

Aged Hunter Saves Life by Woods Savy

YAKIMA, Wash. (AP)—An aged Yakima man whose 60 years of experience in the woods probably saved his life, hobbled into a camp of elk hunters Saturday on home-made crutches after surviving two days and nights in freezing rain in mountain country.

Charles Conner, 75, had been the object of an intensive search by a mounted sheriff's posse and a group of jeep drivers since he failed to return to camp Thursday afternoon, the last day of the deer hunting season.

Conner told Sheriff Burt Guss, who brought him in from the Naches Ranger station, that he was alive only because of his hunting and woods experience accumulated since he was 15 years old.

Winter comes early in the Rattlesnake Ridge Country southwest of here where Conner was lost, bringing cold and rain that might kill younger and harder men.

Conner carefully conserved the few matches he had, building fires on the ridges each of the two nights and wrapping himself in a bed of bark and branches for warmth.

During the day he carried live coals from the fires in pieces of bark to start smoke signals in dry, rotted stumps.

His legs gave out on the rugged ground during the first afternoon so he fashioned a pair of crutches from branches. With their help he kept working downhill "because anyone who ever has been in the woods knows that is the only way to find your way back to town."

He didn't find his way back to town, but he was headed in the right direction when he walked into the hunters' camp.

Mystery Mission To Formosa Said Try for Alliance

WASHINGTON (AP)—The State Department finally acknowledged Saturday that Asst. Secretary of State Walter Robertson's mystery mission to Formosa, a month ago, was concerned in part with discussion of a treaty of alliance between the United States and Nationalist China.

The information came from Press Officer Henry Suydam in response to inquiries about progress on such a treaty.

From other sources it was learned that there has now been a modification of the U.S. government attitude toward a treaty with Nationalist China so that, if satisfactory provisions can be drafted, the United States is willing to sign such a pact.

Previously the United States was willing only to talk about an alliance, not act.

Trio Arrested For Sale of Parakeets

ROSEBURG (AP)—Police arrested two Californians and an Idahoan Saturday, and said they had brought 1,137 parakeets into Oregon illegally for sale.

They were charged with violating a State Board of Health regulation prohibiting the importation of parakeets into Oregon, measure designed to protect against psittacosis, sometimes known as parrot fever.

The three were Dorris Joseph Wymer, 33, Soquel, Calif.; Gerald A. Alexander, 27, Santa Cruz, Calif.; and William Richard Visal, 26, Boise. They were accused of selling 100 of the birds to a Roseburg store.

Police said sales slips also showed they had sold parakeets in Klamath Falls, Grants Pass, Eugene, Albany and Salem. Police said the three got the birds in California and brought them into Oregon via Idaho.

The Marion County health officer Saturday imposed a quarantine on several hundred parakeets on sale at a Salem firm.

The district attorney's office said the J. J. Newberry store recently acquired the birds without knowledge that they had been illegally imported into the state.

Dr. W. J. Stone, county health officer, took the quarantine action after learning that three men had been arrested in Roseburg on charges of illegally bringing the birds into the state. Salem was one of several cities in which the men reportedly sold the parakeets.

A spokesman for J. J. Newberry Co., said all the birds had been examined by a veterinarian before being put on sale here. The store may sign a complaint against the persons from whom the birds were acquired, it was reported.

Portland Driver Kills Pedestrian

PORTLAND (AP)—An unidentified pedestrian was struck by an automobile and killed while jaywalking on the Burnside Bridge Saturday night.

A motorist, identified by police as James J. Kramer, 40, of Portland, was taken into custody in connection with the accident and later released under \$1,000 bond.

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Solon Scoffs at Ike-Congress Stalemate Talk

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson Saturday scoffed at any talk of a stalemate because of the election of a Democratic-led Congress and said the Democrats will cooperate with President Eisenhower if consulted in advance.

Johnson, Texas Democrat slated to become majority leader of the Senate in January, spoke at a crowded news conference.

"Talk about a stalemate is as ridiculous as talk about a cold war," he said, adding, "If there is a cold war, the Democrats are not going to provoke it."

This was a reference to President Eisenhower's statement last month that a Republican Congress must be elected to prevent "a cold war of partisan politics" between Capitol Hill and the White House.

Eisenhower told his first post-election press conference that this campaign oratory probably was too strong, the tall Texan recalled.

He said he personally was disappointed by some of the Eisenhower's campaign utterances and he reported that other Democrats are still burning at campaign statements by Vice President Nixon and other GOP orators that Democrats are "left wingers" or "the party of treason."

Johnson said he was glad that the President had invited top congressional Democrats as well as Republicans for a conference on foreign affairs here Nov. 18.

"We will be happy to participate and contribute anything we can," he said, adding that this was "a step in true bipartisanship" that Democrats had urged in the fields of foreign relations and national defense.

But Johnson stressed that bipartisanship and Democratic cooperation must include "more than just a review of the facts and decisions that have been made."

"A political party cannot be asked to bear the responsibility of a decision in which it had no part," he said.

Several times he cited what he said was a Biblical quotation often used by his father: "Come, let us reason together."

Johnson said he and Rep. Sam Rayburn, a fellow Texan who again will be speaker of the House, had agreed that Democrats will have their own program. He said this will be in addition to the recommendations in Eisenhower's State of the Union Message to the new Congress.

McMinnville Man Pays Top Price For Livestock
SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Oregon buyers again paid top prices for livestock champions Saturday at the first western holding of the National Sale of the Columbia Sheep Breeders Assn. of America.

The champion ram of the Grand National Livestock Exposition at the San Francisco Cow Palace was bought for the good price of \$375 by Clarence W. Bernards of McMinnville, Ore. The sellers were Mr. and Mrs. Joe Pfister of Nede, Wyo.

The champion ewe brought \$225. Marcus Vetter of Minitor, Ore., bought it from Terry Maddux and Dorris Gill of Bakersfield, Calif.

State to Receive Forest Receipts
PORTLAND (AP)—Oregon will get \$4,998,207 and Washington \$2,486,487 in national forest receipts in the next few days.

The funds represent the 25 per cent given annually to the states from receipts on timber sales, stock grazing and other forest uses.

The states in turn will apportion the money to counties having national forest land in their boundaries.

"Relationships such as those offered in fraternal orders work strongly toward cementing ties between nations," the Rev. Chester P. Gates of Portland, said Saturday night. He was principal speaker at a banquet of the Northwest Odd Fellows Association, held at the Senator Hotel.

The banquet, a feature of the association's three-day convention in Salem, was attended by approximately 140 fraternal leaders from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and British Columbia Odd Fellows and Rebekah Lodges.

The Rev. Gates, member of the Orient Lodge of Portland, pointed out how Canada and this country have been brought even closer together through fraternal organizations such as Odd Fellows.

Arabs Start Anti-Commie Defense Move

LONDON (AP)—Arab statesmen have started new moves—with strong British and U. S. support—to set up a Mideast defense system against Communist aggression.

Qualified diplomats report a flurry of secret exchanges among the Middle East capitals on plans to build a security network tied in with the West. London and Washington are encouraging this long hoped for trend with promises of military and economic aid.

Organization of a Mid-east defense system—extending over the oil laden land bridge between Europe, Asia and Africa—would close the last gap in the West's defense ring around the Communist bloc.

Iraq's Premier Nuri Said has taken the lead by proposing that some of the eight Arab League states link up with the Turkey-Pakistan alliance. Turkey is a member of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

The 66-year-old Iraqi Premier, despite his poor health, has traveled through the Middle East winning a lot of attention for his defense project.

He is reportedly well advanced in his negotiations with Turkey for an alliance and possibly full membership in the Turkey-Pakistan pact.

Western informants said Nuri is soon to get his first shipment of U. S. arms under a military agreement concluded with the United States last April.

Western diplomats find Egypt, once the chief opponent of Arab military cooperation with the West, moving toward a reversal of her traditional stand.

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Reds Observe Anniversary Of Revolution

MOSCOW (AP)—Deputy Premier M. Z. Saburov Saturday night kicked off the festive weekend celebrations of the 37th anniversary of the Communist revolution by censuring Soviet factory and farm workers for lagging production.

He said additional controls would be imposed to develop further the Soviet economy.

Speaking in Moscow's Bolshoi Theater before the top Soviet government leaders, dignitaries and diplomatic corps, the youthful-looking Saburov also denounced the West's defense alliance moves, including rearming of West Germany and repeated the charge that the United States is trying to encircle Russia with military bases.

He stressed the Soviet government's theme of coexistence—the capitalistic and Communist nations can live peacefully together in the same world.

President Klementi Voroshilov, arm in arm with Premier Georgi Malenkov, led the procession of government dignitaries onto the flower-banked stage of the Bolshoi.

Above the floodlit stage flashed an electric slogan: "Long live the 37th anniversary of the great October Socialist revolution."

Sunday the traditional military parade and civilian demonstration will roll through Red Square as the government reviews it from atop the Lenin-Stalin tomb.

Confused Cops Wound Each Other in NYC
NEW YORK (UP)—Two police officers confused each other as hold-up men Saturday and shot it out at close range on a street corner.

Police said plainclothesman Arnold Francis, 27, was holding a gun on two men he had caught beating a third when a detective, Clarence Brown, approached the scene to investigate.

Brown thought Francis was staging a hold-up. Francis thought likewise of Brown, and the two men fired a flurry of nine shots at each other. One bullet struck Francis in the side and another hit a passerby, Lawrence Taylor, 31, in the leg.

Both were taken to a hospital where their conditions were described as "not serious."

Police held the two men whose capture precipitated the gun battle but were preparing to release them because the victim of their beating could not be found.
