The U. S. News & World Report prints, along with the Rolander memo, a rebuttal by the Alsops, who say Rolander's presentation "is more marked by bias than ver-

They also say Rolander's "carelessness with the known facts," as they put it, gives final proof that the Oppenheimer proceeding was "a blindly partisan prosecution."

The dispute is whether the land should be considered part of the Oregon and California Railroad land grant or part of Forest Service land. The money comes from sale of timber on the land. "The counties ask no interest


