**Oscar Diarmit Succumbs to Long Illness**

Oscar Diarmit, 71, a resident of Salem for about 15 years, died Saturday night at a Salem hospital after a long illness.

Born in Kentucky on April 4, 1883, he came to Oregon in 1914 and resided for a number of years in the Corvallis area, where he engaged in sawmill work. He and his family came to Salem in 1938.

He was a guard for a time at the State Prison and later was employed in the sawmill division of Oregon Pulp and Paper Co. He retired in 1945 after suffering an injury at the mill. Mr. Diarmit also was employed for a time in a sawmill at Scotts Mills.

He was a member of the Holiness Church of Salem.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Fannie Diarmit of Salem; three daughters, Mrs. Helen Fetters of Eugene and Mrs. Eileen Salchenberg and Mrs. Doris Hamilton, both of Salem; a son, Merle Diarmit of Scotts Mills; sisters, Mrs. Effie Dunn, Mrs. Mattie Stockdale and Mrs. Leota Williams, all of Kentucky; a brother, Paul Diarmit of Texas; and six grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at Howell-Edwards chapel Wednesday at 1:30 p.m. Interment will follow at Miller cemetery near Silverton.

## 'Bootleg' Milk Sale Still Illegal

You still can't bootleg milk. Repeal of the milk control act last month had nothing to do with sanitation laws. The state milk sanitation laws are just as much in force today as they were before the election.

These are statements of Tom Bailey, Salem, fieldman in Salem district for the state department of agriculture's division of foods and dairies.

"Some people have the idea that all controls on the sale of milk went out the window when the voters downed the milk control act," Bailey says. "Many people, including some dairymen, seem to think milk can now be sold without any restrictions."

**Illegal Sales**  
Milk sold by producers who are not under state license and inspection (or city inspection, if the sales are in Portland, Klamath Falls, Astoria, Salem, Eugene or Medford) is just as illegal now as it has been since the Oregon fluid milk law was enacted some years ago. This is the law, according to Bailey, that governs sanitation or milk intended for human consumption; it has no connection with price control.

Uninspected milk may offer a real health hazard, according to the state man. Certainly there may be more danger involved in purchasing milk over-the-fence from a neighbor or friend whose cows are not tested or dairy premises not checked regularly for sanitation.

And to clinch this statement, Bailey says, reports given by department officials at a division conference which he attended in Salem last week are a case in point.

**Dairies Investigated**  
Two dairies—both heretofore unlicensed and so not inspected—have come under investigation as possible sources of two recent cases of highly contagious diseases. In one a disease carrier working in a dairy was the apparent source of contagion. Anyone who produces milk to sell for human consumption must have his dairy premises, his

equipment, and his cows inspected and tested as part of the state program.

All fluid milk sold, the representative says, must be labeled as to grade—either A, B or C. The difference in grades is mostly a matter of bacteria, premise and equipment required.

Bulk of fluid milk now used is Grade A. Many cities, including Salem, do not permit the sale of any fluid milk (commonly known as bottle milk) that is not Grade A.
