Stitch A Stole...

Every girl needs a stole, to wear over suits in spring or with cotton dresses in summer.

The rank amateur can make a stole, which in its simplest form consists of a piece of fabric about two yards long folded in half lengthwise and stitched around the edges. This is the basic stole, but local sewing center experts offer a few tips on how to give it fashion significance with decorative detail.

A handsome stole may be made from brown silk-and-worsted suiting fabric, trimmed in diamond-shaped appliques in contrasting tones which may be stitched on with the automatic $\frac{1}{4}$ " or $\frac{1}{2}$ " attachment of your sewing machine.

To make the stole, using brown paper for a pattern, draw and cut out eight diamonds, each about six inches wide, leaving a half inch seam allowance all around. Press down the seam allowance and baste in position on the ends of your two-yard length of fabric (which is folded lengthwise). If you have one of the new automatic zigzag attachments for your sewing machine, set for 25 inches to the inch at a 4 bight, and stitch around the edges of the diamonds. If you don't have an automatic attachment or machine, you can of course stitch the appliques by hand, using a buttonhole or feather stitch, as you prefer. Lay fabric flat for stitching, so that stitches are on only one thickness.

Now fold the stole fabric lengthwise and with raw edges firmly pinned together trim the ends to parallel the diamond edges. Leave a half inch for seam allowance. Each end will now have four points.

Turn stole so right sides are together and stitch along points and halfway up the open side. Do the same on the other end, leaving a foot open on the long seam so that you can turn the stole right side out. Press seams open. Turn stole, poking out points with scissors points. Slip-stitch opening and press.

For yarn fringe, cut yarn in 8-inch lengths. Use a crochet hook to pull the yarn through, securing by pulling the two loose ends through the loop. Now your stole is ready for the Easter parade.

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Soupy Weather

Fruit, Vegetable Give New Taste Sensation to Wintertime Favorite

Spring has its tossed salads, summer its barbecued and autumn its pumpkin pie, but winter has its soups—and its brisk appetite go with them.

"Soup" is not necessarily synonymous with meat or fish. It may be quite original in ingredients, very fascinating in flavor. Take this little number for instance, reminiscent of Scandinavian fruit soup, but not very filling too.

GREEK LEMON SOUP
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup rice
6 cups chicken or lamb stock
Wash rice, add to boiling stock slowly and cook until soft. Whisk egg yolks with lemon juice, beat well. Gradually pour in one cup of the stock, stirring well. Remove from stove and when it stops boiling, add yolk mixture, continue to stir a few minutes then serve very hot, but do not boil again.
Then there's the Cider soup of USA.

NEW ENGLAND CIDER SOUP
Slowly bring to a boil 3 pints cider, stir in $\frac{1}{2}$ cup brown sugar and set aside in a warm place. Brown 2 generous cups stale bread cubes in 3 tablespoons butter and add salt to taste. Keep warm. Beat 3 eggs lightly and add, while beating, 2 tablespoons sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ cups cream, 2 tablespoons flour, few grains of allspice. Pour this slowly into cider, beating steadily. Sprinkle fried bread cubes over soup and serve immediately.

The Finns would like this
HEDELMAKEITTO
 $\frac{1}{2}$ pound dried prunes 3 tart apples
 $\frac{1}{4}$ pound dried apricots 6 cups water
 $\frac{1}{4}$ pound dried peaches $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar
2-inch stick cinnamon 2 tablespoons cornstarch
Combine all but cinnamon, peeling and quartering apples. Let stand overnight. In the morning add cinnamon, cook until fruit is soft, strain off juice and run fruit through sieve. Return to liquid and bring to a boil. Make a paste of the cornstarch with a little water. Combine with soup and cook for about 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Serve cold.

And speaking of flavor!
TOURAIN A L'AIL
Salt
Pepper
French Bread
Peel garlic, saute the individual cloves in butter until golden brown. Add water and seasonings. Simmer 30 minutes and just before serving remove garlic, although some prefer to leave them in. Place thin slices of bread on the bottom or soup tureen, filling about $\frac{1}{2}$ full. Pour soup on top, and if boiling hot will be absorbed by bread.
Oh yes, "Tourain a l'ail" means Garlic soup.

Display Cards From 1880 Featured
Advertising display cards of Salem are the major feature of an exhibit which is open to the public for the first time today at the Salem Art Museum in the Bush House. Loaned by Mrs. R. P. Bush of Salem, the display in the library gallery also includes samples of 1880 valentines, embossed envelopes, name cards and rewards of merit illustrating the color orthography of the period.

Variety of Cards Displayed
The advertising cards are similar in character to cards which were purchased and distributed by merchants up and down the West Coast. Among the displays are an 1880 series of pin-up girls from H. W. Cox, druggist; sweet children in bonnets from Mrs. M. E. Wilson, milliner and dressmaker; and other pictures of children from William Brown & Co.; fine shoes; and the Farmer's Friend, the Great Grange Paper. The latter publication also distributed peaceful landscapes, as did F. Parmenter & Co., millinery and dry goods.

Sol Ripinsky, grocer and owner of the Web Foot Store, chose babies crying and sad; while J. J. Briggs who sold drugs, paints and oils, preferred boats in stormy and quiet seas.

Advertisements for medicines of the period are for Horsford's Acid Phosphate, William Pfunder of Portland, Brown's Iron Bitters, August Flower for dyspepsia, and Lydia E. Pinkham's Vegetable Compound. Cosmetics are represented by E. W. Hoyt & Co.'s German cologne, and sewing by a series of Clark's Mile End thread cards.
