

GIs' Case Speeded In U.N.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (U.P.)—The U.N. Steering Committee beat down Soviet opposition Monday and recommended, 10-2, that the Assembly begin urgent debate Wednesday on the case of 11 United States airmen held by Red China on espionage charges.

Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., chief American delegate who had requested immediate action by the 60-nation Assembly, told the committee that "We in the United Nations cannot let these men down. They are United Nations men. They were sent to Korea by the United Nations."

Shortly before the Steering Committee met, Lodge and the 15 U.N. allies of the United States in Korea agreed on a resolution.

It was reported they would ask the Assembly to call on Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld to use "unremitting efforts" to obtain the release of the men and report back to the Assembly by Dec. 31.

Jacob A. Malik, Soviet ambassador to Britain, assailed the American request for Assembly action and said it had been done because someone had found it necessary to find an incident to increase international tension.

Lodge immediately answered with a strong rejection of that idea.

Lodge lashed at the contention of Malik and Jiri Nosek, Czechoslovak delegate, that the men were spies and had so confessed.

Lodge said that the Soviet admission that the men were captured in uniform revealed "the whole falsity of the Communist stand."

"When did a spy go around dressed in the uniform of his country?" Lodge demanded.

Interest High In Polk Water Project Meet

INDEPENDENCE — Keen interest was shown Monday night at Central High School auditorium by Polk County farmers in the proposed 20,000-acre irrigation project.

Questionnaires returned to the Polk County Water Development Committee, sponsors of the meeting, indicated a unanimous desire for irrigation water by some 120 farmers attending the meeting.

A second meeting will be held at Rickreall Grange Hall at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, to determine the interest of the area's farmers unable to attend the Monday night session.

Although no definite figures were available on the cost of irrigation under the project, it was indicated that the expense in this area would run much lower than in arid regions farther inland.

The proposed Polk County project would irrigate 20,000 acres on 500 farms with Willamette River water through a canal serving a triangular area bounded by Buena Vista, Dallas and Brunk's Corners on the Salem-Dallas Highway. This area would include Independence and Monmouth.

A summary of questionnaires circulated at the two irrigation meetings this week will be submitted to the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation by Chairman Glenn Hogg and his water development committee. If the report indicates enough interest in the proposal, the U. S. bureau probably would ask Congress for funds to conduct a survey on feasibility of the irrigation plan.

County Agent John Hansen told the farmers at last night's meeting that irrigation would increase farmland yield and crop variety. The proposed district for irrigation includes approximately 500 farm properties.

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Mrs. McDonald Dies in Canada

Mrs. J. A. McDonald, mother of Miss Lillian McDonald, ex-superintendent of Salem General Hospital, died Sunday afternoon, it was learned in Salem Monday night.

Mrs. McDonald, who had many friends in Salem, died in Nelson, B. C. Lillian was with her at the time of death.

Lillian was superintendent of Salem General Hospital for 25 years before retiring last summer. Another daughter, Mrs. Jesse McDonald, at one time lived in Salem.

Chou Says U.S. Creates Danger of New War

TOKYO (U.P.)—Premier Chou En-Lai of Communist China asserted Monday that U. S. policy—including the defense treaty with Nationalist China—has "created the danger of a new war."

A Chinese language broadcast quoted Chou as saying "The Chinese people will liberate Taiwan (Formosa) without fail." The official English translation broadcast by Peiping was milder, saying the Chinese people "are determined to liberate Taiwan."

SAN FRANCISCO (U.P.)—San Francisco's Board of Supervisors voted Monday to invite the United Nations to return to its birthplace next June for its tenth anniversary.

CD Exercise To Test Road Block System

The day after an atomic attack will be the theme of a civil defense test today in which Salem city police and Marion County sheriff's deputies will go to four traffic control points in this area and report on how long it took them to get there.

The four control points involved are the west end of the Marion Street bridge, and Highway 99E and Pine Street, both to be handled by city police; 99E and Talbot Road, Cherry Avenue and North River Road, both to be covered by sheriff's deputies.

These would be sites where traffic would be halted if an atomic attack were actually to come. Traffic will not be stopped today. Officers will leave for the points when alerted.

The test will cover all states west of the Rocky Mountains, and Hawaii. Oregon will operate within the framework of the day after an atomic attack in which the city of Portland was the target. The first phase of the test was carried out June 14, when Portland was theoretically attacked.

"Operation Second Phase" covers a period of 24 to 48 hours after the attack. It will be concerned with the dispersal and evacuation of the Portland area and the effect this has on civil defense planning throughout the state.

Boat Smashed By Freighter, Youth Saved

POWELL RIVER, B.C. (U.P.)—Twelve-year-old Fred Ilott told tearfully Monday how he clung to a flimsy raft in ice-cold water four hours after a small tugboat was cut in half by an Italian freighter's whirling propeller.

His father, George Ilott, 35; Gray B. Levae, 50, Powell River port superintendent; and George G. Crooks, 50, all of Powell River, were missing and believed lost. The boy was on the docks Saturday night when the 7,000-ton freighter Giovanni Amodea called for a pilot.

He persuaded his father, a relief skipper on the tug Teeshoe, to let him go along as they took out the pilot. They reached the freighter and then started back ashore.

"Then there was a crash and splintering," he recalled. "I think we must have got under the freighter's propeller because she was unloaded and high out of the water."

Either his father or Levae put a lifebelt over the boy's head and he and Levae got a raft overboard. The last he saw of his father was an attempt with Crooks to launch a lifeboat.

A wave washed them off the raft, and Levae disappeared. The raft capsized about midnight, but he struggled back aboard. He lost consciousness, but later swam ashore through the darkness to an island eight miles north of Powell River.

Collapsing, he slept till dawn. He then staggered across the island and reached some houses Sunday forenoon as a tug landed with search parties.

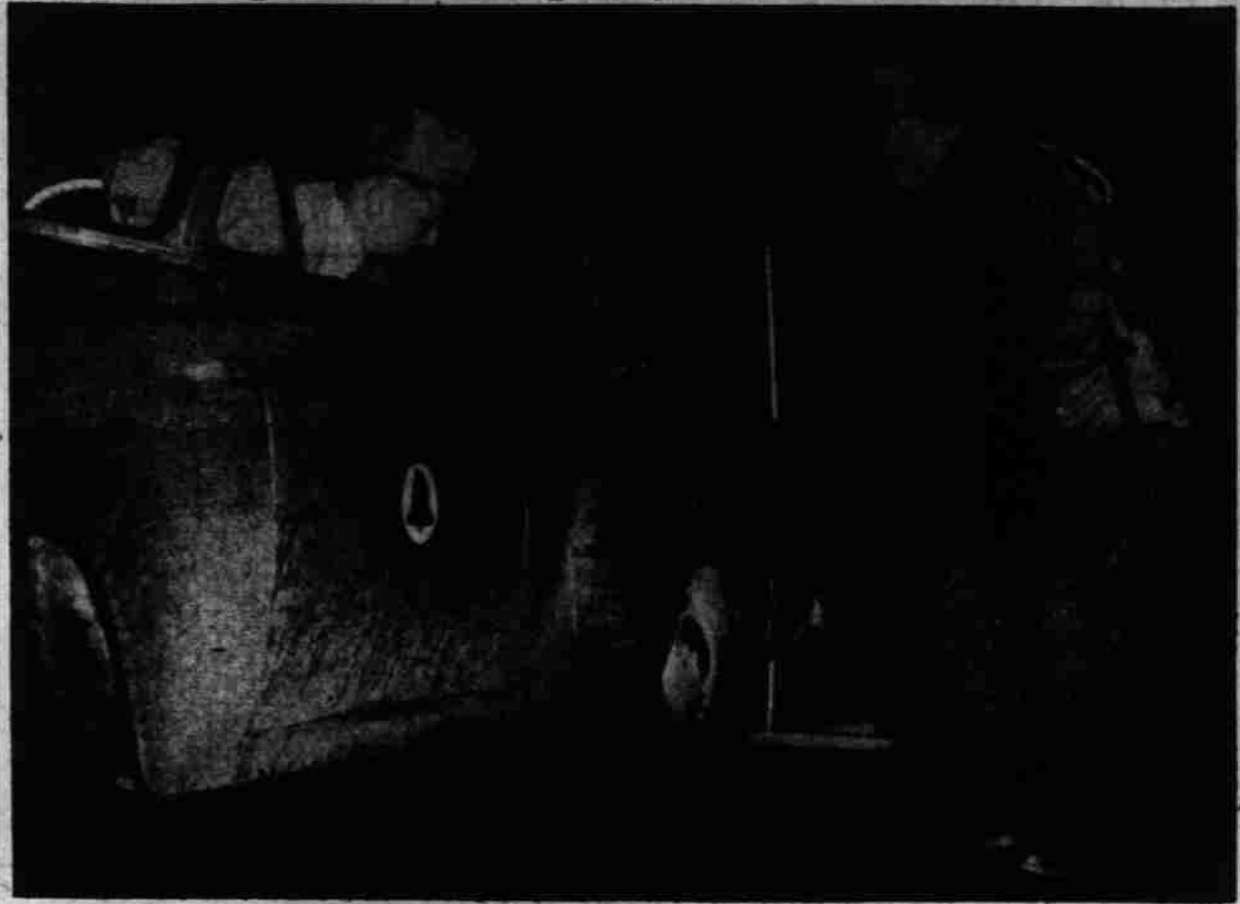
Y's Men Observe 6th Anniversary

Improvement Of Pope Pius 'Continuing'

VATICAN CITY (U.P.)—Pope Pius XII had coffee and broth Monday. He ate three times and managed to keep down the food in the most heartening development since his physical collapse last Thursday.

His hiccups are becoming lighter and less frequent. His brief periods of rest are growing longer and less fitful.

At 8 p.m. Monday night, Msgr. Angelo dell'Acqua, substitute secretary of state, announced:

"We are happy to report that just now the holy father's physicians have advised that his slow, gradual improvement continues."

But the 78-year-old head of the Roman Catholic Church remains seriously ill. His strength is growing very slowly, although steadily.

The Pope is not enjoying the complete rest ordered by his physicians, for he insists on carrying on his work even during this worst illness of his 15-year reign.

Monday the Vatican announced that by radio from his sickbed the Pope will give his blessings "urbis et orbi"—to the city and the world—to close the Marian Year on Wednesday.

Plane Crash Report Under Investigation

A Southern Pacific brakeman's report that he saw a plane waver in the air, then descend very rapidly in flames two miles south of Divide, Ore., was being investigated "late Monday night" by aeronautics authorities.

The brakeman reported what he saw to the Southern Pacific dispatcher, who relayed the information to air rescue units.

The brakeman said he saw the plane at 6:05 p.m. The locale is some seven miles southwest of Cottage Grove. A military plane from Seattle, headed toward Medford, had not been heard from for some time at the time of the brakeman's report, but it later landed safely at Medford.

No planes were reported missing in the area and no search had been planned late Monday night. Earl Snyder, director of the state board of aeronautics, and George Douglas, safety inspector for the board, were both in Medford Monday night and could not be reached for comment.

They had been notified of the report, it was understood.

Honduras Law Forces Dictator Role on Lozano

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (U.P.)—A mild-mannered, 60-year-old accountant Monday became Honduras' dictator by the law of the land.

Vice President Julio Lozano, a man who has had a successful career in business and government, became constitutional dictator at midnight because Congress failed to pick a President after no party won a majority in the October national election.

The change in governmental form took place quietly, with troops and police guarding strategic points.

Lozano now controls the executive, legislative, and judicial branches of the government for an indefinite period — probably two years.

Grasping his unsought responsibilities firmly, he broadcast to the country early Monday he had decreed himself chief of state and named the newly elected Congress as an advisory council.
