Money Seen Answer for World Peace

A relaxed oldtimer with a chest-length white beard and a plain black hat visited Salem Friday, saying that he travels from here to there in the interests of world peace.

Albert S. Falk, 63-year-old painter and paperhanger from Aberdeen, S. D., thinks money—more of it for the people—is the answer for world peace.

He'd like to see all nations impose a 2 per cent sales tax, then pass the money back to all citizens at about \$60 or so a month to supplement their earnings. That way, he says, nobody would go hungry and war-breeding tensions would disappear.

He spoke Wednesday at an Oregon City Lions Club, dropped in on Portland Thursday and thought he might spend a day or so in Salem. "Like to visit the Legislature next week," he said, "but thought I ought to go on to Eugene. See in the papers there will be a big preachers' meeting there Monday."

Falk travels by bus. He's been making the rounds a couple of years now.

Mrs. Latham Succumbs to Long Illness

A month-long illness proved fatal Friday at a Salem hospital for Mrs. Maude Eugene Latham, 62, a resident of Salem for the past six years.

A late resident of 5895 Portland Rd., Mrs. Latham was active in this area as an amateur painter and muralist. Her mural work included projects at Hayesville Baptist Church and Dallas Menonite Church. She was also active in the Lincoln County Art Center at Delake.

Mrs. Latham was born at Saxon, Wis., July 11, 1892, and resided in Portland for almost 40 years. She was married to O. L. Latham of Salem in 1953 and he survives her.

Other survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Pauline Van Cleave of Portland; sisters, Mrs. Grace Kallgren of Seattle, Mrs. DeChaney of Duluth, Minn., and Mrs. Ida Stone of Salem; and one grandchild.

Funeral services will be held at the W. T. Rigdon chapel Monday at 1:30 p.m. Rev. Lloyd T. Anderson will officiate and interment will follow at City View cemetery.

Youth Linked To Theft of Welfare Fund

A Salem mother had \$14 in welfare money stolen from her Thursday and investigation by city police led to the arrest of a 15-year-old boy.

The woman told officers she left her apartment briefly, while the boy remained with her two small children. She said she later discovered the money missing from a purse left in the kitchen.

Police said the arrest was made following an admission of the theft. Most of the stolen money reportedly was used to buy a pair of cords, \$3.45 being returned to the woman.

The boy was lodged in the Marion County juvenile detention ward.

Steam Prompts City Fire Alarm

Investigation indicated that an illusion of smoke was created when warm air from the store, blown through a ventilator, collided with cold outside air.

Insurance Men To Underwrite Safety Group

Salem Insurance Agents Association has agreed to underwrite costs of establishing a new teenage safety program, Safe-Teen, here.

Endorsement by the Association came Friday at the group's regular monthly meeting after they had heard Safe-Teen explained by its founder, Justice of the Peace Frances Cook, Beaverton.

Safe-Teen was launched in Beaverton late last year, and membership is open to those 16 to 19 years old or who in the "juvenile group insurance-wise."

Membership entitles drivers to a "Safe-Teen" bumper strip and a membership card. Only prerequisites for joining are a driver's license, a safety check of the driver's vehicle and a willingness to "recognize and accept the responsibilities of driving an automobile," the judge explained.

If a Safe-Teen member is convicted of a moving traffic violation, he loses his bumper strip and the presiding judge suspends membership at his own discretion. Re-instatement is possible at the end of the probationary period.

Students and principals from both public high schools, Serra Catholic High School and Salem College, and Academy attended the meeting along with Mayor Robert White, Chief of Police Clyde Warren, Municipal Judge Douglas Hay, and other interested officials.

One student, James Fillet, 908 Levens St., became Salem's first enrollee in the program at the close of the meeting. Fillet attends Serra High School.

Sid Boise, president of the Insurance Association, reported that Hillary Eitel and Earl Bourland will serve as the Association's committee to assist Safe-Teen organization here.

Student representatives who attended the meeting will report the program to their student councils for further discussion.

Payroll Total Only Slightly Under Record

Payrolls of nearly 18,000 employers covered by the unemployment law are expected to be only about 2½ per cent less than the all-time high of \$1,288,828,548 in 1953, according to preliminary tabulations of reports for the first three quarters and estimates for the final three months of the year just paid, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission reported Friday.

Despite the labor dispute shutdown of a big proportion of the timber industry during summer months and a late crop season that delayed food processing, third quarter wages dropped only about \$21,000,000 below the \$350,768,092 record set in the previous year, officials said.

Payrolls for the final three months may exceed the \$325,405,581 reported a year ago. Indications are, officials said, that the number of employees will average considerably lower for 1954 than the approximately 390,000 figure that prevailed for 1951 through 1953.

In spite of a busy fourth quarter displayed by the wood products industry because of the strong lumber market, average employment in this basic group is expected to fall several thousands short of the nearly 79,000 recorded in 1953.

Apprenticeship Chief Off to Capital Meeting

A. C. Hoggan, state apprenticeship director of the State Bureau of Labor, left Friday for Washington, D. C., to attend the joint conference of state apprenticeship agencies and the Federal Farm Bureau apprenticeship. He said consideration would be given to proposed recommendations for developing more skilled technicians needed as key men in industry.

School Tours At Legislature Advice Given

1. Do not bring school groups below the 7th grade level because we have found through experience that youngsters below that age group get very little out of the legislative procedure and add a lot to the confusion.

2. Write to the capital information office, the date and time you intend to arrive and do so as early as possible. Upon receipt of your letter we will confirm or advise you the date or time conflicts with previous appointments.

3. Upon arrival at capital report to the information desk and notify your respective senator or representative of your presence in the gallery.

4. Have at least one adult with every twenty children and keep them under proper control.

5. If the children do not intend to bring their lunches and expect to eat in the capital cafeteria advise the information desk so arrangements can be made.

Figures Show 1954 Big Year For Lebanon

LEBANON — Business activity in Lebanon during 1954 reached an all-time new high, according to Charles DeFoe, manager of the Lemanon Chamber of Commerce.

Reports received at the chamber office show records were set at the post office where postal receipts showed an increase of nearly \$6,000, increasing from \$82,921 in 1953 to a record figure of \$88,809 in 1954.

Combined bank deposits of the two Lebanon banks also reached a new high as of Jan. 1. Deposits jumped from \$13,577,000 in 1953 to \$14,200,000 last year.

A large increase in building was also noted during the past 12 months. Building permits for the city totaled \$726,000, an increase of nearly 85 per cent over the 1953 figure of \$415,343. Though 1954 total retail sales figures have not yet been released, a limited survey indicates the retail sale volume figures will greatly surpass the 1953 figure of \$17,828,000.
