## Shows Booked At Monmouth And Estacada

High school football jamborees take the early-week spotlight at two cities tonight when members of the Capitol and Willamette Valley Leagues convene for their annual touchdown parties.

The Capitol Leaguers-Serra High, Salem Academy, Philomath, Central Hi, Cascade Union, Stayton and Gervais-along with invited Jefferson of the Marion County B League will play off their "jam" on the Oregon College of Education field in Monmouth.

The Willamette Valley Leaguers-Dallas, Silverton, Woodburn, Mt. Angel, Molalla, Canby, Estacada and Sandy-go at it in their annual four-game spree on the Estacada High turf.

Both jamborees will be on a North vs. South scale, with aggregate scoring to determine the winning sides.

At Monmouth, Stayton, Serra, Salem Academy and Gervais will make up the North side. Stayton plays Central in the 7:30 o'clock game, Serra than faces Philomath, Salem Academy goes against Cascade and Gervais takes on Jefferson. Each game will be of two 10-minute quarters in length.

The jamboree will mark the opening action of the season for Coach Roger Dasch's Stayton Eagles. Sam Bell's Centrals have played two games thus far, breaking even in them. Serra opened last Friday night by topping Mt. Angel 27-18, as Coach Leo Grosjacques' Sabers tallied in every period. Salem Academy, coached by Bob Funk, lost a 12-0 opener to Taft last week. Both Gervais and Philomath got their respective schedules under way last week also, Jefferson appeared in the Marion County B League jamboree and Bob Stewart's Cascade Cougars opened with a 13-7 nod over Silverton.

Up at Estacada team captains will draw for opponents in the four games of 15 minutes duration each. The drawing will take place at 7:55 p. m. Teams making up the North will be Canby, Sandy, Estacada and Molalla, and the first of the four games will start at 8:15 p. m.

Most of the WVL teams will have seen regular game action tonight, winning one and losing one. Woodburn will be making its debut tonight, but all others have played in at least one clash.

A trophy is to be presented to the most outstanding rooting section in the Estacada jamboree, and the Estacada High band will serve up a musical concert prior to the games, as the teams are warming up.

## OSC to Field Vets In Starting Roles

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis—(Special)—Coach Kip Taylor's Oregon State Beavers launched a final week of preparation Monday for the opening Beavers game of the season here next Saturday that is expected to draw over 10,000—against the University of Idaho.

The Beavers were the only Pacific Coast conference squad that did not open last weekend. Idaho lost a 41-0 decision to the University of Oregon, one of the top pre-season favorites to play in the Rose Bowl next January.

Oregon State's offense, which had not measured up to the defense in earlier scrimmage sessions, blossomed in full bloom last Saturday as Taylor sent his charges through a final session under regular game conditions. The Blues whipped the Reds, 19-12, as Transfer Fullback Bob Sutton reeled off a pair of touchdowns.

Also scoring touchdowns were backs Tom Berry and Arlo Westrand, both transfers, and Larry Stevens, a linebacker for the regulars who intercepted a pass.

Barring injuries in practice this week, Taylor probably will start a lineup composed mainly of hold-over veterans from last season. That would include Laird Bratton and Wes Ediger, ends; John Hall and Howard Buettenbach, tackles; Jim Roberts and Bill Johnson, guards; Stevens, center; Jim Withrow, quarterback; Willie Kealoha, left half; Jack Peterson, right half, and Sutton, fullback.

Of that unit, Kealoha and Sutton are the only sophomores—all the others are experienced lettermen. Kealoha was one of the stars on last year's strong OSC freshman squad, while Sutton is a transfer from Valley JC of Los Angeles. All told, Oregon State has 31 sophomores on a 58-man squad.

Business Manager Jim Barrett has outlined many special events for opening day, starting off with a downtown parade in Corvallis. The Oregon City high school band will appear at that time, and again at halftime of the game. The 60-piece Corvallis high band will play at the game from the stands.

### Ex-Champ Learned to 'Play It Straight' From Horatio Alger

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Mention Horatio Alger's books along with fiction and you'll be greeted by a curled lip but add that Willie Ritchie always has lived up to the creed set forth in those yellowing pages and the smart boys are stopped.

Ritchie, as peppery today at 63 as he was when he won the world lightweight title in 1912 from Ad Wolgast, is rounding out his 20th year with the California State Athletic Commission. He has been the chief inspector in the northern district since 1952, when he returned to his home town after working in a similar capacity in the Los Angeles office.

He Read Horatio  
Willie has become one of the most highly-regarded officials in the boxing world. How did he avoid the booby-traps which have claimed many another champ?

"Because when I was 16 and 12 I used to go into the public library and read the Horatio Alger books—and the stories about Frank Merriwell," Ritchie answers without a trace of sarcasm. "I hardly could wait until the next books were published. I assimilated what they had to say about playing it straight and it stood me in good stead."

Ritchie, hard working and fast talking, is charged with seeing that the state's boxing and wrestling laws are carried out. He checks license applications assigns referees and wades through a pile of other paper work. A pair of dark, horned-rim glasses sit across his broad nose as he diligently makes notes as he meticulously answers the phone in his office.

But down in a bottom drawer of his desk lie numerous photographs of the Willie Ritchie most old fight fans remember—the short haired kid who dogged Ad Wolgast all over the United States in 1912 challenging him to put his title on the line.

Met for Title  
"I had defeated him in a newspaper decision earlier when he was recovering from appendicitis," Ritchie recalls. "When we finally met for the title in Daly City that year he was a lot stronger than I had expected."

Wolgast was ahead on points after ten rounds of the scheduled 20 round affair. But Ritchie knocked him down with a right cross in the 16th. Wolgast got up and hit Ritchie twice in the groin.

"I was so amazed I put my hands down there and stared at him," Ritchie said. "Then firecracker Jim Griffin, the referee, gave me the fight on a foul."

Ritchie lost the title to Freddie Welsh two years later in London but continued fighting until 1927. After that he did some promoting until hooking up with the athletic commission.

Cherberg said offense would be the byword this week in an effort to whip up an attack which would be effective against what he termed an extremely tough Michigan defense.

# Stanford to Meet Oregon . . .

# Taylor Considers Duck Game Toughest of Year

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Coach Chuck Taylor of Stanford said Monday his football team faces possibly its toughest game of the season when it meets the University of Oregon next Saturday night in Portland.

"Our scout reports indicate that Oregon is a very dangerous team," Taylor told the weekly meeting of the Northern California Football Writers Assn.

"It has a tremendous passing attack. In defeating Idaho 41-0 last week, Oregon threw the ball for a total gain of some 300 yards. The passers threw to eight different ends. The Northern school certainly is not undermanned in receivers."

"I was told that George Shaw, the No. 1 quarterback, looked terrific. Besides Shaw, Coach Len Casanova has three other quarterbacks who also can pitch. They tell me that Shaw may switch to a halfback position, which would add strength to the offense."

Stanford eked out a 13-12 win over College of the Pacific at Stockton last Friday night. Taylor uncovered a young quarterbacking sensation in John Brodie, a sophomore, who handled himself well in his first assignment.

Another sophomore who performed impressively was halfback Gordie Young. Taylor said both would definitely start against Oregon.

Returning to the Oregon outlook, Taylor said his scout reported that the Northern club had two fine linemen in right tackle Keith Tucker and center Ron Fleister.

"Tucker and Fleister may be the class of the coast," he added. Stanford, which in the past has stuck with a tight T formation, will use variations of the split T by spreading the line, the coach said. The team will leave by plane Friday morning.

Coach Lynn (Pappy) Waldorf of University of California, coming off a 13-7 defeat by Oklahoma in the nationally televised game of the week, said the contest with the Big Seven champion provided him with a good yardstick by which to measure the strength of his team.

"Our definite weakness was punting," Pappy explained. "We averaged only 28 yards a kick. Our defense was not too bad, but our blocking was weak."

"Oklahoma has one of the finest teams in the nation. You won't see a better end than Max Boydston. Their Kurt Burris, center and linebacker, was outstanding. Gene Calame is the best split T quarterback in the country."

dium is slightly over 86,000 while the Polo Grounds can seat 55,000. Neither the Indians, who clinched their pennant Saturday, nor the Giants were favored by the experts. In the American League, the Yankees, winners of five straight world championships, were the choices, while the Dodgers, under Walt Alston, a new manager, were expected to repeat.

Sal Maglie, the veteran ace of Manager Leo Durocher's pitching staff, administered the coup de grace to the Dodgers. At Ebbets Field before a crowd of 26,882, he never was in serious trouble, although the game was close for five innings.

The Giants scored twice in the first inning of Dodger pitcher Carl Erskine and Brooklyn tallied once in the third.

That's how matters stood until the sixth when the Giants scored two more runs to increase their lead. They tallied once more in the seventh and rounded out the scoring with two runs in the eighth.

The Indians, not letting up at all, won their 11th straight to match their longest streak of the season by downing the Chicago White Sox 7-4. Larry Doby and Vic Wertz helped make Bob Feller's job easy by hitting home runs.

The Washington Senators, still battling for fourth place, whipped the New York Yankees 3-2 in the ninth and the Boston Red Sox turned back the Philadelphia A's behind Tom Brewer 5-2.

The Detroit Tigers nipped Baltimore 4-3 in other American League action. Only a game separated Boston, Detroit and Washington in the battle for fourth place.

In the National League, Warren Spahn became the first lefthander in National League history to win 20 games in six separate seasons when his Milwaukee Braves stopped the Cincinnati Redlegs 6-2 in the first game of a doubleheader. The Reds took the second, 3-1.

The St. Louis Cardinals moved into fifth place by beating the Chicago Cubs 7-2 on a five-run assault in the tenth inning.
