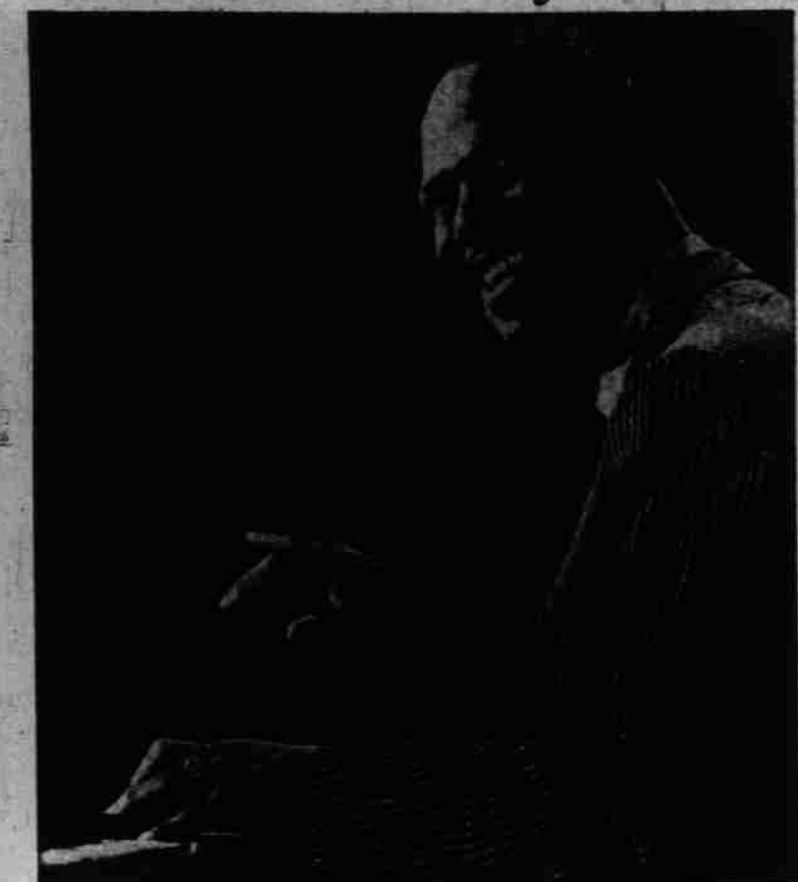


Pianist in Variety Show

Globetrotters Stage Show Here Saturday

Abe Saperstein's "Harlem Globetrotter Varieties of 1955" stage counterpart of the basketball Globetrotters, will appear in Salem Saturday, Jan. 22, at 8 p.m., at North Salem High School auditorium.

The show will be sponsored here by the Junior Chamber of Commerce, and features Earl ("Fatha") Hines and his orchestra. Other acts include tenor Tony Ponce, song stylist Cissie Rose, mentalist team of King and Zerita, and several other variety acts.

The stage show was originally taken to Europe as a part of the Trotters basketball and variety show. Several acts have been added now that the variety show is traveling as a separate unit this winter.

OLYMPIA (U) — Private funeral services for Washington State Supreme Court Justice Ralph Olson will be held in Olympia Monday with only immediate members of the family attending.

Judge Olson, who was 52, died unexpectedly Saturday of a cerebral hemorrhage.

The State Supreme Court will convene Monday, then adjourn for the day out of respect to Judge Olson.

Iraqi-Turkish Pact Worries Arab League

CAIRO (U) — Egypt called the prime ministers of the Arab states to an emergency meeting in Cairo Jan. 22 to discuss the Iraqi-Turkish defense pact. She said the pact was a "serious" blow to Arab unity.

Maj. Salah Salem, minister of national guidance, said Egypt opposes any military alliance outside the Arab League and denounced Iraq's link with Turkey.

"This undoubtedly is a serious event that may threaten the very existence of the Arab League and endanger Arab nations as a whole," Salem said in a statement to newsmen.

He refused to speculate as to what Egypt would do if Iraq insists on going through with the alliance with Turkey. But in answer to a question he said: "Egypt will not leave the Arab League."

All the Arab League states except Libya are invited to the Cairo conference. Despite Salem's denial, informed diplomatic quarters believed Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser's military government might withdraw from the league, especially if any other Arab countries responded to the Iraqi-Turkish invitation to join in a Middle East defense alliance.

Some observers speculated that Egypt, in calling for a meeting this week, was attempting to head off any move by other states, particularly Jordan and Lebanon, to join up with Iraq. Salem appeared in doubt as to whether all the Arab premiers would accept his invitation to an emergency meeting. He turned aside several questions about wait and see if the meeting is held and what decisions are made.

Six Newsmen In Costa Rica Back to Units

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (U) — Six foreign correspondents covering the fighting in Costa Rica returned safely Sunday to government units after failing to return to a base in Liberia Saturday night, the U. S. ambassador said.

(A rebel radio report heard earlier in Managua, Nicaragua, said six correspondents were captured Friday by rebel forces after a sharp battle at Santa Rosa and now were covering the action from the rebel side.)

U. S. Ambassador Robert F. Woodward announced the six correspondents had returned to government lines.

Four were identified as United Press photographer John Abney, a native of Lampasas, Tex., who now works in Mexico City; Time magazine correspondent Philip Payne of Washington; Life magazine photographer George Skadding of Washington, and Paul Sanchez, 31, of Quebec who works for the National Broadcasting Co.

Also returning were two correspondents from Havana, Cuba: Jose Garcia of Cine Periodico and CMQ radio station, and Antonio Llano Montes of Diario Nacional.

Al Waldron, newsreel cameraman, said earlier the six probably had become separated from a patrol during a skirmish involving about 50 loyalists and 50 rebels.

A communique said a correspondent for the San Jose newspaper La Prensa Libre was killed in the same action. He was identified as Oscar Corrocos.

Three other Costa Rican newsmen were reported injured slightly.

NO VISAS NEEDED

Murder, Suicide Claim Man, Wife

PORTLAND (U) — Two persons were found dead in an apartment here Sunday and police said it was a case of murder and suicide by a woman.

She was identified as Irene Moffat, 42, an unemployed secretary and accountant. Police said she apparently shot her husband, David H. Moffat, 53, an unemployed mechanical engineer, and then turned the gun on herself. Police said relatives of the dead couple told them they had been separated several times and recently had become reconciled.

Russ Arrest Liaison Man

VIENNA, Austria (U) — Soviet authorities in Vienna Saturday arrested Dr. Alfred Sokolowski, an interpreter and liaison officer between the city and the occupying Russians since 1945.

Sokolowski was arrested when he went to the Soviet Kommandatura on city business. His arrest shocked the city and caused Lord Mayor Franz Jonas and city Police Chief Josef Holoubek to appeal to the Russians personally for his release. The Soviets refused saying he was a suspected war criminal.

An informal meeting of American, British and French officials of the Vienna Inter-Allied Command also discussed a possible protest to the Russians.
