State Police Eye Radar Speed Checks

Some of Oregon's senators want to take a long, long look before they do anything about letting the State Police get into radar such as operates in Salem, Portland, Eugene and other cities.

The State Police has a proposal before the senate roads and highways committee to clarify the legality of radar speed detection devices. The department wants to have a clear road ahead before it considers acquiring any equipment.

So do the senate committee members.

On Monday, the State Highway Commission offered to help the senators learn more about the speed-checking device. The commission has used radar for some time to determine relative speeds at given points. It doesn't have any enforcement powers, so its speed recordings are used only in connection with its engineering surveys.

Sen. Phil Brady (D), Portland, said he opposes the State Police suggestion. He doesn't think there is enough information on operation of the devices.

Furthermore, Brady said he'd like to see the slow driver put in the same bracket as the speeder.

The senate committee plans to get acquainted with the highway commission's radar on Wednesday.

New Meat Inspection Plan Devised

The Oregon Senate's agriculture committee called off a scheduled Feb. 3 hearing on compulsory state meat inspection Monday after an alternative inspection plan emerged from the House livestock committee.

The House bill, introduced Monday, was drafted by Oregon Livestock and Meat Marketing Committee, representing the entire livestock industry, consumers and labor. It would appropriate \$400,000 to get the required inspection plan into operation.

Farmers could still slaughter animals for direct sale to consumers, without inspection. But the 133 Oregon slaughtering firms not under inspection now would be affected by the bill.

Another new bill would provide the death penalty for the second conviction of peddling narcotics. It was sponsored by Rep. Joe Rogers (D), Independence.

The House Livestock Committee introduced a measure to repeal all laws regulating meats imported from foreign countries. The committee said it is impossible to administer these laws.

A bill to have the supreme court clerk elected by the people was submitted by Rep. G. D. Gleason (D), Portland. The clerk now is appointed by the supreme court.

Another new bill provides that the burning of any building should be considered at least second degree arson. This, in effect, increases the penalties for setting buildings afire.

Rep. Alfred H. Corbett (D), Portland, sponsored a bill to make it illegal to lend voters registration lists. The Multnomah County registration lists were loaned last fall to Republican candidates, and the Democrats didn't like it.

Senate to Vote on Formation of Un-American Activities Panel

The Oregon Senate will consider whether to have a committee to investigate un-American activities.

Sens. Harry D. Boivin (D), Klamath Falls, and Pat Lonergan (R), Portland, announced Monday they would introduce a measure to create a Senate un-American activities committee patterned after the one in California.

Boivin and Lonergan said there now is no state or local body to which subversive activity can be reported. The committee would have the power to subpoena witnesses, and to punish for contempt.

Lonergan said he received a letter from Mrs. Albert H. Powers, state regent of the Oregon Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, in which she complained about some books used in the schools.

The proposed committee, Lonergan said, could investigate these books. The president of the Senate would appoint the five-member committee to hold hearings and report to the 1957 legislature at that time, the legislature could decide whether to have a permanent committee.

TRIBESMEN REJECT WOMAN

IGNACIO, Colo. (U.S.)—Mrs. Edna Russell, an Indian woman, nominated for the traditionally male job of tribal judge of the Southern Ute Indians, was defeated in the election by tribal patriarch Julian Baker. Another woman, Mrs. Therman Smith, is a member of the tribal council.
