

Council Deadlock on Alderman Unlikely to Delay City Business

Deadlock or not, City Council business will go ahead. That was the indication Monday, a full week after two factions of the council butted heads 4-4 over selection of a new alderman for Ward 7.

The council is expected to take up the election of the new alderman to replace Robert F. White, who has moved up to mayor, at next Monday's meeting but even a continuation of the deadlock wasn't expected to stand in the way of action on some important city issues.

Mrs. Lilburn, Former Music Teacher, Dies

Mrs. Josephine Moorhead Lilburn, 68, who operated a private musical kindergarten in Salem for many years, died Monday in a Salem hospital after a long illness.

Born in St. Joseph, Mo., Mrs. Lilburn came to Oregon as a child. She was reared in Junction City, where her father was editor of the local paper for many years.

Mrs. Lilburn was graduated in 1915 from the University of Oregon, where she was a member of Delta Delta Delta sorority. She later taught in the public schools in Roseburg, where she was married in 1917 to Frank Lilburn.

Mr. and Mrs. Lilburn moved in 1927 to Salem, where Mrs. Lilburn opened the Lilburn Musical Kindergarten the following year. She operated the kindergarten until about 1928.

In Salem Mrs. Lilburn was a member of the Christian Science Church and the Delta Delta Delta Alumnae Association. She was a member of the MacDowell Club, a singing group which has since become inactive.

Survivors include the widower, Frank Lilburn; three daughters, Mabelle Lilburn and Mrs. Florence Shuman, both of Portland, and Mrs. Frances Reynolds, Maywood, N. J.; two brothers, Steele Moorhead, Newport, and Bishop Moorhead, who is now living in Japan; two sisters, Mrs. Alva Head, Eugene, and Mrs. Harvey Johnson, Port Angeles, Wash.; and five grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at 3 p.m. Wednesday in the W. T. Rigdon Chapel. Interment will be in the Mt. Crest Abbey Mausoleum.

Conservation Week Planned

The value of conserving the state's natural resources was emphasized Monday by Gov. Paul Patterson, who revealed plans to set aside May 1 through May 7 as "Conservation Week" in Oregon.

The governor said conservation of the state's natural resources is a major job and included water, minerals, forests and range, soil, fish and wildlife in the program. All federal, state, and private conservation agencies, as well as all schools, clubs and other organizations would be invited to participate in the big springtime conservation observance.

The idea originally came from a suggestion made by the Soil Conservation Service for a soil conservation week. The governor viewed the conservation idea so favorably, the program was expanded to include all of Oregon's natural resources.

Patterson's committee to head up the project include Homer G. Lyon and Edwin Armstrong, both of Salem.

Problem for Mr. Anthony

HOLLYWOOD (UP)—John J. Anthony, who solves other people's problems on his radio and television program, Monday wrestled with a problem of his own, to collect \$236,450 in damages from a theatrical agent.

The human relations advisor charged in a superior court suit filed Saturday that John Mashio and others promised to pay him \$21,400 for his appearance in 39 telecasts and another \$75,000 for use of 260 of his radio transcriptions over a three-year period.

He charged that the contracts were repudiated, entitling him to the sums promised plus an additional \$200,000 punitive damages. Other defendants named were Artists Limited Productions, Inc. Motion Picture for Television, Inc., Reynard International Corp., Matty Fox and Edward Gray.

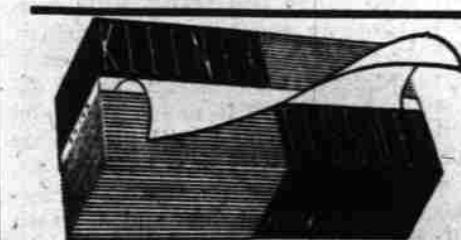
