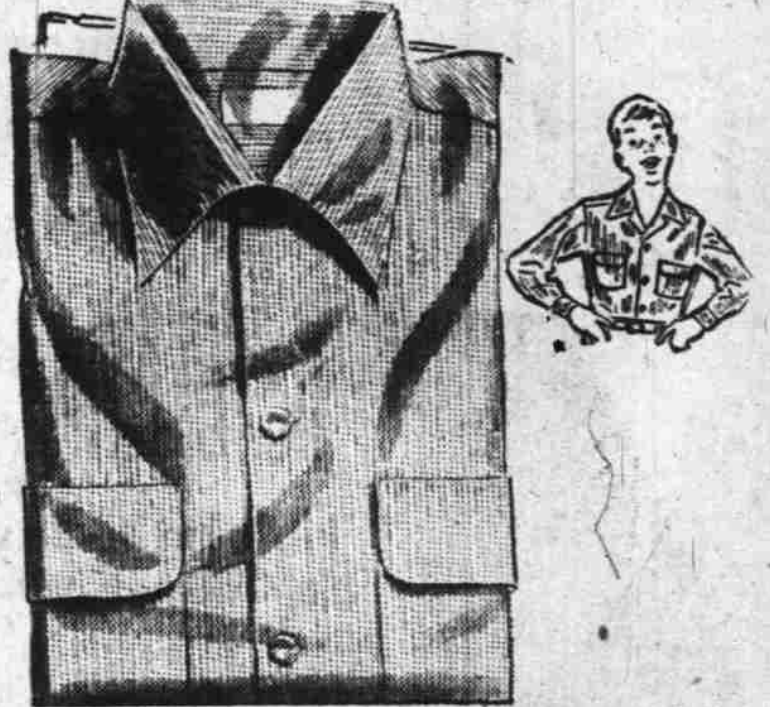
