Bolt Spanks Par to Maintain Lead in San Diego Golf Open

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—Texas' Tommy Bolt gave par another good spanking Friday and finished the midway mark of the \$15,000 San Diego Open Golf Tournament with a 36-hole score of 131 and a four-stroke lead over his nearest rivals.

Playing the Mission Valley Country Club's 6,706 - yards of flat, windy acres, the 34-year-old Bolt added a 5-under par 67 to his pace setting 64 of Thursday. Par is 36-72.

Four strokes back, and very much a challenge as the field goes into the third round Saturday, were Gene Littler of Palm Springs, Calif., the pre-tournament favorite, and Stan Leonard, the skilled veteran from Vancouver, B. C.

Littler and Leonard had identical scores of 69-66-135, with Littler touring Mission Valley in 33-33 and Leonard an intriguing 36-30.

Young Paul McGuire of Wichita, Kan., who was a surprise with his 65 Thursday, fell back Friday afternoon with a 73 for 138.

Tied with McGuire were Jack Burke, Jr., with his second straight 69; slender Bud Holscher and Doug Ford, each with 70s.

Eight shots off the Bolt pace were Art Wall Jr., Ted Kroll, John Barnum, Johnny Palmer and Bill Ogden.

Fred Haas Jr. shared low scoring honors for the round with Leonard and Littler, who won this tournament as an amateur last year. Haas' 66 ushered him up to the 140 bracket, where he joined the National Open champion, Ed Furgol; Fred Wampler, Shelley Mayfield, Jimmy Clark and Fred Hawkins.

Of the name professionals, British Open champion Peter Thomson of Australia had a 74 for 145; United States PGA champion Chick Harbert a 73 after his discouraging 76 for 151, and trailing were two former National Open kings, Julius Boros and Lloyd Mangrum. Boros shot a 70 for 149 and Mangrum a 71 for 145.

Allie Brandt of Lockport, N.Y., had 33 strokes out of a possible 36 the night in 1939 when he bowled the all-time record league series of 886.

Santee Victor In Mile Race

PHILADELPHIA — Cowboy Wes Santee, America's premier hope for the 4-minute mile, ran away from the pack Friday night to win the mile-run in a relatively slow 4:10.5 in The Philadelphia Inquirer Games.

Santee, making his Eastern debut, duelled with Gunnar Nielsen, the Danish pressman, until he had only one lap to go. Then like a bolt, Santee pulled away. Nielsen never had a chance and hit the tape about eight yards behind the Kansan.

Gene Maynard of Illinois, the Big Ten half mile champion, was third, almost a half lap behind Nielsen. Back in fourth place was Vic Milliken of Ireland and pulling up in the rear of the five-man field was Billy Smith of Boston University.

Santee, whose best time is 4:00.6 — just six-tenths of a second over four minutes — did not seem the least bit hampered by the 12-lap Convention Hall board track.

In the 50-yard high hurdles, Penn State's 19-year-old sophomore, Rod Perry, scored an upset win over Harrison Dillard, tying the world's record of 6.0 for the distance.

Musial, Schoendienst Sign St. Louis Pacts

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Stan (The Man) Musial joined roommate Red Schoendienst in a \$120,000 St. Louis Cardinal contract signing ceremony Friday, confident he can equal Honus Wager's record of eight National League batting crowns.

The 34-year-old six-time National League batting champion, happy with his fifth straight \$80,000 contract, said he thinks he is "capable of four more good seasons and one or two more batting titles."

Schoendienst and Musial, probably the highest-priced roommates in baseball, have lived together on the road since 1947 but this is the first time they've signed together.

Their dual signing Friday likely is the largest money outlay in a single signing in the game's history.

The 32-year-old Schoendienst, considered one of the game's best second basemen, obviously was pleased with his pact calling for a reported \$40,000, the same as last year.

NFL, Big Four Set Meeting

No-Raiding Pact Goal of Officials

PHILADELPHIA — Officials of the National Football League and the Canadian Big Four are going to sit down around a table here Saturday and try once again to work out a no-raiding agreement on player contracts.

"It's a step in the right direction but there are many obstacles to overcome," NFL Commissioner Bert Bell said Friday.

Bell said the Big Four would be represented by league President Ralph Cooper and representatives from each of the four teams.

"I don't know what line the talks will take," Bell said. "They called me and asked if they could come down and I welcomed them."

The Big Four has reportedly been seeking to patch up its recent feud with the NFL which has resulted in contract-jumping and high salaries.

"I've met several times before with representatives of the Canadian League," Bell said. "Last year we sort of outlined a plan we thought would work but when they took it back home, the deal fell through some how."

"All I know about this new move is what I read in the papers. However, I also read in the papers that one team, Toronto, has signed eight of our players."

"We feel that everyone should honor their contracts and options, whether they be to the NFL or the Canadian League. Encouraging anything but that policy is bad for these young men who play football."

WSC Rapped By Washington

PULLMAN, Wash. — Washington used superior height and accuracy, including sensational long shots by forward Karl Voegtlin, to add steadily to an early lead and beat jittery Washington State 69-38 in a Northern Division Pacific Coast Conference basketball game Friday night.

The Cougars got the honor of the first score, with center Bill Rehder casting off from the floor, but Washington State was never in the game after Jerry Johnson tied it up and the Huskies started to pour it on.

Washington hit 17 of 43 field goal attempts in the first half compared to only 8 of 27 for WSC. That, and the Huskies' domination of both backboards, told the story.

Six-foot-4 Voegtlin was magnificent in the first half. He scored 12 points, all on shots from 20 to 30 feet out. Ron Bennink was assigned to guard Voegtlin in the second half and the Husky forward went scoreless for the rest of the game.

But forward Jim Coshaw and centers Dean Parsons and Ron Nelson took up the Washington scoring after intermission. Coshaw was high scorer for the game with 14 and Nelson had 12.

Bennink was high for Washington State with 12 and was the Cougar's all-around player for the night.

Milers Hoping To Nip Record

WASHINGTON — Topflight touring track stars move into Washington Stadium night for the 8th annual Evening Star Games, where they'll be matched against a band of highly regarded armed forces runners now training for the Pan-American Games at the University of Maryland.

Wes Santee and Denmark's Gunnar Nielsen will have to fight it out in the mile event against Bob McMillen, 1952 Olympic hero now in service.

McMillen, who sat out the Philadelphia Inquirer Games Friday night, formerly raced for Occidental College in California. He finished second in the 1,500-meter event in the '52 Olympics.

A field of 10 is entered in the Junior Chamber of Commerce invitation mile, but most eyes will be directed toward Santee, Nielsen and McMillen with nearly everyone expecting to see the meet mile mark go by the boards.

The record is held by Len Truex of Ohio State, who ran the distance in 4:13.4 last year.

Chances of a world record breaking performance in the mile are slim over the relatively slow unbanked boards at the National Guard armory, but all three will be shooting at the indoor standard of 4:05.3, held by Gil Dodds.

Twenty-nine events are on tap for the star games. Most spectator interest is focussed on the mile and the pole vault, in which the 18 entrants will be aiming at the meet mark and possibly a world record.

STOCKHOLDERS CLASH

OAKLAND, Calif. — A stockholders' fight for control of Golden Gate Fields race track at Albany was disclosed here Friday by William E. Strei, Oakland investment broker.

The present Mexican League has been after official recognition since 1948, following its reorganization after Jorge Pasquel's raid on American players.

Pasquel, president of the old Mexican League, urged several major league stars south of the border in 1946 with high salaries as bait.

The "jumpers" included Sal Maglie, Danny Gardella and Ace Adams of the New York Giants; Mickey Owens and Luis Olmo of Brooklyn and Max Lanier, Fred Martin and Lou Klein of the St. Louis Cardinals.

Pasquel's league was outlawed from organized baseball and folded in 1948 after heavy financial losses.

Robin Roberts Inks Contracts

PHILADELPHIA — Robin Roberts, the "Mr. Reliable" of the Philadelphia Phillies, had a 25-minute chat with General Manager Roy Hamey Friday and they signed a contract for a reported \$42,500.

The ace righthander, who has won 20 or more games for the past five seasons, took less time to make up his mind this time than in any of the other seven seasons he's been with the Phillies.

Usually, the soft-spoken Robbie has a long but friendly hassle with President, Bob Carpenter, before agreeing to terms. But this time he was the first Phil to sign.

Neither Roberts nor Hamey would disclose the exact salary but sources close to the pair said the 28-year-old pitcher received a \$2,500 raise. He had a 23-15 record last year.

Stewart Quits As NL Ump

CINCINNATI — Bill Stewart, dean of National League umpires, retired Friday, strongly disappointed that he could not have the post of supervisor of the league's umpires.

I had my heart set on being named supervisor of National League umpires — a position promised me five years ago by Commissioner Ford Frick, when he was the NL president — and since that promise failed to develop, I have decided to quit," Stewart said at his home in Jamaica Plain, Mass.

Stewart's resignation had been announced at league headquarters here a few hours earlier by Warren Giles, president of the league.

Stewart, for 22 years a familiar figure behind the plate or working one of the bases, said that Frick five years ago offered him the job of supervisor, then held by the late Bill Klein.

But, Stewart said, he refused the offer. Klein was still alive. In the intervening years, Frick became baseball commissioner and Giles succeeded him as league head.

Portland State Trips Oregon Tech, 78-69

KLAMATH FALLS — Portland State College spouted for 12 straight points in the second half to break up a close game and defeat Oregon Tech 78-69 in Oregon Collegiate Conference basketball action here Friday night.

Jim Perkins led the winners with 24 points, and Jack Biskov had 15 for Portland State. Dennis Eckart got 15 for Oregon Tech. The teams traded basket for basket until midway in the second half when Portland State hit a hot streak and scored 12 straight points.

Mexican Loop Accepted as Class AA

COLUMBUS, Ohio — The six-team Mexican League Friday won long-sought recognition by organized baseball as a Class AA circuit.

George M. Trautman, president of the National Assn. of Professional Baseball Leagues, said the league is the first composed of all foreign teams speaking a different language, to be admitted to the association.

Anuar Canavati, owner of the Monterrey club and vice president of the league, gained recognition for the loop as a one-man delegation to Trautman's office.

Trautman acted after an investigation by Bob Finch promotional director for the minors, and an affirmative vote by the association executive committee on admission

Beavers Win Without Swede

10,000 Witness 5th Straight OSC Win

EUGENE — Even without their towering center, the Oregon State Beavers outshot a scrappy Oregon team 56-53 in a Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division basketball game before a record crowd of 10,321 here Friday night. The victory, Oregon State's fifth in conference play, gave the Beavers a tighter hold on first place.

Oregon State's superior ball handling and tight defense proved too much for the losers, who committed a number of costly floor errors. Oregon State handled the ball expertly in the last 10 minutes, taking only a few sure shots and commanding the backboards.

The Stars built up a 12-point lead at 50-38 at one point in the second half, but Oregon rallied on tip-ins by Ray Bell and Jim Loscutt and cut the lead to 50-48 with five minutes left. Tex Whitman and Loscutt traded baskets and then Tony Vlastelica, Oregon State's leading scorer with 24, laid one up to make it 54-50.

Oregon closed out with three free throws and Oregon State got a pair from the foul line. Oregon State controlled the ball in the closing minutes to protect the margin.

Swede Halbrook, Oregon State's 7-foot 3-inch center, sat out the game after being suspended earlier this week by Coach Slaters for failure to attend classes and other disciplinary reasons. However, Gill indicated after the game that Halbrook might be back in the lineup Saturday night when the teams meet again at Corvallis.

Oregon State jumped to an early lead and Oregon didn't score until over three minutes had passed. The advantage changed hands several times in the first half and Oregon State held a halftime lead of 28-27.

Whiteman followed Vlastelica in scoring for the winners with 7. Bell led Oregon with 13, Loscutt 11 and Phil McHugh 10.

Oregon State shot a surprising .579 in the second half and wound up with a .396 average, hitting 21 baskets in 53 attempts. Oregon connected on 18 out of 60 shots for a .300 mark.

After the game Gill had this to say about the Halbrook situation: "Swede Halbrook called on me (and) indicated an interest in attitude and a sincere desire to assume the responsibilities of a college student and Oregon State basketball player. He has seen each of his instructors. He has a few responsibilities to take care of Saturday morning which, when completed, would, I believe, justify my returning him to the team."

Husky Stadium Pro Tilt Eyed

SEATTLE — The gates of the University of Washington football stadium, long closed tight to professionals, may swing open this fall for a pro football game.

If they do, the exhibition tilt is likely to feature the San Francisco 49ers against the New York Giants in an exhibition, pre-season fracas. This would bring home two Washington All Americans, Hugh McElhenry of the 49ers and Don Heinrich of the Giants.

The word seeped out from several sources Friday and was not denied in official quarters.

Members of the university board of regents said no announcement is ready to be made. It was learned, however, that the regents had asked a study of a proposal that such a game be sponsored by Greater Seattle, Inc., a non-profit organization which backs the annual Seafair.

The regents have turned down proposals for private sponsorship of prize fights and professional football games in the stadium. The State Legislature also could shoulder the prize fight idea by tabling a resolution designed to open the gates.
