NORTH HOWELL—Mrs. Louisa Johnson, who was born Jan. 16, 1865, at Penoria, Iowa, and came to Marion county, the same year, celebrated her 90th birthday Sunday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Amy Beer, where a family dinner was given in her honor.

Mrs. Johnson's parents, Sarah and Andrew Brumbaugh, and their six children crossed the plains with an ox team during the spring and summer of 1865 and reached the Hazel Green district that fall where they took up a homestead and spent the rest of their lives. Mrs. Johnson lived in the old

home until 17 years ago when she moved to a small house near her daughter. Mrs. Beer, in North Howell. One of her cherished possessions is the little chair with rawhide seat in which her mother sat and held her while riding in the covered wagon.
