Continued from preceding page) filed by Liberty, charging the American and National Leagues maintained monopoly over broadcasting rights. The offer was for \$200,000.

C'Brien's motion also contended that the Federal District Court of Eastern Pennsylvania had no jurisdiction and pointed out that "broadcasting and telecasting was not one of the defendants, but by others who are not parties to nor named in the suit."

TV Ban Held Legal
Liberty's complaint followed a lengthy court battle by the NFL with the United States in which the government charged pro football violated anti-trust laws in its television and radio policy.

Judge J. Alan Grim ruled that the NFL television policy, which banned TV within 50 miles of a home team's territory, was legal, but upheld the U.S. argument over broadcasts.

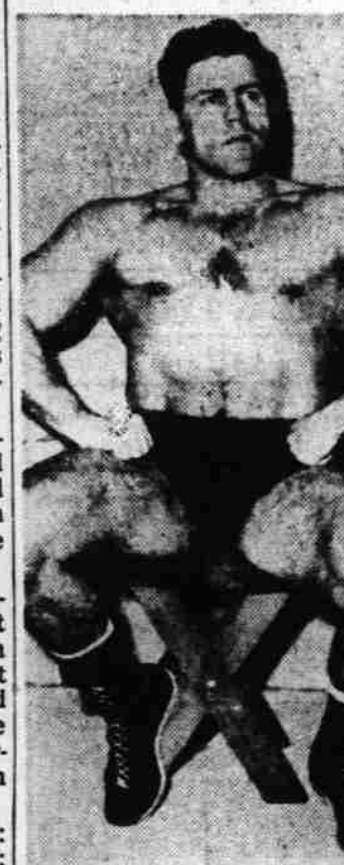
