## School Snack Bar Costly To District

The snack bar in Leslie Junior High School cafeteria is costing the school system three cents for every meal served there because the federal government doesn't consider ice cream a milk product, the Salem School Board learned at its meeting Tuesday night.

School Superintendent Walter Snyder reported that the school had lost its right to serve government-subsidized "class A" meals because of a government regulation prohibiting school cafeterias under the program from selling food products other than those included in the plate lunches.

Milk Not Included

The sale of milk isn't included in the prohibition, Snyder said, but milk shakes are considered in a different category. The board voted to keep the snack bar in operation and not to attempt to regain the subsidy at Leslie after learning that the cafeteria is continuing to make a small profit.

The cafeteria operates in conjunction with the cafeteria of adjoining South Salem High School. Board members said trying to serve two different kinds of meals in the cafeterias would cause needless complications.

Government subsidies remain in effect in the city's elementary schools and at Parrish Junior High School.

Basic School Fund

Snyder gave board members mimeographed booklets concerning the state's basic school support program. He said the law governing the support fund may be changed by the 1955 State Legislature and suggested that the board could make recommendations to Marion County legislators after learning how various proposals might affect the city's schools. The school board released a description of the proposed boundaries of the new Candalaria School district. The school is scheduled to open next September.

Proposed boundaries for the irregularly-shaped district would be Hoyt and Alice streets on the north, King and Dave streets and the city limits on the south. Mountain View Drive and Liberty Road on the east, and the city limits on the west.

Gus Moore, chairman of the school board, said the board would welcome comments or suggestions from residents of the affected area concerning the proposed boundaries.

Other Action

In other action at the Tuesday night meeting:

The board heard a description of streets adjoining several city schools where Snyder said hazardous traffic conditions exist. Board members said the most serious hazards are on East Rural avenue near the South Salem High School and on D Street near Parrish Junior High School. Snyder was authorized to make a study of the possibility of improving conditions in the areas discussed.

An agreement was signed authorizing Portland General Electric Co. to chop down several trees near Middle Grove School which are interfering with electric lines. The company agreed to pay the school system \$75 for permission to remove the trees.

Pose for Picture

Board members and school officials posed for a photograph to be used in the first South Salem High School yearbook.

Commencement dates for the city's two high schools were set for June 6 and 7. No decision was reached to determine which school would hold graduation ceremonies first this year.

Board secretary Connell C. Ward reported that the latest school census showed 15,451 children between 4 and 19 years old in the school district. This was an increase of 788 over last year's figure.

The board voted to furnish transportation to South Salem High School for Eleanor McCoy, 940 S. 20th St., who is recovering from polio.

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## State Dairy Association to Meet in Bend

Proposed dairy legislation will get the once-over thoroughly at the annual Oregon Dairyman's Association meeting which opens in Bend Wednesday and continues through Friday.

Five changes will be proposed during the meeting, in an effort to "bring the state's dairy laws up to date," reports H. P. Ewalt, dairy specialist, Oregon State College, who has helped plan the program for the convention.

The American Dairy Association's program to increase the sale of dairy products is scheduled for review by Ray Albert, Chicago, membership director of the ADA. Gordon Laughlin, manager of Dargold Farms, Seattle, will discuss the "self-help" program for handling surplus dairy products.

Herd improvement, health and other dairy problems, will be talked "in between" at the annual three-day meet.

## Head-on Crash Injures Two

HUBBARD — A head-on collision on the Pacific Highway south of Hubbard Tuesday afternoon sent two motorists to the hospital and resulted in extensive damage to their cars.

Hurt in the crash were Mrs. Nettie Mosherberger, 73, of Molalla

Route 3, and Harold Morgan, 48, Roseburg Route 4. Mrs. Mosherberger was admitted to Salem Memorial Hospital with a fractured jaw and deep scalp cuts. Morgan was released after being treated for face cuts.

The two drivers were taken to the hospital by Willamette Ambulance after their cars collided about 2:15 p.m. Morgan's 6-year-old son, who was riding with him, was unhurt. Mrs. Mosherberger was alone in her car.

## Plans Laid to Put Mill Pact Into Effect

SEATTLE — An employer-union conference was held here Tuesday as another step toward putting into effect the 7 1/2-cent hourly wage increase which a govern-

ment fact-finding committee recommended for lumber industry workers. The group will meet again next Monday.

Approval of the agreement has been recommended by leaders of the AFL and CIO lumber workers' unions and by the Lumbermen's Industrial Relations Committee, an employers' group.

Tuesday's session here was between representatives of the AFL Lumber & Sawmill Workers' Union, Puget Sound District, and the employers' committee. Their aim was to draft the agreement into exact terms for submission to AFL union locals and individual employers in the district extending from south of Olympia to the Canadian border. The agreement will involve about 8,000 employees in the district.

A similar meeting will be held Wednesday for door and plywood industries, involving about 7,000 workers.

## Italy Officials Arms Project From Mendes

ROME — French Premier Pierre Mendes-France spelled out his European arms pool project at a long conference Tuesday night with Italian government leaders.

They reached agreement also on immigration problems and a joint economic policy in North Africa.

At the conclusion, Foreign Minister Gaetano Martino, with Premier Mario Scelba by his side, said the three conferees had devoted most of the time to a "discussion of the future of Western Europe, with particular emphasis on the arms pool plan, and other supranational organizations."

Government quarters reported that Italy's initial impression of Mendes-France's arms pool project has been favorable, despite American reservations and a chilly response in some European quarters.

The project would coordinate arms production and distribution within the seven-nation Western European Union (WEU) now in the process of ratification. Italy is reported to favor, at least, the parts of the project which might reduce arms costs by such means as the standardization of weapons.

Italy also favors the general idea of firmer cooperation among West European nations. The arms pool plan is the strongest "pan-European" project advanced since the death of the European Defense Community.

## Jury Convicts Farmer for Cutting Trees

LEBANON — Lebanon area farmer Robert J. Wright lost the first round in his fight Tuesday against restriction of cutting trees on his own property when a Sweet Home Justice Court jury found him guilty of breaking Oregon laws.

The jury took out 20 minutes deliberation to convict Wright after he received the case at 5:15 p.m. He gave verbal notice he would appeal in a test of the law. Sentencing was continued to today.

Wright, owner of a 800-acre farm between Lebanon and Sweet Home, challenged the law on the basis that any person cutting timber on his own land for the purpose of clearing the land for agricultural purposes is exempt. The law specifies that any person cutting trees for commercial reasons must first secure a permit and must pay taxes on the cut and marketed timber.

Wright was placed under arrest by State Forester George Spaur three months ago after he had ignored Lebanon area foresters' threats to cease the logging operation without a permit. Wright posted \$200 bail but admitted that he continued to cut the timber after that.

The case was heard by Judge F. A. Cornell of Sweet Home who will pass sentence today. Sentence may include a fine of \$500 and up to three months in jail or both.

## S. D. Wright, 92, Succumbs, Rites Friday

AURORA — Stephen D. Wright, 92, died Tuesday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Alta Smith, Rt. 2, Aurora.

He was born at Aumsville, Dec. 31, 1862, and spent most of his life in the vicinity of Silverton, Woodburn and Aurora as a farmer. Wright was a member of the Woodburn Methodist Church and the son of a pioneer family.

In 1885, he married Genellie Settlemier, of Salem, who died in 1932.

Survivors include two sons, Frank Wright, Woodburn; and Herman Wright, Milwaukie; a daughter, Mrs. Alta Smith, Aurora; two brothers, Archie Wright, Silverton, and Fred Wright, Camas, Wash.; three sisters, Mrs. Frances Settlemier, Salem; Mrs. Eva Moser, San Jose, Calif.; Mrs. Lena Norene, Portland; nine grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren.

Services will be held at 2 p.m. Friday, Jan. 14, at Ringo-Cornwell Funeral Chapel, Woodburn, with the Rev. Ormal B. Trick officiating. Burial will be in Belle Passi Cemetery.

## Fruit Growers To Fight Smog

MEDFORD — Fruit growers of the Rogue River valley hope to do away with the smoke nuisance that sometimes accompanies use of smudge pots.

The Fruit Growers League and the Rogue River Traffic Assn. in a joint report urged growers to buy some of the new, and costly, smokeless heaters, and also to buy only smokeless heaters whenever they replace a smudge pot.

Oregon State College also has been asked to try to find a satisfactory substitute for oil fuel, the cause of most smoke complaints.

## Prof. Mitchell Of OSC, Dies

CORVALLIS — Charles Buren Mitchell, 68, professor emeritus of speech at Oregon State College, died Tuesday in a local hospital where he had been taken with a heart ailment.

Mitchell had been active on the OSC faculty for 32 years—from 1920, when he came here from Michigan State College to establish the department of speech, until he retired in 1952.

The speech department which he established here was the first in any Northwest college. He had received a number of recognitions for his work and had been president of the Pacific Forensic League and vice president of the Speech Society of America.

A graduate of DePauw University and the University of Michigan, he taught eight years at Michigan State before coming here.

The widow, Hazel, and a son, Joseph D. Mitchell, Portland radio announcer, survive. Funeral plans had not been completed Tuesday afternoon.

## Pakistan Aid Treaty Signed

WASHINGTON — The United States Tuesday signed an agreement to provide 60 million dollars in aid to Pakistan.

The State Department said two-thirds of the 60 million will be a grant, the rest a loan to be repaid in rupees under a separate agreement between Pakistan and the Export-Import Bank.

Of the total, 40 million dollars is to be spent for "emergency commodities," including industrial chemicals, drugs and medicines, non-ferrous metals, unfinished iron and steel products and sugar. The remainder is to be spent on development projects.

## School Auditorium Filled for Portland Symphony Program

Igor Stravinsky and the Portland Symphony Orchestra brought important contemporary music to Salem last evening and the event was as significant to Salem people striving to keep abreast of music trends as would have been the visit of someone like President Eisenhower to all Salem citizens. Happily we were aware of the honor given us, for the North Salem High School Auditorium was well filled.

The performance was first-rate. When an orchestra can play complex music like the Firebird Suite with such clarity we've had our money's worth. The players were competent throughout all the choirs. There was excellent solo work, particularly in the suite from Pulcinella.

Stravinsky has long been known as an effective conductor

of his own work. His precise arm motions, infinitely varied but always purposeful, must have given the orchestra much assurance. They gave the audience an added feeling for the style of the music. His head motions virtuosic, now punctuating the beginning of some part, now evening an apparent pause with rhythmic vitality.

For the music itself, this reviewer felt empty at intermission, but fully engrossed as the concert ended. With the exception of the opening Ode, the music was written to go with the dance.

The music for the Firebird and Pulcinella ballets is sufficient by itself. But I found the Orpheus music too full of brief thrusts, too episodic, and thus needing the complement of the dance. However, there were many striking orchestral effects, using restricted somber hues.

Following intermission, the music was captivating. If one knows Vivaldi, Handel or Bach Concerti Grossi, then the Pulcinella Suite was filled with suggestions of familiarity, delightfully spiced with new effects. I was intrigued with the wind and brass work in the Gavotta, and with the cello and double bass playing in the following Vivo.

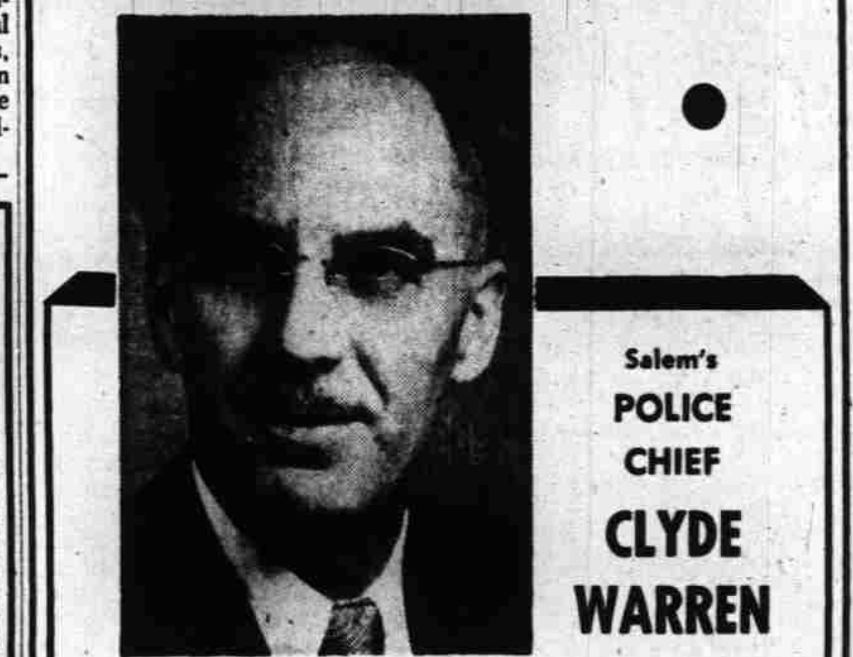
