ROBERTS—The annual Roberts Grange Community Fair will be held Saturday, Oct. 9, starting at noon. Prize money will total \$100 with Ermina Fisher, Marion County Home Extension agent, in charge of judging. She will have assistants for all classifications. Luncheon will be served all afternoon, and dinner will be served from 5-9 p.m. A "fish pond" will be a feature for children. Every one is invited to enter exhibits which must be in place by noon on the day of the fair.

### Rules Listed

All entries must be made or grown by the exhibitor. Vegetables will be judged for suitability for immediate consumption; fruit will be judged according to uniformity and quality.

Classifications include: One—All kinds of fruit and vegetables, five or more for judging.

Two—Cakes, sponge, angel food, butter, prepared mix and loaf.

Three—Cookies, oatmeal, ice-cream, brownies, chocolate chip.

Four—Textiles, pair of teal towels, pair of pillow slips; special contest for Grange members only, article made from one 100-pound flour sack.

Floral Section Five—Floral arrangements, living room, high; living room, low; coffee table; miniatures, less than three inches and up to six inches; best display of plants.

Six—Hobbies, displays from Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, 4-H Clubs, Brownies and Cub Scouts.

Seven—For juniors aged 18 and younger, largest squash, largest ear of corn, best plate of cookies, best individual vegetable exhibit.

Eight—Public interest displays (no judging).

## Albany Man In Philatelic Hall of Fame

ALBANY—Al Van Dahl, late founder and publisher of the Western Stamp Collector, has attained a place in the hall of fame of the American Philatelic Society. The honor was announced at the 68th annual convention of the society in San Francisco, William W. Wiley, editor of the stamp magazine, reported on his return from the meeting.

Van Dahl founded the Western Stamp Collector at Mill City May 7, 1931, but had moved his headquarters to Albany many years before his death early this year. Van Dahl is the 39th philatelist to have his picture placed in the hall of fame since the society was founded in 1886.

## Cascade Union High Opens With Record Class of 336

TURNER—Classwork began for 336 students Tuesday at Cascade Union High School which serves Aumsville, Turner and adjacent rural districts.

The total was 30 more than the opening day figure a year ago, reported L. J. Uhrhammer, administrative principal. He said the total was the highest first-day registration in the history of the school, although the figure rose to 360 during last term.

About 20 more students are expected to register soon, the principal said. He estimated the student body will rise to 380 during the year.

Tuesday's freshman class of 112 pupils also was the largest in the school's history, compared with 101 last year. There were 90 sophomores, 72 juniors and 62 seniors registered this week.

The school has added the equivalent of one and one-half instructors this term, bringing the total to 17 fulltime teachers plus the administrative staff.

New on the faculty are Ralph McKenzie, a freshman teacher; Geraldine Haner, English teacher; and Calvin Hersey, new basketball coach who will also teach political science.

Mrs. Neal did not suffer serious paralysis, and Mrs. Barclift received a throat affection which interfered with her swallowing. Mrs. Barclift was reported recovering satisfactorily, but no immediate report concerning the condition of Mrs. Neal was available.

Dr. Guepe said most of the attacks discovered this year have been among residents of the Albany area. He did not consider the total alarming.

Only ten of the 16 have developed paralysis, he noted.
