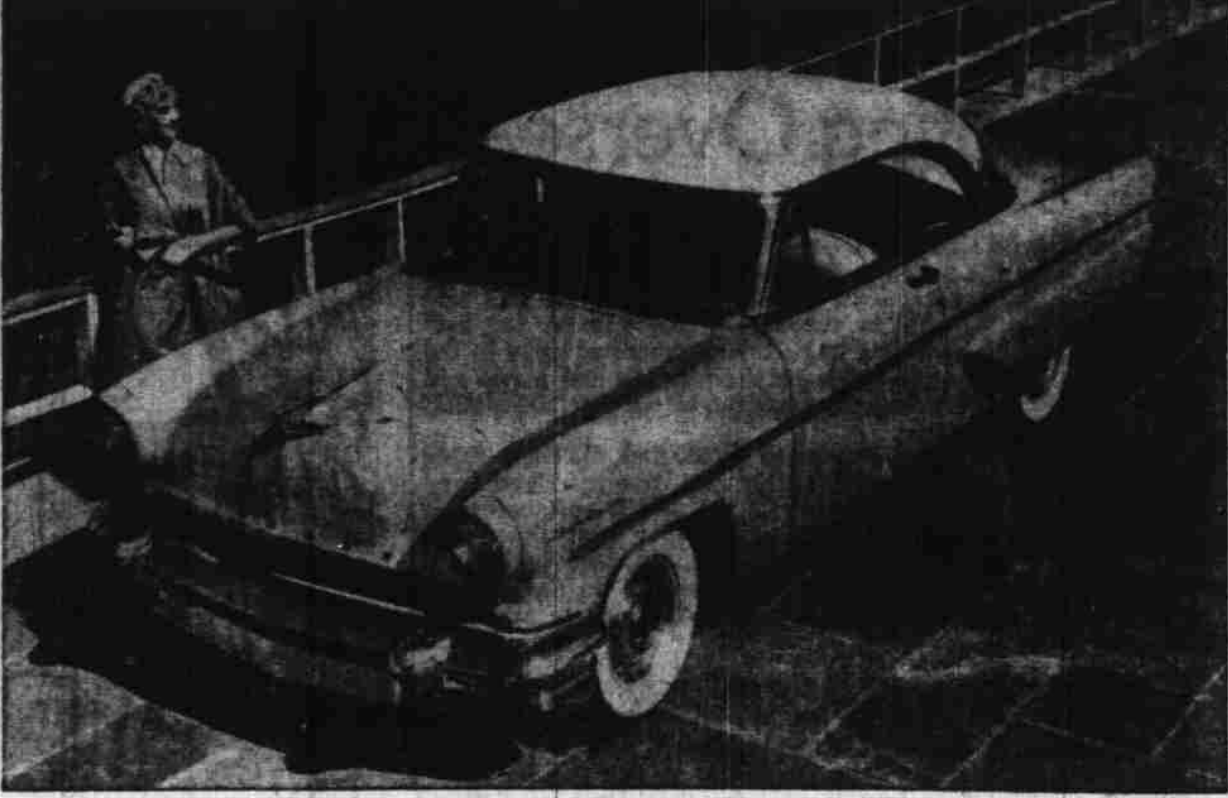

Police Sought Quick Confession by Doctor

CLEVELAND (U) — Police who arrested Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard for the murder of his wife expected a speedy confession once he was behind bars, said a witness Friday. But the confession never came.

This testimony was given by patrolman Fred F. Drenkhan, a handsome, curly haired member of the seven-man Bay Village police force.

He told of a conference July 30 before he arrested Sheppard in the slaying of his pregnant wife, Marilyn, 31, on July 4.

"The statement was made, wasn't it," defense attorney William J. Corrigan asked, "that all you had to do was throw Sam Sheppard in jail away from his brothers and family and he'd confess?"

"I heard something like that," Drenkhan conceded.

"And that he was a dope fiend and that if you put him in jail he'd confess?" Corrigan continued.

The patrolman said he hadn't heard any statement like that then, but thought it was a theory raised later in a letter to police.

Sheppard is on trial for his life in the slaying of his wife. Drenkhan still was on the witness stand when court recessed for the weekend.

"In a long, grueling, still uncomplicated cross examination, Corrigan attempted to demonstrate as he has before that police picked Sheppard as the murderer of Marilyn last July 4 and then—disregarding any other possibility—set out to convict him."

Speaking of the day of the slaying, Corrigan asked:

"At that time and on that day it was stated to you that Sam Sheppard had committed murder?"

"Yes, that's right," said Drenkhan, the first policeman on the scene of the murder. He said the statement came from two Cleveland detectives who arrived later.

"And from that day down to this," Corrigan said, "all these investigators have done nothing but try to prove Dr. Sheppard was the murderer."

The state objected and Common Pleas Judge Edward Blythin refused to let Drenkhan answer.

Earlier, under direct examination by the state, Drenkhan testified he found no sign of a forced entry to the Sheppard home the day of the murder. Nor, he said, did he find any sign of a struggle on the beach outside.

"The beach was smooth—there was no indication anyone had walked on the beach," he testified.

He also said locked screens were on the three windows in the bedroom where Marilyn died.

Dr. Sheppard said a bushy haired prowler killed his wife and knocked him unconscious later on the beach.

1955 Models Restyled, With More Power

DETROIT Mich. — A new standard in automotive luxury is being set by Lincoln with its 1955 models, company officials say. A restyled exterior, an entirely new and exclusive Turbo-Drive transmission, a redesigned overhead valve V-8 engine developing 225 horsepower and major chassis innovations are some of the features cited in the Lincoln and Lincoln Capri for 1955.

The new models will be on display in dealer showrooms throughout the nation Tuesday, Nov. 23, including Warner Motor Company in Salem, Ore.

A new horizontal grille bar behind the front bumpers and a new gold Lincoln crest create a distinctive ornamentation to the new models, engineers say. A forward thrust is implied by a new headlight bezel which rakes to the front.

A new rear quarter panel eight inches longer than in previous models is culminated in an unusual canted taillight assembly, complementing the headlight treatment, it is pointed out. Twin exhaust vents are a part of the rear bumper assembly.

Lincoln for 1955 "has an advanced design automatic transmission which combines fluid torque converter with three-speed planetary gear to give the ultimate in smooth performance through all driving ranges; exclusive features make it more flexible than any previous transmission; a specially designed throttle kickdown permits a particularly fast getaway."

With Lincoln's new transmission and more powerful engine it has been possible to reduce the rear axle ratio from 3.31 to 3.07, with a resultant further improvement in fuel economy, it is declared.

Emphasis has been placed on increasing the torque of the Lincoln engine for 1955, gained by increasing the horsepower rating to 225 and the torque to 332 pound feet at 2500 rpm.

Displacement is increased to 341 cubic inches and cylinder bore diameter to 3.9 inches. The stroke stays at 3.5 inches but compression ratio is increased to 8.5 to 1.

Another first in its field for Lincoln, it is declared, is a newly developed 18 millimeter conical seat spark plug—regarded as the first major advance in spark plugs in a generation.

Agencies Join In Water Study For Northwest

WASHINGTON (U) — Five government agencies have joined in a study of proposals by non-federal groups to develop additional power in the Pacific Northwest through the use of water to be stored in reservoirs in Canada.

Such a development would require an agreement with Canada. The study, to appraise the costs and benefits of the various proposals, was announced jointly Friday by the Army Engineers and the Interior Department.

Without identifying the non-federal groups interested in the Canadian reservoir development, the announcement said sites at Mica Creek, Arrow Lakes and Kootenay Lake have been discussed as a means of creating additional power at existing and future plants on the Columbia River in the United States.

"The resulting stream regulation would increase the United States power production downstream and could provide flood control benefits as well," the announcement said.

Hunters Fined 7½ Million in Checks Sent to Beet Growers

ASTORIA (U) — Each of a party of seven hunters has been fined \$50 in municipal court here for hunting during the recent either-sex elk season in the Astoria watershed area. That area was closed in the Clatsop County season.

Altogether 18 hunters were arrested for the violation. They killed a total of 11 elk.

ONTARIO (U) — Amalgamated Sugar Co. at nearby Nyssa is mailing checks totaling seven and a half million dollars to beet growers in the Nyssa-Nampa area.

The payment is the first on the 1954 crop, for deliveries in October. Another will be made Nov. 25 for Nov. 1-15 deliveries and a third Dec. 5 for deliveries in the last half of November. The last will be made after the sugar is sold.
