Farm Group Protests Hike In Phone Rate

President Harley Libby of the Oregon Farmers Union has filed protest with Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heltzel against requests for increased rates filed by several telephone companies.

Libby said increases are not justified at this time because telephone stocks are paying ample returns. Libby urged that the Utilities Commissioner pay more attention to the annual budgets filed by the telephone companies with a view of pointing out possible business economies.

He added that several power companies have made rate reductions in recent years "because of healthy competition," and asked why scientific progress and increased volume of business had not been of comparable benefit to the telephone companies.

Commissioner Heltzel replied that hearings on proposed rate increases are now being held throughout the state. Heltzel advised Libby that when the last increase was granted in 1952, he directed the company filing the application to expend approximately \$7,000,000 in new construction and that performance under that order is now being analyzed.
