## Salem's First Citizen Fete Due Tonight

The closely guarded identity of Salem's First Citizen for 1954 will be revealed tonight at the annual Salem Chamber of Commerce-sponsored First Citizen banquet in the Senator Hotel.

Carl W. Hogg, last year's honored citizen, will announce the selection as a climax to the special event at which Dr. Roben Maaske, president of Oregon College of Education, will be the principal speaker.

Fifty Chamber members and their wives will serve as hosts for the separate banquet tables in the Capitol Room for the 6:45 p.m. banquet.

The new First Citizen will be the fifth chosen for Salem. His predecessors are Charles A. Sprague, publisher of The Oregon Statesman and former state governor, 1950; Robert L. Elstrom, former Salem mayor and merchant now a member of the Oregon Legislature, 1951; William L. Phillips Sr., automobile dealer and civic leader, 1952; and Hogg, 1953.

Nominations from the public for the First Citizen honor were considered by an anonymous selection committee whose chairman was chosen by last year's president of the Chamber William Hammond. The committee's final ballot choice has been placed in an envelope which will be delivered to Mr. Hogg at the banquet tonight.

## Man Found Unconscious In Apartment

A 73-year-old man was hospitalized Wednesday after Salem police broke into his gas-filled apartment and discovered him unconscious in his bed.

Attendants at Salem Memorial Hospital reported Wednesday evening that the victim, William T. Murphy, was making rapid recovery and appeared to be in satisfactory condition. He was hospitalized about 11:30 a.m. after being rescued from the apartment, located at 640 Marion St.

Police were called to the building by Murphy's landlady, Mrs. Margaret Albrich, who said she became alarmed after she was unable to arouse the elderly man. The apartment was locked from the inside.

After regaining consciousness, Murphy told police he had suffered a dizzy spell and fallen against a gas pipe. Police said the pipe had apparently been jarred loose, causing gas to leak into the room.

Murphy was taken to the hospital by Willamette Ambulance attendants summoned by the police. City first aidmen were also called to the address.

## Asia War Possibility Discounted by Briton

The possibility of an early war in the Far East as a result of growing tension over Formosa was discounted Thursday afternoon by Fenner Brockway, a member of the British House of Commons. Brockway spoke informally on the Willamette University campus under sponsorship of the student UNESCO group.

Brockway, who also outlined the Mau Mau problem in Africa, said he does not think Red China will take any early steps to take Formosa; that the People's Republic prefers peace, and that the majority of the British people wish to stay out of any trouble that might develop in that area.

The attitude of the Labor Party in Britain, he explained, is that Formosa should be neutralized for a period of time under the United Nations. Later, the people should be given the right to vote to decide whether to join the People's Republic of China or remain independent, Brockway said.

In discussing the Mau Mau situation, Brockway, who once served as a member of a fact finding board in Kenya Colony, described the Mau Mau movement as one of "violence and murder" which stemmed from frustration on the part of the African people.

He described the problem as three-fold: social, economic and psychological, and stated that "in his own country an African is treated as a second or third class citizen."

Brockway, who is in this country for a two months' speaking tour, spoke again Thursday night at the First Congregational Church. He is touring under the auspices of the American Friends Service. His appearances here were arranged by Dr. J. E. Hyatt, a member of the Salem Unitarians.

The extended area service, under which Gresham and Troutdale become part of the Portland exchange area, will become effective next Sunday. It will then be possible to make local calls between any two points in the Portland-Gresham-Troutdale area.
