Council Will Regulate Cabs At Woodburn

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WOODBURN — An ordinance to regulate taxicabs and cab drivers was introduced at the City Council meeting here Tuesday night.

The ordinance would require cab owners to have permits and provide for standards of inspection and insurance. Action on passing the ordinance will await the Jan. 18 council meeting.

The council also passed four ordinances, two of which concern the revised state traffic and driver's license code. A third provides for the impounding and sale of abandoned motor vehicles. The fourth new ordinance extends the additional 35c per month sewer surcharge to the Hardcastle-Lincoln Sewage District effective Jan. 20.

The council authorized final payment to the contractor for the Hardcastle-Lincoln sewer improvements.

The rise in enrollment continues the trend which began with the fall term when several new programs were introduced at OCE. Included are general studies, high school teacher preparation and a pre-professional curricula.
