Food of Old Russia Makes Fine Eating; Ingredients Easily Found

Checking boldly through a book of Russian recipes which we got in the old pre-subversive days, we found a chapter introduction which reads thus: "For the American woman it is enough to know that a large bowl of borsch or almost any other Russian soup, either hot or cold, served with little pastries filled with cabbage, meat, fish or eggs—they are called pirozhki—makes a novel and satisfying one-dish meal." This is one dish.

One dish or two, whole meal or only half, there are many highly attractive soups in any Russian cookbook. We recently published one for borsch, that soup that may contain meat or not, cabbage or not, but always includes beets.

Turnips give good flavor to another Russian soup, and the dill pickles included should pose no too great a surprise to German housewives who include dill seed in their soup, or other mid-European cook who like a dish of sweet-sour in their stews.

PIROZHKI

Dough:
2 cups turnips, diced
4 carrots
12 cups stock
2 kidneys
2 tablespoons flour
Cover vegetables and pickles with water, add 1 cup stock and the pickle juice, simmer until vegetables are almost done. Simmer kidneys until quite tender, then slice them and add to vegetables. Add flour mixed with 1 cup of the stock and butter to vegetables and add remainder of liquid. Cook until thickened. Just before serving, add soup cream and bring to a point just below boiling. This serves 8, according to the book, but perhaps they are very hungry in Russia.

Filling:
2 pounds round of beef
2 tablespoons butter
2 medium onions, chopped
Combine butter (using less if meat is fat), sour cream and whole unbroken egg. Sift flour, baking powder and salt (using enough flour to make dough to roll out very thin). Cut rings about 2 1/2 inches in diameter, put 1 teaspoon of filling on each and fold over. Pinch edges. Paint with beaten egg and bake in fairly hot oven (425 degrees) on a well-greased pan. Serve hot or cold. To make filling: Put meat through a grinder, brown onions in butter and add meat. Moisten with enough bouillon, water or milk to make a paste. Add seasonings to taste, and add finely chopped hard cooked eggs.
