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McCarthy Gets 'Slush...Slime' Label by Solon

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) was assailed Friday as a spreader of "slush and slime," and defended as a victim of spiteful slanders, in the week's final session of the Senate debate on the question of censuring him.

The slush and slime charge came from Sen. Stennis (D-Miss), a member of the special committee which recommended censure for McCarthy. Stennis argued the Senate must "condemn" McCarthy's conduct in order to set a standard of political honor.

Republican Senators Bricker (Ohio) and Goldwater (Ariz.) came swiftly to McCarthy's defense, praising him as the symbol of American resistance to communism and blaming Communist influence for the move to rebuke him.

Protests Charged

Finally a second member of the censure committee, Sen. Carlson (R-Kan.), took the floor and protested sharply against McCarthy's charge that the committee members were "unwitting handmaiden" of the Communist Party.

Carlson declared McCarthy's accusation—made in a speech he put into the Congressional Record Wednesday—was untrue, was a violation of Senate rules and "is therefore out of order."

The Kansas lawmaker likewise protested what he called the "legalistic inquiries" with which the McCarthy side has been bombarding committee members, and declared any "rear-guard" action to delay the proceedings will not go down well with the voters back home.

Maintain Dignity

"We can certainly solve this problem," Carlson said, "without the sacrifice of the dignity of this chamber."

Goldwater (R-Ariz.) described the censure move as "the culminating act to destroy America's foremost fighter against communism," and accused McCarthy's foes of hypocrisy.

The masterminds in this fight have said one thing and meant another," Goldwater declared. "Their propaganda has dripped with idealism, high-mindedness, and lofty sentiments. Their deeds have come from the darkness... have been born of the darkness."

"All the discredited and embittered figures of the Hiss-Yalta period of American dishonor have crawled out from under their logs to join the efforts to get even. They have dipped in the smut pot to discredit Sen. McCarthy and his work against communism."

Goldwater, lean and prematurely gray, spoke after Ohio's veteran Bricker declared a vote to censure McCarthy would "smack of legislative tyranny" and "would reflect a vindictive passion unworthy of the world's greatest deliberative body."

Bricker contended there is no precedent for punishing a senator for the acts alleged against McCarthy—obstructing and abusing a Senate committee, and likewise giving abusive treatment of an Army general who appeared before McCarthy's own investigations subcommittee.

Moreover, Bricker said, censuring McCarthy would not bar other senators from doing the very things for which McCarthy was rebuked. And so, he declared, the present unprecedented censure session of the Senate is based on an "unparalleled absurdity."

Stennis, a former Mississippi judge, accused McCarthy of exhibiting right up to the present a "total contempt" for the Senate.

Failure to rebuke McCarthy, Stennis said, will amount to endorsing his conduct and thus telling the youth of the nation that McCarthy's behavior "is the high road of which the Senate approves, and upon which it likes to travel."

Stennis was the first member of the censure committee to come out uncompromisingly in favor of an official rebuke for McCarthy. The group's chairman, Sen. Watkins (R-Utah), has said he will avoid the role of "prosecutor."

Another member, Sen. Case (R-SD), has proposed dropping the censure charges, in effect, if McCarthy will withdraw his attacks on the 1952 Gillette committee and its members—something McCarthy has declined to do.

Another Democrat, Sen. Fulbright (D-Ark.), told newsmen he doubted if any compromise could be reached on the issue. Sen. Dirksen (R-Ill.) and several other Republicans have drafted a resolution milder than the one now before the Senate.

Knowland Quoted
During the debate Sen. Knowland of California, Republican leader, appeared to be laying the basis for a possible Senate verdict at variance with the censure proposal made by the special committee headed by Sen. Watkins.

Knowland recalled that he had said last summer he would gladly go on trial for his life before the Watkins committee. He said he did not retract "one iota" from that judgment today.

New Uranium Deal Set for Congo Fields

WASHINGTON (AP)—Foreign Minister Paul Henri Spaak disclosed Friday that Belgium plans to work out a new agreement with the United States and Great Britain for using uranium from the rich African Congo fields.

He said it would carry provisions under which the United States would lend a hand to Belgium's own atomic industrialization.

The agreement would replace a 1944 pact, since altered in some degree, which has come in for political criticism in Belgium.

For one thing, critics of the government have accused it of virtually giving the uranium away, without getting help in return for Belgium's nuclear research program.

The price has been kept secret. Spaak talked to reporters Friday after he and Minister Sir Robert Scott of the British Embassy had conferred for an hour with Undersecretary of State Herbert Hoover Jr.

Spaak said the agreement would cover both the amount and price of uranium to be sold to Britain and America from the Belgium Congo fields.

The Foreign Minister said the agreement would include "United States aid for the atomic industrialization in Belgium." Asked to elaborate, he said this would "start with the erection of an atomic pilot plant."

Spaak obviously hoped such an agreement would offset the criticism which has been raised by a variety of Belgians, ranging from Communists to extreme right wingers.

Many Belgians and newspapers have protested that the U.S. ban on the exchange of atomic information—which was eased by Congress this summer—handicapped Belgian scientists.

While the United States still depends heavily on the Belgian Congo and other foreign sources, the Atomic Energy Commission has reported progress in domestic production.

Fred Snite Dies After 18 Years in Iron Lung

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Fred B. Snite Jr., infantile paralysis victim who lived 18 years and 7 months in an iron lung, died Friday while here to participate in the Florida State Bridge Tournament.

Snite, accompanied by his wife and two medical aides, came here Thursday from his Miami Beach home for the first round of bridge. He failed to show up for Friday's round, and was found dead in his room at the George Washington Hotel.

Apparently he had been taking a nap and died quietly in his sleep, still encased in the artificial respirator which kept him alive through the years. The machine was working normally.

There was no official announcement of the cause of death, but friends said "A brave heart grew too tired from the strain."

A spokesman for the American Medical Assn. said Snite had lived longer under iron lung conditions than any other polio sufferer listed in their records.

Snite, 44, was stricken with complete paralysis at Peiping, China, in April, 1936, a few weeks before

Priault Succumbs To Crash Injuries

KLAMATH FALLS (AP)—Injuries suffered Oct. 31 in a highway accident took the life Friday of Edouard Pierre Priault, 44, Chiloquin.

He had lived at Chiloquin since 1926, publishing the Chiloquin Review from 1938 to 1949. The newspaper had been edited earlier by his father, William A. Priault, and his brother, Arthur. He closed the newspaper in 1949 but continued a commercial printing plant.

Survivors include the widow and a son, Bill, 13.

\$100,000 Deal Announced in City, County

Purchase of a two-story Hollywood business building and a Woodburn service station and bulk plant by E. O. Bacheller, 2295 D St., was reported Friday. The transactions involved over \$100,000.

The Hollywood property is at the southeast corner of Capitol St. and Tile Rd., occupied by several stores, professional offices and apartments. It was purchased from H. H. Holmeier, 295 Candalaria Blvd.

The Woodburn business property, handling General Petroleum products, was acquired from Lee U. Eyerly of Salem.

Bacheller, retired from a mercantile business, came to Salem a few years ago from the Midwest. He was represented in the two real estate transactions by Miss Thelma Mankertz of Cluett & Kenyon, Realtors.

Southern California Shaken by Temblor

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—An earthquake, the strongest here since 1940, shook residents of Southern California and neighboring Mexico into wakefulness at 4:27 a. m. Friday.

No damage was reported from the rolling quake, centering in sparsely populated Lower California, Mexico, but it was felt from Ensenada, 60 miles south of the border, to Los Angeles County's San Fernando Valley, 150 miles north.

Canvass Gives Vote Boost To Neuberger

U. S. Senator-elect Richard L. Neuberger gained five votes on Guy Cordon Friday as the Marion County Clerk's office released the results of its official vote canvass.

The canvass shows that Cordon defeated Neuberger by 4,765 votes in the county. Official totals are 19,593 for Cordon, 14,828 for Neuberger.

This compares with the unofficial county tally released Nov. 4 of 19,594 for Cordon and 14,822 for Neuberger.

The official canvass varied little from the unofficial tally. The two compared show that Gov. Paul L. Patterson, who defeated Joseph K. Carson in the state gubernatorial race, lost two votes to Carson.

In the close position two circuit court judge races in Marion County, Val Sloper, who won, lost one vote and Edward O. Stadter, Jr., the runner-up, lost five.

Five men sought the seat and the official tally shows: Sloper, 10,781; Stadter, 9,914.

Schools Idle Monday for Teacher Tour

Boys and girls will have the customary holiday that comes when a Teachers Institute is held. But the "Institute" this year will be different.

Teachers for their special day will take part in Salem's first Business-Education Day. Eighty Salem business firms will play host to separate teacher groups by showing them in detail how a business is operated.

The school administration has assigned the 480 teachers to the various businesses cooperating in the Salem Chamber of Commerce-sponsored program.

More than 200 are expected to attend the Salem Chamber luncheon Monday noon at the Marion Hotel, on the B-E Day theme. Harry Lintz, a U.S. Chamber official, will show a chamber movie on the subject.

Detectives Fred Boynton and Clyde Lowry said the boy, whose name was withheld, was named as the ringleader of a gang by 14-year-old twins who also were taken into custody.

Much of the loot was from piggy banks and drawers in South-east Portland homes.

Exchange Red Faced; Seat Sells Short

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Stock Exchange is happy now, but it has a mighty red face. It got caught short in a sale of one of its own seats. Here's what happened.

A member offered his seat for sale for \$74,000. Then he cancelled the offer. The exchange, however, missed the cancellation and sold the seat.

The buyer wanted his new seat. The seller wouldn't part with it. The exchange was in the middle—caught short one seat like the person who is "it" in a game of musical chairs.

The market for seats immediately shot up to an asking price of \$90,000. The short squeeze was on. The exchange dickered and waited.

Finally, the asking price dropped to \$75,000. The exchange quickly grabbed the seat and delivered it to the waiting buyer for \$74,000, a loss of \$1,000 for the exchange.

Officials breathed easier. There is an old saying in Wall Street about short sellers: "He who sells what isn't his must settle up or go to prison."

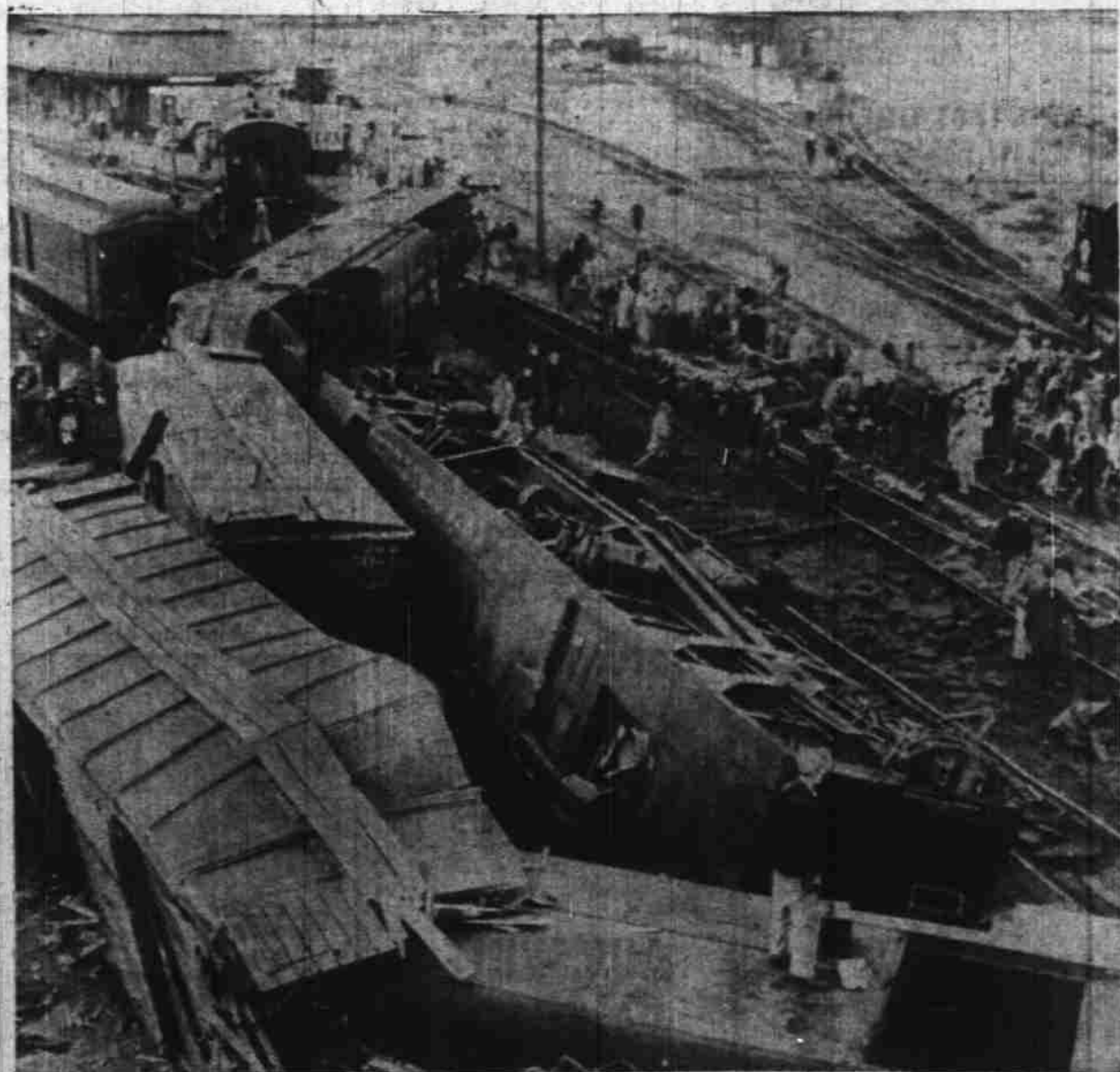

Driver Faces Theft Charge On Cigarettes

Two Salem men were lodged in the city jail under \$3,500 bail Friday after police investigation of the reported theft of approximately 1,000 cartons of cigarettes from a Salem wholesale firm.

Raymond Gunn Jr., 1248 Highland Ave., was arrested on a district court warrant charging larceny by embezzlement and the other man, Robert F. Goodwin, 234 N. 21st St., was booked on a warrant charging buying and receiving stolen property.

Officers said Gunn, a driver for the B&R Wholesale firm, 1915 N. Commercial St., admitted in a signed statement that he took the cigarettes over a period of a year and a half. Gunn reportedly told police he sold an average of two cases per week to Goodwin at considerably under the market price.

Police said Goodwin operated Goodies' Market at 1827 State St., until just recently.

Authorities indicated the case was "cracked" by marking cigarette stocks at the firm prior to delivery. Stolen cartons later were identified by the markings, officers said.

Ernie Breithaupt, owner of the wholesale house, signed the complaint against the pair. He said he had been aware for some time that cigarettes were being taken.

Crack Express Derailed, One Woman Killed

NASHUA, N. H. (AP)—A crack Montreal-Boston express derailed, overturned and smashed into a mass of wreckage at dawn Friday in the Union Railroad Station yard here.

One passenger, a woman, was killed, 21 others injured. It was the first fatality to a passenger on the road since 1918.

Cause of the wreck was not determined immediately. A Boston and Maine railroad spokesman said the train approached the station—where it was scheduled to stop—"at excessive speed."

He said brake failure on the speeding train could have caused the accident.

The train was the Red Wing, made up of eight cars and a double unit diesel engine.

Only the foremost of the engine units and a Pullman club car at the rear end of the train remained upright.

The others overturned and demolished the tracks as they skidded to a halt.

The baggage-mail car landed on its roof. Other cars smashed into freight cars standing on a siding, wrecking two of them, and ripping through the concrete and masonry wall of an adjoining building.
