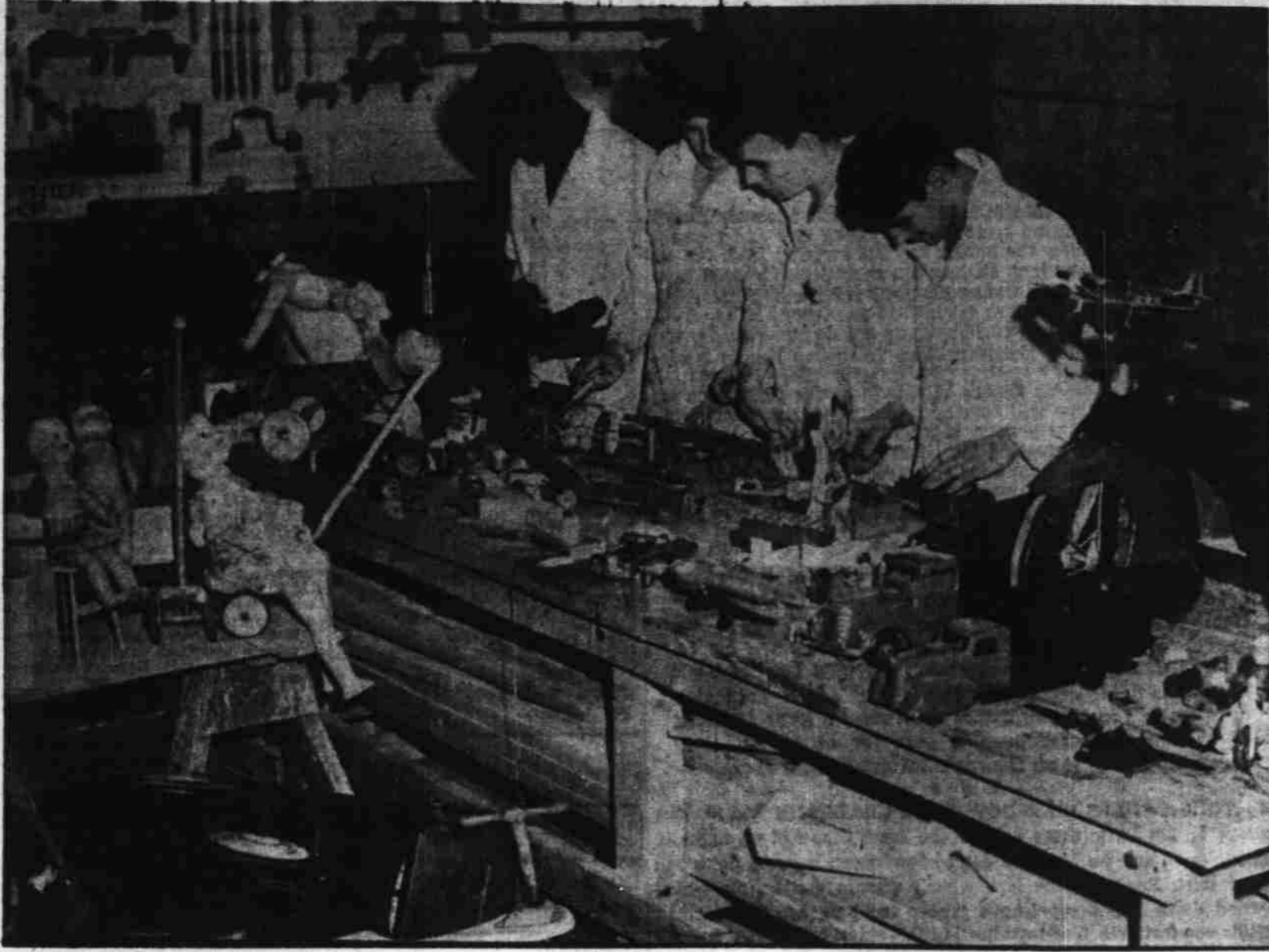


Meter Feeding Still Much in Evidence, Salem Check Shows

OSC Director Wins Honor

CORVALLIS — A ruby award for distinguished service to agriculture and rural life has been given Frank L. Ballard, associate director of the agricultural extension service at Oregon State College.

The award is presented annually to one member of Epsilon Sigma Phi, national honorary extension organization. Selection is made by vote of the fraternity's 51 local chapters in this country, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

Except for a period in 1940-41 when he was president of OSC, Ballard has been with the Oregon extension service since 1917. After graduating from OSC in 1916, he became extension specialist in rural organization and agricultural economics.

Since 1933 he has served on many state and national committees concerned with bettering agriculture and rural life. Ballard is also a frequent contributor to many local, regional and national farm publications.

He has authored one book, "The Spirit and Philosophy of Extension Work," published in 1932 by the U. S. department of agriculture and Epsilon Sigma Phi.

3 Professors At OSC Win Study Grants

CORVALLIS — Three mathematics professors at Oregon State College have been awarded grants totaling nearly \$30,000 for industrial and government research during the coming year.

Dr. A. T. Lonseth has received an additional grant of \$16,850 from the U. S. army ordnance corps to continue a study started three years ago on solution of integral equations.

For mathematical studies on focusing of sound in water with lenses, Dr. Roy B. Saunders was given \$5,000 for the second year by the office of naval research, U. S. Navy.

Dr. W. M. Stone and a graduate research associate, Robert L. Brock, were granted \$8,000 by Eoing Airplane company of Seattle. This project, in its second year, is on statistical problems involved in the design and development of radar and other electronic instruments.

For mathematical studies on focusing of sound in water with lenses, Dr. Roy B. Saunders was given \$5,000 for the second year by the office of naval research, U. S. Navy.

WEST GERMAN III AFTER RIOT, AVOIDS PARLEY

OBERNBURG, Germany (AP) — West German Defense Commissioner Theodor Blank, who was slugged and injured at an Augsburg rally Wednesday night, failed to appear at an election campaign meeting here Thursday night.

A speaker said he was absent for "reasons of health." Other political colleagues suggested he stayed away to avoid a demonstration here.

A near riot followed the announcement of his absence and forced organizers to end the rally ahead of schedule. Scores of people climbed chairs to speak up against the defense commissioner who had been billed as star speaker for Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's Christian Democratic Party and its Western rearmament program.

Blank was struck by a thrown beer glass and beaten with a club Wednesday night and was seen bleeding from a head wound when police escorted him out of Augsburg meeting hall.

At almost all places where he spoke, Blank was faced by a multitude of hecklers. Augsburg police said they believed the riot was organized by Communist squads. In Obernburg, observers said most of the jeering was done by Socialists who had come to the rally by bus loads.

BANK MERGER APPROVED BY STOCK HOLDERS

PORTLAND (AP) — Merger of the Commercial Bank of Oregon, which has 11 branches, and the Bank of Albany, Ore., with the statewide U.S. National Bank was approved by U.S. National's stockholders Friday.

The other two banks already had approved the merger, and the federal comptroller of currency has tentatively authorized it. Formal federal approval is expected soon.

U.S. National stockholders also enlarged the bank's board to 23, voting membership to R. W. Well and Lester Ireland, both of Hillsboro, Ore.

The Jaycees will distribute the repaired articles.

Like North Pole

The L. E. Darling Unit looks very much like Santa's workshop at the North Pole. Piles of old toys lie on one side. On the other side are bright new looking playthings. In between is a workbench surrounded by boys.

According to vocational instructor Richard McAnnally, each boy selects the toy he wishes to repair. Then he does everything that needs to be done to it. Some playthings require only a fresh coat of paint.

Others need much more—new wheels for a cart, new wings for a small airplane, new fenders for a tricycle. One enterprising lad started with four wheels and built a truck.

"The boys really enjoy the work," McAnnally said. Each one selects the colors he will paint a toy and the supplies he will use to repair it.

The toymending project is part of the Christmas activities at the boys' school. Co-chairmen of the overall program are Don Barrett and Claire MacMillan. Walt Scarborough Jr. is chairman of the toy committee for the Jaycees and sharing direction of the project is Robert L. Sawtelle, Jaycee president.
