Complainant in the case, Robert Sutherland, 539 N. Winter St., was shot in the foot early Tuesday morning. He made a citizen's arrest of Wesley Lee Carter, who is accused of the crime, at the city police station.

Carter had been brought to the station by police for questioning. The shooting allegedly occurred in front of a house at 1560 S. 18th St.

Carter, 32, lives at 4370 Auburn Rd. His preliminary examination is set for Jan. 12 in district court.

Man Bound to Grand Jury on Check Charge

Robert Sharpe, 21, Vancouver, Wash., was bound over to the Marion County Grand Jury Wednesday in district court on a charge of forgery.

He is accused of forging a check passed at a Salem drug store. Officers said he told them that he picked a name at random from a telephone book.

The check was for \$23. He was arrested at a local department store Monday, where city police said he attempted to pass a similar check, and lodged in jail on a vagrancy charge.

The forgery warrant was served to him there Tuesday. He has been transferred to the county jail.

A 19-year-old Lebanon girl, who has pleaded guilty to larceny, was placed on probation for six months by Judge Edward O. Stadler Jr. in district court Wednesday.

Four Timber Tracts Sold to High Bidders

Four timber tracts in Oregon, estimated to total 3,097,000 board feet, have been sold to high bidders by the Bureau of Land Management. Buyers cast bids of \$76,968 for the timber.

The timber auctioned at Salem Tuesday is located in Benton, Lane, Linn and Tillamook counties.

Successful bidders were: Western Milling Co., Corvallis, which submitted the high sealed bid of \$39,218 for 1,479,000 board feet in a tract near Alsea; Alsea Lumber Co., Alsea, high oral bidder for a tract of 283,000 board feet on Preacher Creek in Lane County; Clear Lumber Co., Sweet Home, whose bid of \$25,584 topped four other firms for 940,000 board feet of timber in Linn County; and Diamond Lumber Co., Portland, which paid \$8,486 for 395,000 board feet of timber in Tillamook County.

All of the tracts sold consisted primarily of salvage timber, including fire-killed, windthrown, and insect-damaged timber as well as usable material remaining from previous log operations.

The bureau received no bids for 58,000 board feet of timber in Clackamas County. Bids may be submitted for a period of 90 days, unless the timber is sold sooner, at not less than the appraised price of \$1.131.

Six tracts of timber estimated to contain 2,661,000 board feet will be offered for bids Feb. 1. The tracts have been appraised at \$54,431.

Market News

Office Eyed For Potatoes

A shipping point market news office may be established in the Klamath basin in time for the 1955 potato crop movement, George Grange, deputy director of the fruit and vegetable division activity in the Federal Agriculture Department in Washington, D.C., advised the State Agricultural Department Wednesday.

Definite decision on this field service depends upon obtaining federal funds and also on working out cooperative agreements in Oregon and California, Grange said.

He expressed hope, however, that the Central Oregon potato production may be tied into any market news offices that may be opened in the Klamath area. He said this would give seasonal reporting services in all three major potato producing areas in Oregon. Malheur County is now tied into an office set up in adjacent Idaho potato centers.

Grange, on a visit to Salem, conferred with officials of the State Agriculture Department.

Judge Rules Insanity Plea Not in Order

A Texas man, who has pleaded innocent by reason of insanity to a \$7,500 theft here was adjudged able Wednesday to understand the proceedings against him.

The ruling was made by Judge George R. Duncan in Marion County Circuit Court.

The man, Jack Lee Taylor, has been under observation at the Oregon State Hospital.

A psychiatrist there told the court that Taylor understood the nature of the charge and was able to assist in his own defense.

Two other doctors participated in the examination. Taylor and Dilard Hedge, Hobbs, N. M., are charged with larceny in connection with the theft last September of \$7,500 from Erickson's South Salem Market.

Taylor will go to trial next Monday, Hedge on Jan. 17.

Stabbing Puts Falls City Man In Hospital

FALLS CITY—An early-morning stabbing placed George B. O'Neal, 41, a Falls City logger, in Dallas Hospital Wednesday.

Polk County Sheriff Tony Neufeldt and District Attorney Walter Foster said they are conducting an investigation of the stabbing. O'Neal's wife, Virginia, 36, was questioned by the sheriff.

Neufeldt said Wednesday night no criminal charges had been filed in the case. O'Neal reportedly told hospital attendants the stabbing was accidental.

A physician who treated the injured man said he had sustained several cuts about the chest. He said they appeared to have been inflicted with a butcher knife. None of the wounds was critical, the doctor said.

O'Neal's condition was described as satisfactory Wednesday night. He was brought to the Dallas Hospital about 3:30 a.m. by the Dallas City Ambulance. Mr. and Mrs. O'Neal live in the French Apartments in Falls City.
