60 Accused of Violating Farm Laws in 1954

Sixty court actions, including the first arrest in 12 years under the state seed act, were filed against persons accused of violating the agricultural laws last year, the State Agricultural Department announced Thursday.

Fifty defendants pleaded guilty, four forfeited bail totaling \$125, and one case was dismissed. One defendant stood trial and was found guilty and four pleas were pending at the end of the year.

Bulk of the cases involved alleged violation of Oregon food laws with fines assessed by the courts aggregating \$1100.

Basis of other complaints involved larceny of livestock or selling milk while the state license was suspended 4, misrepresenting weight of a commodity 1, operating without a meat dealer's license 3, misbranding onions 1 and operating without a produce dealer's license 3.

Three men drew penitentiary sentences for larceny of livestock, two received three months in jail, and two others are waiting sentence. Two have not entered pleas.

The charge under the seed law involved a farmer who admitted failure to label agricultural seed and failure to label mixed seed. The department report showed that district attorneys issued 18 warnings on hamburger violations, two on frozen desserts and two on mislabeled milk.

The department handed out 22 regulatory warnings to produce and seed dealers.

In the dairy field investigations uncovered 18 dairies selling milk without a state license and sanitary inspection and two selling milk from herds which had not been tested. Dairy suspensions during the year involved bacteria count excessive 119, sanitation violations 18, sediment 1, and temperature violations 2.

The department seized 677 cases of canned whole milk, later released for pet food sales, and 30 dozen of eggs released after being correctly labeled.

Man Taken Into Custody At Airport

A man about to take an airliner from Salem airport Thursday was taken into custody by city detectives and later held on a Multnomah County warrant charging obtaining property by false pretenses.

A gun purchased a short time before at a Salem firm put police on the trail of James Dehebert, 35, who gave Coos Bay as his address.

Officers said they were notified that a man had purchased a Luger pistol at the firm "under suspicious circumstances." A quick check was made of transportation outlets and Dehebert was picked up at the airport where a Luger was found in a traveling bag, according to detectives.

Officers said an assumed name was used in making the purchases of both the gun and a plane ticket.

A check at police headquarters disclosed that Dehebert was wanted on a John Doe warrant from Multnomah County. The warrant charges the man with writing a worthless \$1,200 check for purchase of a car.

Credit Group Makes Final Debt Payment

Final payment on a \$250,000 obligation to the U. S. government was announced Thursday by H. A. Barnes, Silverton, president of the Willamette Production Credit Association, when a check for \$10,000 was forwarded to the Farm Credit Administration in Spokane.

The credit association was organized in 1934 during the depression for the purpose of extending credit to farmers and stockmen for producing crops and livestock. The federal government put up \$250,000 of capital stock at that time with the provision that it be returned as ownership of the association increased in the hands of individual farmers.

"This payment culminates 21 years of constant effort directed toward placing Willamette Production Credit on a farmer-owned and managed basis," Barnes said, in making his announcement. "During this time we have paid all expenses, taken all losses and built up substantial reserves out of loan income."

"During this time not one dollar of government money has been loaned, but has been used only to provide adequate capitalization." Year-end figures were released at the same time by P. M. Brandt Jr., secretary-manager of the association.

Paid-in capital owned by 1,058 farmer stockholders is \$316,000, while reserves now total \$374,000. Loans outstanding on Dec. 31 were \$2,101,000, according to Brandt. Total advances in 1954 amount to over \$3,125,000.

Much of the credit for the successful development of the cooperative credit organization was given to three directors who have served continuously since organization by Barnes.

These are John W. Ramage, Woodburn; George H. Fullenwider, Carlton, and E. W. McMinden, Astoria. The other director, E. A. McCormack, Eugene, has served since 1947.

The annual stockholders meeting was set for Jan. 22 at the Marion Hotel. More than 400 stockholders are expected.

Bond Promoted to Highway Bureau Job in Tillamook

John A. Bond, 29, State Highway Department assistant maintenance office engineer in Salem, was promoted this week to district maintenance engineer with headquarters at Tillamook.

Bond fills a new position necessitated by a gradual increase in maintenance operations in Northwest Oregon. Some of the area of existing districts has been combined in to the new district. State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock said.

Bond's new position will involve responsibility for maintenance of 270 miles of highway and supervision of 40 employees.

Bond's replacement here will be John A. Phillips who has been promoted from a draftsman in Portland to the Salem maintenance position.

Traffic Toll High in 1954

Oregon traffic accidents resulted in 412 fatalities during 1954, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry reported Thursday.

This is an increase of 22 over the 1953 total and may go higher provided persons now listed as injured should die or if delayed reports are received.

The higher death record, Newberry said, was recorded in spite of substantial decreases in the number of persons injured and total accidents of all types. Through November, injuries and accidents were running approximately 20 per cent below those reported at the same time a year ago.

There were 36 multiple-death accidents during the year with a total of 91 fatalities.

Worst months of the year were October and December in each of which 46 fatalities were recorded as compared with 35 and 34 during the same months in 1953.
