Ducks Await Cougar Clash

Homecoming Jinx
Looms for Oregon

EUGENE (AP)—The University of Oregon's football Ducks are expected to have wet footing Saturday as they seek to break a long-time homecoming jinx against Washington State College.

Not since 1948 has Oregon won its homecoming game.

What's more, it hasn't been able to defeat Washington State since 1949.

Prospects may be modestly bright this year with quarterback George Shaw and all his receivers in good condition. However, the 12,000 to 15,000 expected fans are likely to see WSC's Duke Washington, laid up for most of the last two games, in good shape to resume his role as the Cougars' leading ground gainer from fullback. Passer Bob Iverson also is a WSC threat.

Kickoff is at 1:30 p.m.

Bevos, Bears Tangle Today

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—California's Bears, whose football fortunes have been at a low ebb this season, take on the down-trodden Oregon State College Beavers in a Coast Conference game here Saturday.

The result won't make any impact on the conference race but the Bears have a following who will turn out by possibly 25,000.

California has a 2-3 conference record and figures to make it a .500 seasonal showing in the next to the last game on the schedule. The Bears overall performance has been good with constant improvement noted.

Oregon State's young team has groped through a lack luster season and with six successive defeats weighing down a single victory, doesn't appear to belong on the same field with California.

The kickoff is set for 2 p.m., PST.

USC Favored Over Huskies

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Southern California with the Rose Bowl bid already won, remained the heavy favorite Friday to knock off Washington for its sixth straight Pacific Coast Conference victory Saturday.

The Trojans, with such aces as quarterback Jim Contratto and half-backs Linden Crow, Jon Arnett and Aramis Dandoy, appear far too strong for the Huskies, a team crippled all season by injury to key players.

It is the Trojan Homecoming Day, and unless midweek rains make a return visit, some 40,000 fans are expected to watch the game in Memorial Coliseum.

Kickoff time is 2 p.m., PST.

Washington's hope to make a contest of the affair rests with Bobby Cox, a 6-foot sophomore from Walla Walla, Wash., ushered into school as a likely successor to the Huskies' former All-American star, Don Heinrich.

The early loss of the regular quarterback, Sandy Lederman, pushed Cox into the picture sooner than anticipated. But Cox has done nobly, without much help from the front line stalwarts, and rates fourth in passing in the conference behind George Shaw and John Brodie of Stanford.

Cox gave powerful UCLA a nightmare in the final stages of their game, and to date has connected with 51 of 111 passes for 697 yards and three touchdowns.

Southern Cal's flashy sophomore, Arnett, poses a problem. He has missed duty in the last game or two because of a knee injury. Coach Jess Hill figures the youngster needs competitive exercise badly, but at the same moment he has reason not to risk recurrence of the injury.

The reason: USC takes on the nation's top team, UCLA, next Saturday. Arnett, as well as all the Trojans, must be ready for this one.

Idaho Frosh Topple Montana for 1st Win

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP)—Idaho's freshmen tasted their first victory with a 25-6 win over the visiting Montana yearlings on the Moscow high school field Friday.

The Vandal Babes, trailing by 6 points after the first quarter, caught up at halftime, and then pulled out an expert passing attack in the second half to roll over the outmanned Grizzlies.

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Dallas Dragons Topple Central Panthers Lead Till Final Period

DALLAS (Special)—The Dallas High Dragons climbed another rung on the ladder to the Class A-2 football championship here Friday night by putting on a fourth quarter spurt to edge out the Central High Panthers, 19-13.

It was Bob "Rabbit" Helmer, a dynamic little 139-pound halfback that sparked the Dragons to the quarterfinal win, scoring all three of the Dallas touchdowns, one on a sensational 90-yard kickoff run-back in the second quarter. This run did much to give life to the faltering Dragons and helped greatly to dampen the fine first half showing by the spirited Panthers.

A packed crowd of 4500 fans jammed Kreason Field and saw the underdog Centrals hold a lead until the final four minutes of the game.

Central started their first scoring march in the second quarter. A Dallas punt hit another Dallas half player and Central recovered on the Dallas 19. Eight plays later Central's John Clarke crashed off-tackle to score. Clarke's attempted kick was blocked.

Another Dallas miscue started Central's second touchdown march. Larry Johnson of Central recovered a Dallas fumble on the Dallas 46. Quarterback Mark Nelson threw two long passes to set up the touchdown, one for 25 yards to Tom Alsip and another for 13 yards to Larry Johnson. A Dallas 15-yard penalty moved the ball to the 2-yard mark and Clarke smashed center to bring Central's final TD. Clarke booted the PAT.

The next play proved to be the turning point of the game when Helmer took the Dallas kickoff on his own 10 and raced 90 yards to score. The tricky little halfback twisted away from a half dozen would-be tacklers before reaching the goal line. Don Head attempted to run over the conversion but failed.

The third quarter was a back and forth battle between the two clubs, mostly in the middle of the field and featuring hard line plays on both sides with only one pass breaking up the line backs.

A fumble by Clarke was recovered by the Dragons' Lloyd Fisher in the fourth quarter on the Central 30. Four plays later Helmer scored on a reverse play that caught Central flat-footed as the halfback scampered around left end without being touched. Al

Willamette 'Crucial' Today

Coyotes Foe For NW Title

Homecoming Event
Slated for 2 p.m.

A "give-all-you-got" football game between Willamette's Bearcats and the College of Idaho Coyotes at 2 p.m. today at McCulloch Stadium will end the regular gridiron season for the two schools and may decide the Northwest Conference championship for the Coyotes or a tie for the Bearcats.

The game will cap the Homecoming Weekend for Coach Ted Ogdahl's Willamette team which hopes to hand the Coyotes their first defeat in conference play this year, a victory which would give both teams a 4-1 season record and a co-championship. Lewis & Clark, which also boasts a 3-1 record, could gain a one-third share of the championship laurels by defeating Pacific in their game today.

This battle for the conference crown will climax the season for the two squads and features nine ball players who have earned mentions by the Associated Press regional Little All American board.

The nine are College of Idaho's Joe Kahahawai, guard, R. C. Owens, end, Bill Kundrat, end, Gary Collins, halfback, and Willamette's Dean Benson, end, Bob Dyer, guard, Andy George, guard, Windy Squire, halfback, and George Barsley, fullback.

Squire, however, won't be playing today because of injuries.

Willamette's main problem today will be stopping the pass-savvy Owens, who leads the nation's small colleges in this division. Last week quarterback Bobby Sloan tossed 15 complete passes to Owens for 235 yards and three touchdowns against the Seattle Ramblers.

To help stop the Sloan-to-Owens combination, Ogdahl might start Jerry McCallister at halfback. McCallister, brother of End Phil McCallister, twice helped to set up touchdowns for the Bearcats on pass interceptions against the College of Puget Sound last Saturday.

The Coyotes will hold a definite weight advantage over the smaller Bearcats, with the Idaho line averaging 216 pounds to the local team's 186. But if the Willamette line plays with the drive displayed by Tackle Dale Greenlee, Center Ken Cooper and Guard Andy George in the CPS game, the Coyotes will find a stone wall on any line-busting plays.

This will be the final game for Willamette starting seniors Phil McCallister and Norm Dversdahl, ends; George and Bob Dyer, guards; Cooper, center; and John Kent, halfback. Mike Hovis, reserve end, will be seeing final action also.

Willamette's offensive thrust will be led by Quarterback Harv Nefendorf, whose signal-calling netted three touchdowns in the first quarter of the CPS game. Rounding out the backfield are Bobby Zoelch, the scrappy 135-pound halfback, Kent and Barsley.

Spurts of action in today's game may come from the limited playing expected from End Dean Benson and Halfback Lou Loffland, both of whom are partly recovered from injuries but not expected to see full-time action. Benson's pass grabbing ability and Loffland's ball-packing talents could be well used by the Willamettes.

The track would be managed by David K. Funk, who is connected with a syndicate that operates tracks at Phoenix and Tucson, Ariz., and Tijuana, Mexico.

Applicants are R. E. Toner, Archie Weinstein, Reeves Taylor, George P. Hitchcock, Spencer R. Collins and Ralph Parr.

Cost of the project, which would include stands seating about 6,000, would be \$320,000.

Fumbles Hurt PIL Champs

Juran, Scheidel Lead Saxons to Semi-Final

The South Salem Saxons capitalized on fumble-stricken Jefferson High School errors in a wild third quarter, scoring 19 points in that period and a 26 to 0 state playoff quarter final victory over the visiting Democrats last night at Waters Field. Held to a narrow 7-0 halftime margin by the scrappy Portlanders, Coach Lee Gustafson's potent South High crew

completely dominated play in the third stanza, permitting the Demos but six plays during that 12-minute stretch while putting the game on ice with three crowd-pleasing scoring thrusts.

The win puts a Salem team into the semi-finals for the second consecutive season. The Saxons will take on Beaverton next week at a location to be selected. The South record for the year now stands at nine wins and one tie. Jefferson had 7-1 going into last night's mix.

Gustafson's squad opened scoring in the first canto, taking the kickoff and marching to the Demo goal in a little over five minutes. Actually, the visitors snapped up the ball on their own six when La-Moyne Mapes fumbled, but the Jeff control of the pigskin lasted for only one play as Ed Keech fell on another fumble on the eight. Three plays later Mapes drove over from the two for the game's first TD, and the near capacity crowd let out a shout of glee. Quarterback Herb Juran, who was playing despite a severe case of poison oak, split the uprights for the seventh point.

Coach Tom DeSylvia's Portland City champs then put together their best drive of the night and deepest penetration of Salem territory. Starting from their own 35 following the kickoff, the Demos rolled to the Saxon eight-yard line before the combination of an illegal use of hands penalty and a stiffened Sax defense put a halt to the advance, and the locals took over on downs on their own 31. Key to the Jeff success on this penetration of Salem real estate was the passing of Quarterback Harold Noel. Halfback Harvey Garnett also contributed mightily with a 12-yard dash around end. South High defensive strength was found in Larry Newcome, Bob Smith, Lee Rosen and Bob Beals.

The second quarter was scoreless and threatless as far as penetrations were concerned, neither team being able to get within the enemy 35 with but one notable exception. Late in the half Juran began to unlimber his passing arm, and on the next to the last play before intermission hit Neal Scheidel on the Jefferson seven from the 35. However, it all went for naught as time ran out before the end zone could be reached.

Then came the fatal third stanza for the Portlanders. After being held for three plays following the second half kickoff the Demos punted to the host 28. It took just five plays for Juran to mastermind a touchdown, doing the tallying himself on a two yard sneak. Big gainers in this thrust were a 13 yard pass to Phil Burkland, followed immediately by a 44 yard completion to Scheidel. Only a last ditch tackle by Larry Novinger stopped Scheidel short of the goal. Following the TD Juran's try for point was wide. 5:40 had elapsed in the half.

The ensuing kickoff reception meant only one scrimmage play for the visitors as Salem recovered a fumble on the Jeff 40. Two plays later the Sax were on the 45, so Juran lofted another aerial to Scheidel and the fleet back took it all the way this time. This tally
