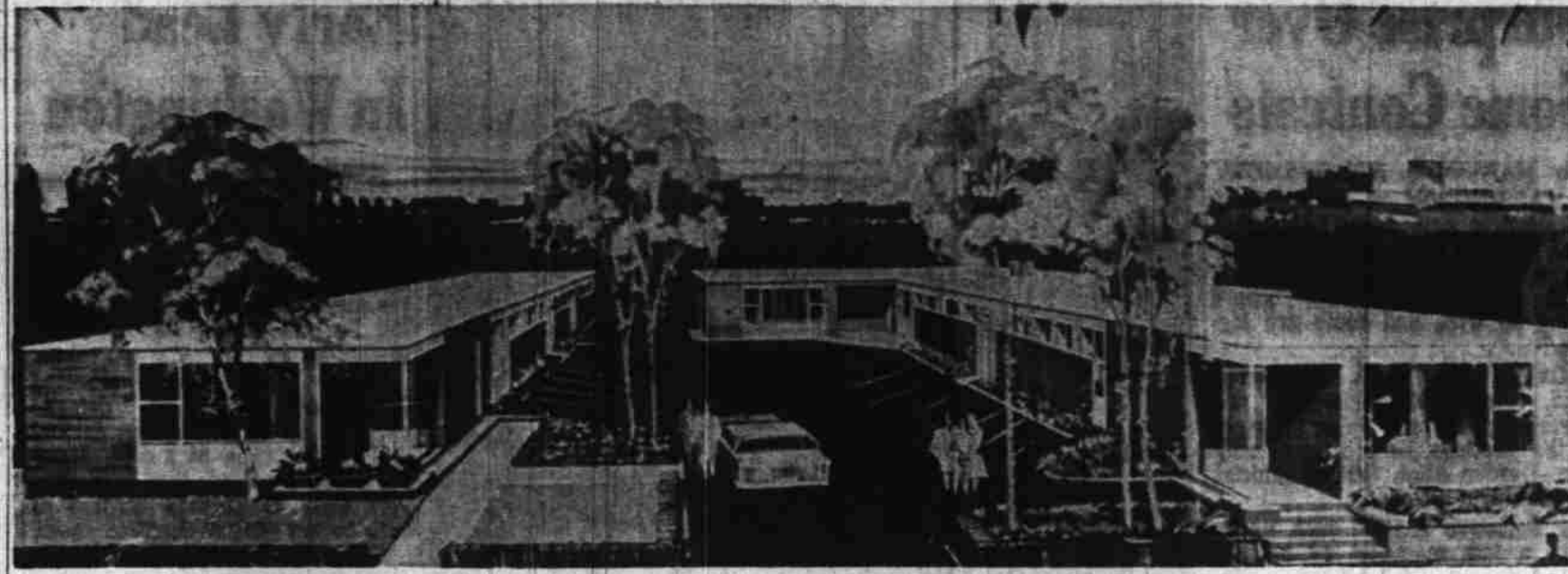
WORKERS WANTED

Contract Awarded for New Surgical-Dental Clinic

Baptists Open West Regional Conference

The need for evangelism today is great, Dr. Gilbert C. H. Bellshaw of San Francisco, Calif., said in Salem Tuesday night at the opening service of the western regional conference of the Conservative Baptist Association of America.

First business session of the convention will take place this morning at the First Baptist Church here. Convention officials said they did not know how many delegates would be on hand but they expected the bulk of them to register today.

Delegates are Baptist pastors and laymen from the states of Oregon, Arizona, California, Washington, Idaho and Colorado. Association President, the Rev. John Speering of Yuma, Ariz., will open the first business session at the church at 9 o'clock this morning.

On the agenda this morning are talks by the Rev. Ralph Gorsline of Brazil, Dr. John Houser of Lebanon on the Bible, Dr. Claude Moffitt of Los Angeles on prayer, and the Dr. David Hood of West Linn on preaching.

The afternoon sessions today will be devoted to home missionary work. Speakers will be Dr. Arno Weniger of San Francisco and the Rev. Wallace Wood of Cottonwood, Ariz. Abe Samuels Named Israel Bond Official

Abe Samuels will be Israel Bond chairman for Salem, it was announced Tuesday by Dr. Bernard Brown.

In announcing the appointment Dr. Brown stressed that the entire Bnai Brith membership of more than 250,000 in the United States, understands the obligation to make the new State of Israel, "only bastion of democracy in the Middle East," economically secure.

Samuels said the supreme lodge president, Philip Klutznick, had asked that every Bnai Brith family own an Israel Bond earmarked exclusively for the economic and capital development of the new state.

It was pointed out that in the few years that Israel Bonds have been purchased, Israel's food supply has become adequate to take care of its 1 1/2 million persons; rationing and their unemployment have ended; factories have been and are continuing to be built; diversification of industry has been established; power stations and dams have been and are continuing to be constructed.

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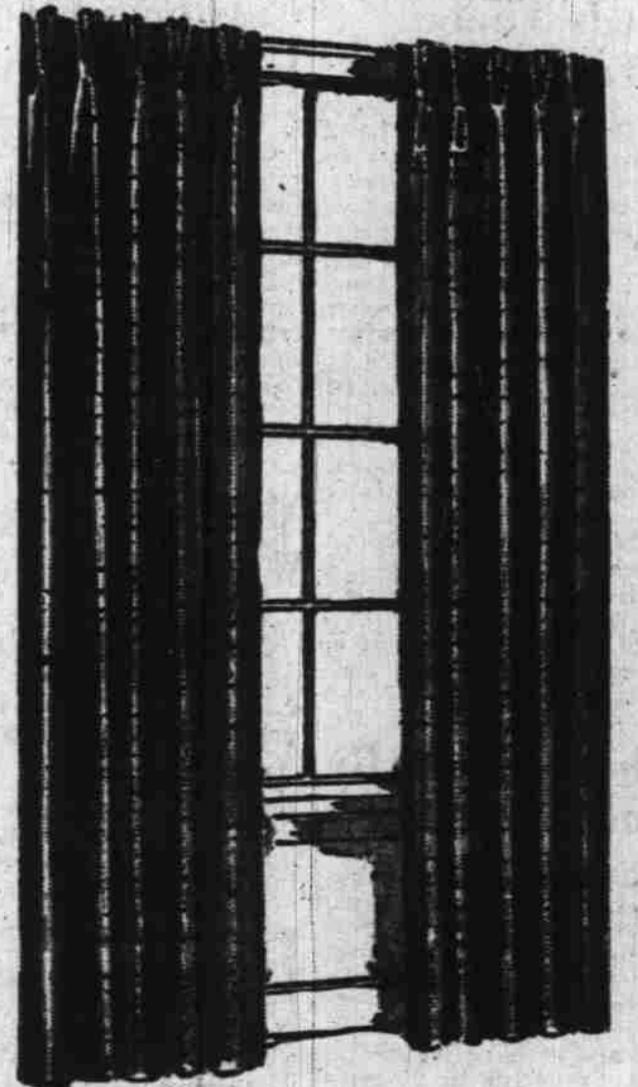
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
