# Hunters Find Huge Balloon

ABERDEEN (AP)—A collapsed stratospheric research balloon, believed released at Minneapolis about 2 1/2 years ago, was found by five Aberdeen deer hunters in the rugged Grays Harbor north river country last weekend.

Harry Allen said Tuesday the huge balloon contained "enough nylon to cover two city blocks," was hanging in a huge hemlock tree in thickly forested area about 10 miles south of Cosmopolis.

A weather-stained tag identified it as government property, released by the General Mills Aeronautical Research Laboratory of Minneapolis.

# Queen Mother Lunches With Mrs. F.D.R.

HYDE PARK, N.Y. (AP)—Two famous widows met at an informal luncheon here Tuesday, 15 years after they last saw each other, at that time with their husbands at their sides.

The guest was Queen Mother Elizabeth of Britain, now on a tour of the United States. Her hostess was Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, widow of the late President.

The Queen Mother's motorcade arrived some 15 minutes late. Small groups of people waved at the cross roads despite a driving rain.

The British royal visitor was greeted at the door by Mrs. Roosevelt and her son, John.

Present at the luncheon was Mr. and Mrs. John Roosevelt and three of their four children, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Morgenthau Jr., and several friends of Mrs. Roosevelt.

After lunch, the Queen Mother drove to Ossining, N.Y., where she visited the Victoria Home for Aged British Men and Women. She chatted with each of its 56 residents, most of them women.

# Mother Glad Jane Russell Adopted Son

LONDON (UP)—Mrs. Florence Kavanagh, 26, wife of a London carpenter, said after meeting the screen star Jane Russell she is "glad" she let Miss Russell adopt her son, Tommy.

"She is a wonderful mother and has given him so much," Mrs. Kavanagh said. She had with her a gift of Miss Russell's, a set of three-D slides of Tommy at play.

The two women met secretly yesterday at the office of the screen star's lawyer. It was their first meeting since the actress whisked Tommy off to America three years ago when he was a year old.

"But there was absolutely nothing legal arranged," Miss Russell told reporters afterward. "I just wanted to tell Mrs. Kavanagh about Thomas' progress."

"I love him dearly and I want to give him a chance in life. He was very young and therefore he does not remember his mother. He calls me mummy. He is my son and I want him to feel that he belongs to me. He is a real American boy."

# Nationalists, Reds Trade Air Attacks

TAIPEH, Formosa (AP)—The west pocket war blazed again Tuesday in the Tachen Islands 200 miles north of Formosa, Reds and Nationalists trading air blows for the second straight day.

A few red planes dropped four bombs on Yikiangshan (One River Mountain) Island, a stepping stone if the Reds try to seize the main Tachen Islands eight miles to the south.

Before dawn, Nationalist planes in undisclosed strength bombed artillery positions on Tounmen, which on Monday had pounded Yikiangshan with 3,000 shells, the defense ministry said. Tounmen is only five miles from Yikiangshan.

The Communists for the first time in the civil war are using planes.

# Grows; France Sends Troops Algeria Toll

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP)—France sped 5,400 troops Tuesday as reinforcements for already heavily garrisoned Algeria in an effort to throttle bloody terroristic outbreaks of the last two days.

Two armored rescue columns were rushed toward an Algerian mountain village reported to have been in rebel hands since Monday.

The clashes, which have been common in the French protectorates of Morocco and Tunisia, overflowed into Algeria, a French department, Monday. At least nine persons were killed in 30 concerted attacks by Arab nationalists in pre-dawn attacks, while 15 Tunisian guerrillas were reported killed later in the day in a clash at Sidi Youssef near the Algerian border.

The toll in nationalist attacks and political murders in French North Africa during the last four days has reached at least 39 killed and more than a score wounded.

Three French infantry companies and a battalion of paratroopers reached Algeria from France recently. The reinforcements, expected within 48 hours, will join troops already spread over the area long used as the training ground for the French Foreign Legion.

# Financial Plan to Resist Aggression Given Approval

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—The U. N. Political Committee approved, 50-5, Tuesday a plan calling on all countries to help resist aggression by chipping in men, money and supplies to the limit.

The Soviet bloc voted against the proposal, which was backed by the Western Big Three. India's V. K. Krishna Menon abstained, saying the U. N. should be turning its attention toward peace instead of studying ways of war. Indonesia also abstained.

The Assembly is expected to approve the plan, which will have only the force of a recommendation.

# Man Stabbed in Klamath Brawl

KLAMATH FALLS (AP)—A fight Monday night resulted in a man being stabbed and in the arrest of two persons by police here.

Dist. Atty. Frank Anderson said police were called to a house where a party was in progress. There they found Frank Byers, 43, Duns-muir, Calif., railroad worker, in critical condition from a chest wound inflicted by an ice pick. Byers was hospitalized.

Jailers on charges of drunkenness were Louis Ellen Gruell, 37, and Erskine Homer Fisher, 55, both of Klamath Falls.

Anderson said his investigation is continuing.

# Arrest Ends Family's Bogus Check Spree

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—An unusual story of two parents on a bogus check-cashing spree, taking their five small children with them, was told by police Tuesday.

The five-month tour which netted the Detroit, Mich., couple approximately \$8,000, detectives estimated, ended here when the father left the youngsters unattended in the family automobile for a few minutes at a downtown parking lot.

The walls of the children, ranging in age from 3 months to 5 1/2 years, attracted police who promptly placed the couple under arrest. They gave their names as Victor and Delores Demauro.

"Those five children were alone in the car, crying and squalling because they hadn't eaten," Det. Harold Hooper said. "I was almost sorry I caught her."

Hooper said the woman would cash the checks and turn the money over to her husband who remained in the car.

"They and the children were dressed well," he added. "And the children had lots of toys in the car. The youngsters were placed in homes pending disposition of the case."

Police said the couple told them they cashed checks in Detroit, Wichita, Kansas City, St. Louis, Cincinnati, Pittsburgh, Buffalo, Rochester, Indianapolis, Milwaukee, Omaha, Seattle, Salt Lake City, Denver, Fort Worth, Dallas and Tulsa.

# Former Idaho Solon Dies

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho (AP)—Dr. John T. Wood, one of the country's strongest opponents of the United Nations during his term as congressman from Idaho, died early Tuesday.

Dr. Wood, 66, was given only a few years to live when he suffered a heart attack 15 years ago. Although his health had been failing in recent years, he served a term in Congress in 1950-52, and since then continued his medical practice at his office in his home.

# Belgian Generals Accused of Taking Public Money

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP)—Police said Tuesday three Belgian generals in the army reserve were being held in solitary confinement on charges involving alleged misappropriation of public funds. A magistrate ordered solitary confinement because the case may involve defense secrets, police added.

Police named the three as Gen. Camille Grimart, who was in charge of establishment of the pipeline built for NATO linking Antwerp with Trier; Gen. Jules Maroye, manager of a Belgian pipeline company which participated in the construction; and Gen. Chevalier Paul Jacques de Haves-Kerche.

# Plane Crash Fatal To Two in Wyoming

ROCK SPRINGS, Wyo. (AP)—The wreckage of a plane and a bodies of its pilot and passenger were discovered Tuesday about 26 miles south of Rock Springs.

Sheriff George Nimmo identified the victims as R. W. Sather, about 33, of Evanston, Wyo., and John W. Mopley Jr., of Ogden, Utah.

# West German Refugee Party Hits Saar Pact

BONN, Germany (AP)—Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, facing the toughest political crisis of his career, lost another of his coalition allies Tuesday night in the parliamentary rebellion against his French-German agreement on the Saar.

The Refugee Party, third largest in Adenauer's four-party government, announced it rejects the Saar agreement "in its present form." The agreement would "Europeanize" the Saar — German before World War II — while leaving it economically tied to France.

This decision will deprive Adenauer of 27 critical votes in the showdown battle in Parliament unless the chancellor persuades the Refugee Party to reverse its position.

The Free Democrats, second largest party in the Adenauer coalition, and some members of the chancellor's own Christian Democratic Party (CDU), already have rebelled against the Saar agreement.

# Juror's Removal Seen in Cleveland Osteopath's Trial

CLEVELAND (AP)—A tainted juror is expected to be removed from Dr. Samuel Sheppard's murder trial Wednesday. The elections stalled the trial Tuesday.

The juror is James R. Manning, 38, convicted 11 years ago of a sex offense. The state asked his ouster Monday on grounds that he disqualified himself by his failure to reveal his past before he was sworn. The defense demanded proof of Manning's record, and Sheppard, handsome 30-year-old osteopath, is accused of beating his wife, Marilyn 31, to death last July 4. She was four months pregnant. The maximum penalty for murder in Ohio is death in the electric chair.

# Nehru Praises Red China's Leaders

CALCUTTA, India (AP)—Prime Minister Nehru told a crowd of two million Tuesday that Red China's leaders have brought stability to their country and tried to improve the people's living standards.

Nehru said Chinese-Indian friendship is important for the peace of Asia and the entire world.

# Sex Deviate Admits Killing Young Girl

JOHNSTOWN, Pa. (UP)—A former merchant seaman with a sex crime record admitted to police Tuesday that he killed six-year-old Karen Mauk, who was abducted and suffocated as she made a pre-Halloween "trick or treat" tour near her home Thursday night.

Cambria County Dist. Atty. Fred Fees said that Harry Gossard, 38, had been booked on a charge of suspicion of murder.

Karen's nude body was found by a posse Friday morning on the rain-swept hillside of a cemetery several miles from her home in nearby Conemaugh. The tattered piece of her colorful Halloween costume lay nearby. An autopsy disclosed she had not been criminally assaulted, but indicated she was the victim of a sex deviate.

Gossard was arrested Monday in Philadelphia on a tip to police. He had lived with his mother in Conemaugh since returning there last May.

The slaying of blonde, curly-haired Karen was one of three sex crimes reported in Western Pennsylvania last week.

At Aliquippa, Pa., Elijah Thompson Jr., 22, a jobless Negro laborer, confessed he killed 16-year-old Helen Jean Bryant by crushing her skull with a rock as she walked along a lonely path near her home Oct. 25. Thompson gave no motive for the killing, but police said an attempted criminal assault had been made on the victim.

A 12-year-old girl was criminally assaulted Sunday night at New Castle, Pa.
