Costa Ricans Demand Rio Treaty Invoked

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (U)—Foreign Minister Mario Esquivel Thursday said Costa Rica had asked invocation of the Treaty of Rio de Janeiro, which provides for joint action if any American state is invaded. President Jose Figueres has charged that exiles and others had prepared an invasion of Costa Rica from Nicaragua. But that northern neighbor rejected the accusation, saying Costa Rica was undergoing internal revolution.

Luis Quintanilla, Mexican chairman of the five-nation commission, sent under the treaty to report on the war, said his committee would set about at once on its task of obtaining the facts.

U. S. Ambassador Robert Woodward was among those at the airport to greet the Commission.

There was a brief flurry of excitement when a nervous airport guard fired a single shot at a U. S. transport plane which arrived ahead of the Commission. The shot did no damage.

A representative of Nicaragua was also on hand—Emilio Ortega, his country's charge d'affaires.

Members of the Commission in addition to Quintanilla are John Dreier of the United States, Francisco Enciso Veloso of Paraguay, Jose Chiriboga of Ecuador and Fernando Lobo of Brazil.

An underlying factor in the ill feeling between Costa Rica and Nicaragua is the long time personal enmity of Figueres and President Anastasio Somoza of Nicaragua.

Wednesday Somoza challenged Figueres to a duel and the latter said of his political enemy: "He's crazier than a goat in the midsummer sun."

There was little news of military activity.

The situation in Villa Quesada—retaken from the rebels—was described by the civil guard as normal.

The state of siege—modified martial law decreed for 30 days by Figueres—remained in effect.

Newspapers and radio stations were required to submit their copy to censors in advance of publication.

Domestic airlines continued grounded.

There was no fresh information from San Jose itself about the rebel side. Unofficial estimates there placed their total strength at about 400, with 75 at Villa Quesada and the remainder scattered at other points. Outside, estimates of the total ranged up to 1,000.

Radio listeners in El Salvador said they heard a radio identifying itself as "The Voice of the Authentic Anti-Communist Revolutionary Army" of Costa Rica predicting victory soon against what it called "the mercenary Communist forces" of President Figueres.

Lawrence D. Lee, 27, identifying himself in Miami, Fla., as an unofficial agent for forces seeking the overthrow of the Costa Rican government, said Teodoro Picado Jr., son of a former Costa Rican president, headed a force of 1,000 revolutionaries. Lee, who said he was a wholesale pet supply dealer from Glendale, Calif., said Picado was a graduate of West Point Military Academy in 1951 and had been plotting to invade Costa Rica from an undisclosed Central American place for the past seven months.

Oregon Solons Sponsor Bill For Schools

WASHINGTON (U)—Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore) said Thursday he and Sen. Morse (Ind-Ore) are among 13 senators sponsoring a bill which would make available to Oregon "some 10 million dollars for the next two years" for school construction.

The measure, introduced by Sen. Hill (D-Ala), would authorize federal spending of 500 million dollars for each of the next two years to help build public elementary and secondary schools.

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U. S. Leaders Agree Road Plan Needed

WASHINGTON (U)—Business and government leaders agreed at a national highway conference Thursday there is an urgent need for a 101-billion-dollar road program to be undertaken by federal, state and local governments.

But a number of potential road blocks were thrown up, notably the question of issuing federal bonds to help finance such an ambitious program. The conference was called by the United States Chamber of Commerce.

Gen. Lucius D. Clay, chairman of President Eisenhower's Highway Advisory Committee, outlined to the meeting the line of reasoning which led to his committee's call for a 10-year, 101-billion-dollar program in a report to Eisenhower Tuesday.

Clay said the financing problem was a difficult one but that "we have got to bring our highways up to date no matter how we finance the program."

"We are indeed caught in a nationwide traffic jam," the retired general said.

Gov. Robert F. Kennon of Louisiana said the nation's governors were in complete agreement with the call for a 101-billion-dollar road program.

Sen. Morse (Ind-Ore) said Thursday he would oppose increasing salaries above the present \$12,500 a year but that he will seek an increase to \$10,000 in office funds for each senator "with a requirement for monthly certification, subject to audit, and full public disclosure."

The present allowance is \$2,500 for which members do not have to give an accounting.

Morse said he and other members now have to use part of their salaries to run their offices and said, "I am sure that the American people approve of providing adequate funds for meeting the actual expenses of performing the necessary services that members of Congress need to render to the people of their states."

Oregon State Nurses Association, meeting here Thursday and today, for a legislative workshop, reviewed current laws governing the profession in Thursday afternoon sessions at the Marion Hotel. Today's program calls for a visit to the Legislature and appearances on panels of several members of the law-making body.

At the banquet meeting Thursday night, Sen. John F. Merrifield spoke on the "Function of State Government in Occupational Licensing." A state representative and senator from each district of the association were invited as guests.

Scheduled today will be a morning discussion on "How Laws Are Made," with Miss Marjorie Elmore, association executive secretary, presiding. Participants will be Sen. Lee Ohmart of Marion County and Rep. Jean L. Lewis, Multnomah County.

"Strengths and Weaknesses of Oregon Nurse Practice Act" will highlight the afternoon session, with Lucile Gregerson, member of the organization's legislative committee and William Babcock, OSNA attorney, participating.

Mrs. Nova Young, Salem, is chairman of the association's legislative committee. Fifty-two nurses, representing the organization's 21 districts, registered for the meeting.

WASHINGTON (U)—The Communications Commission authorized a citizens group at Manson, Wash., Thursday to build and operate a new experimental television station designed to bring TV service to valley areas and other isolated places through re-broadcasts.

The permit was issued to the Manson Community Television Co. to be operated by McPadden, Ralph W. and Fred Milburn and R. W. all of Manson.

Commission said the low-cost, low-power station will be financed by contributions from viewers in the area, and that the operation will be on a non-profit basis.

The authority is designed to replace a number of unauthorized "booster" TV stations which operated in North Central Washington last year. Commission field engineers who investigated these so-called "reflector stations" advised the operators that the stations were illegal and tended to cause interference because they were broadcasting on the same channel they were picking up.
