\$40,000 Bond Vote Scheduled By District 33C

SILVERTON—School District 33C (Evens Valley and McLaughlin) has posted notices for a district bond election on Oct. 8 from 2 to 8 p.m. at McLaughlin school. Amount to be voted is \$40,000 for the purpose of building a two-room school either on the site of the McLaughlin or Evens Valley school as sub-standard and recently state basic school support funds have been withheld until definite plans for improvement are submitted by the district.

Bonds for a larger amount for the building were rejected by the voters in District 33C last year. Pupils from the upper four grades are being sent to Silverton school on a tuition basis.

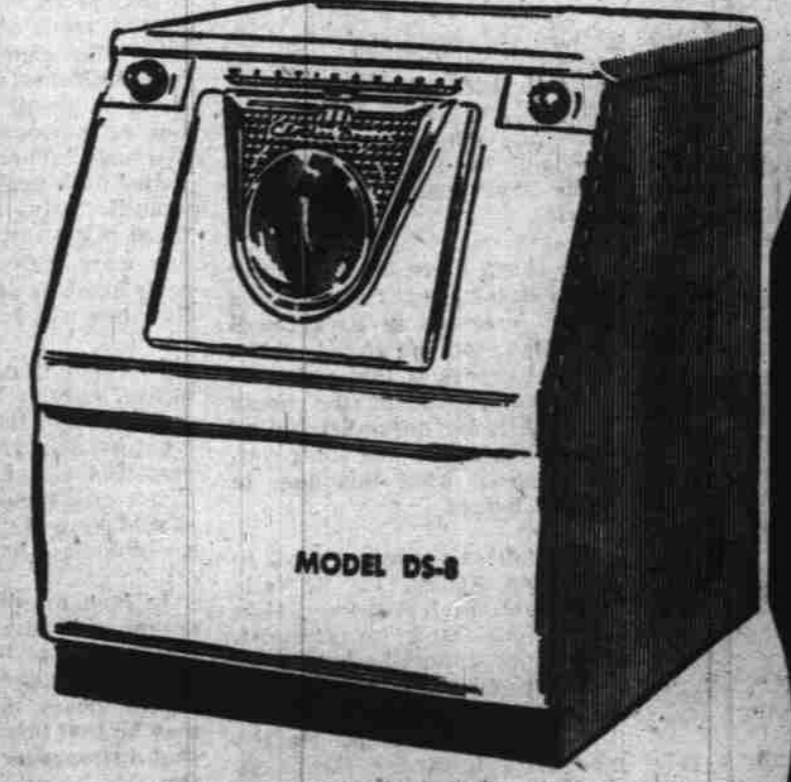
