Local Nut Makes Good

Filbert, Civilized Cousin of Oldtime Hazelut, Popular Here, Elsewhere

While we fully appreciate the delights of walnuts as an adjunct to good recipes, we'd like to put in a good word or two for filberts. We found New Englanders to be more appreciative of our filberts (hazel nuts to them) than most westerners. Just because we know them so well, many fail to use filberts as often in cooking as they should.

We find a recipe for a torte using Hazelnuts in one of our favorite cookbooks, and are willing to bet that it will be just that much better with Oregon filberts. It's a big recipe but can be cut down.

HAZELNUT TORTE

$\frac{3}{4}$ pound powdered sugar $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt
10 eggs 1 tablespoon flavoring
 $\frac{1}{2}$ pound hazelnuts or 1 tablespoon dry breadcrumbs
filberts

Cream sugar with yolks and nuts, which have been ground up, salt and flavoring and stir until light and foamy. Beat egg whites stiff, fold into mixture, along with the crumbs. Butter a spring form pan generously, sprinkle lightly with bread crumbs and pour batter into it. Bake in a moderate oven for 40 to 50 minutes. When cake is ready cool, split it and fill with 1 cup whipped cream flavored to taste with sugar, vanilla and coffee, and mix with 1 tablespoon ground hazelnuts or filberts. The finished torte may be glazed with confectioners sugar icing or sprinkled with powdered sugar.

Almost any recipe that does for walnuts, but especially for those importations—almonds, should do for filberts. They won't always produce exactly the same results, but you'll find that costs will be lower than in the case of almonds.

The old friend, cranberry-orange relish looks like this with filberts:

FILBERT CRANBERRY RELISH

$\frac{1}{2}$ cup coarsely chopped filberts 1 cup water
1 cup sugar 2 cups cranberries
Toast and chop filberts coarsely. Grind whole orange. Combine sugar and water; heat to boiling and boil for 5 minutes. Add cranberries and cook until the skins pop, about 5 minutes. Remove from heat and add the orange and the filberts. Makes 3 cups.

They'll go into muffins nicely too, try them in this one that takes oil for shortening and is speedy to mix.

FILBERT WHOLE WHEAT MUFFINS

$\frac{3}{4}$ cup coarsely chopped filberts 3 teaspoons baking powder
4 egg yolks or 2 whole eggs 1 teaspoon salt
1 cup milk $\frac{1}{4}$ cup sliced dates
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup salad oil $\frac{1}{2}$ cup honey
Combine beaten egg yolks with milk and oil. Mix with other ingredients until just blended. Fill well greased and floured muffin tins $\frac{3}{4}$ full. Bake in a 400 degree oven for 25 minutes. Yield: 16 muffins.

Good old spritz cookies become even better when filberts are added to the dough:

FILBERT SPRITZ

$\frac{1}{4}$ cup very finely chopped filberts 3 egg yolks
1 cup soft butter 1 teaspoon vanilla
 $\frac{3}{4}$ cup sugar $\frac{1}{2}$ cups sifted flour
Toast and chop filberts. Combine and mix thoroughly all the ingredients except flour. Work in the flour with the hands. Force dough through a cookie press into desired shapes. Bake at 400 degrees for 7 to 10 minutes on an ungreased cookie sheet. Yield: about 6 dozen cookies.
