

## OCE Downed In Overtime

OTI Trips Wolves In 66-54 Thriller

MONMOUTH—(Special)—The Oregon Tech Owls shoved the Oregon College of Education Wolves a little farther into the cellar of the Oregon Collegiate Conference with a thrilling 66 to 59 overtime win here Friday night. The score was timed 53-all at the end of the regulation playing time.

Johnny James, who paced the winners with 16 points, tossed in eight of the Owls' 13 extra-period tallies. Ron Jones of the Wolves was high scorer for the game with an even 20.

The OCE foes meet again tonight.

The game was tied 10 times and had a change of lead in 12 other occasions. The Wolves led at the intermission 22 to 22.

Both teams were less than torrid. Oregon Tech hitting 22 for 93 for a .250 average, and OCE making good on but 17 of 27 for .195. Wayne Young of the host quint grabbed 23 rebounds, but his mates also trailed in that department, 56 to 51.

The defeat leaves Oregon College with a 1-8 league mark while the Klamath Falls team now boasts a 2-4 record.

## Strange But—Grid Giants Select Toole

SEATTLE (AP) — Probably the most surprised man in American Friday was Bill Toole of Oregon State College, the basketball player who was tapped by the New York Giants in the football draft as a halfback.

He hadn't played football for four years and it took him quite a little time to digest the news. Bill couldn't speak for a full minute.

Cuff Recommends Toole

Here with the Oregon State hoop team which met Washington Friday night, Toole said he had no advance indication that the Giants were interested. He was recommended by Ward Cuff, former GI and star, who said Toole had great possibilities.

The news could, however, gain Oregon State a halfback next autumn. Although Toole is a senior, Basketball Coach Slat Gills said the athlete had one year of football eligibility left at O. S. C.

Toole Played Halfback

"There has been lots of pressure on Bill to get him to play," the coach said. "This could do it." He was a halfback at Klamath Falls High School before entering college.

But Toole, still numbed by the news, said his plans called for a career in electrical engineering after graduation and military service.

## 10-Club Sked Exam Slated

NEW YORK (AP) — Sample 10-club schedules calling for 162-game seasons in baseball's major leagues, possibly in 1957, will be examined Saturday and Sunday in a series of meetings.

The National League will hold a full-scale meeting Saturday, starting at 1 p. m. (EST), and the American League's expansion committee will go into session at 11 a. m. (EST) Sunday. There will be no joint meetings.

Busy Time Ahead

With these important discussions and a meeting of the special Hall of Fame committee to consider players who have been out of baseball for 25 years, the baseball people will be busy until time for the Sunday-night dinner of the New York chapter of baseball writers.

Walter Gills, president of the National League, said the league would consider whether expansion to 10 clubs is feasible and, if so, when. The sample schedules will include San Francisco, Los Angeles, Montreal, Toronto, Minneapolis - St. Paul and Houston and Dallas in various combinations.

No Change Until 1957

"It is not a question of 1956," said Gills. "It could be in 1957, but I am not sure that a 10-club league is practicable. We owe it to the public to present the most solid league we can, whether it is six, eight or 10 clubs."

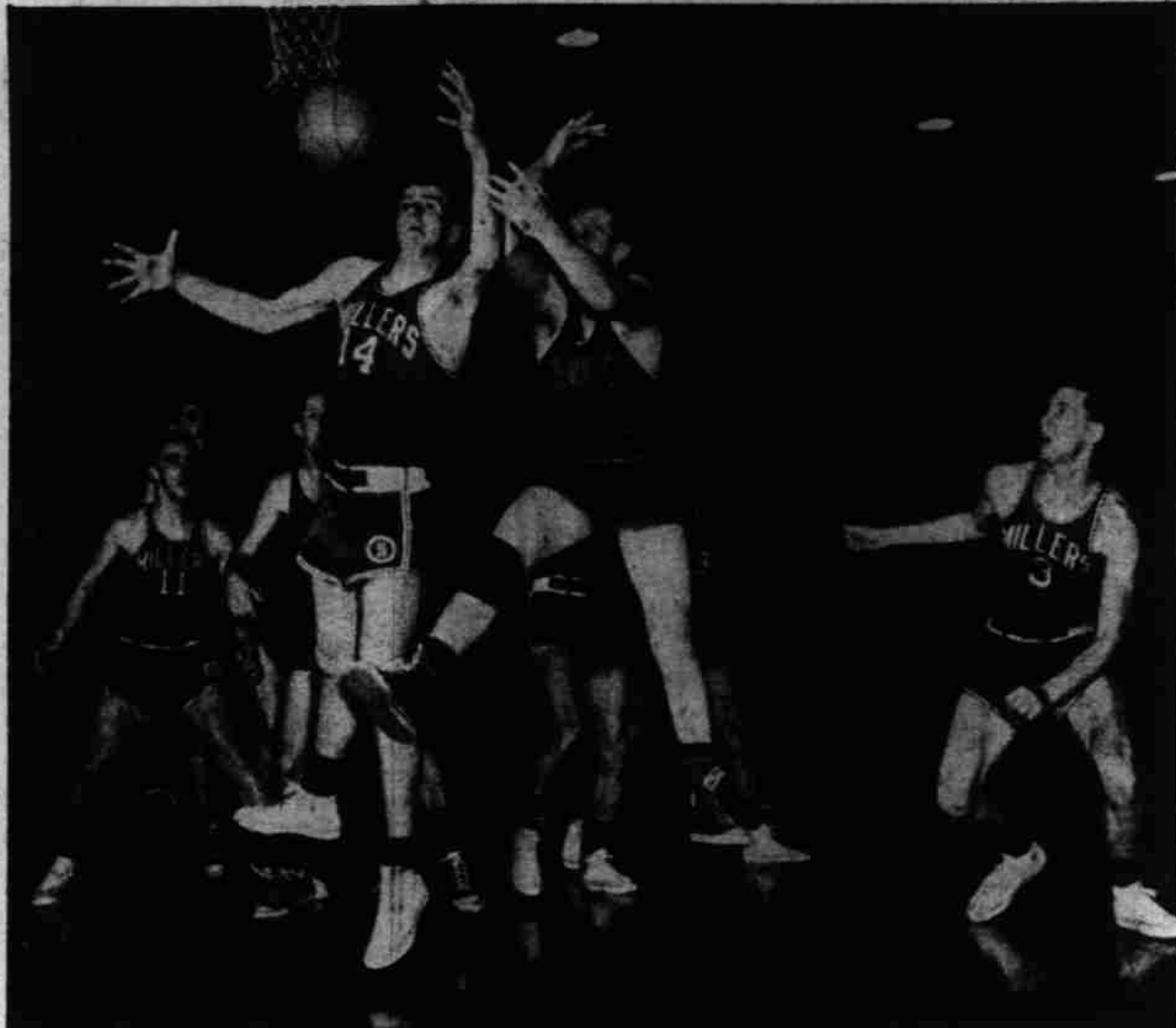
Gills said Phil Wrigley, president of the Chicago Cubs, had made an "extensive, unselfish survey" of the San Francisco and Los Angeles territories. Copies of the survey already have been distributed to the other owners.

Lane Heads Committee

The American League's special committee, headed by Frank Lane, Chicago White Sox general manager, will examine three sets of "dry-run" schedules, each calling for 10 clubs and 162 games. Each team would play the other 18 games, instead of 22 as is the case now.

One of the sample schedules would add San Francisco and Los Angeles to the present eight clubs. Another would add Houston or Dallas and Minneapolis-St. Paul (one club) to the present league. The third would include Minneapolis - St. Paul and Toronto or Montreal, plus the current eight.

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## Ducks Grab Win Over BYU

### Record Broken By Loscutoff

Racehorse Tilt Won By Ducks 82 to 71

EUGENE (AP) — Big Jim Loscutoff set a school scoring record of 35 points Friday night as the Oregon Ducks outran Brigham Young University of the Skyline Conference 82-71 in a non-conference basketball game.

Oregon, the second place team in the Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division, played racehorse basketball with the Cougars from Provo, Utah, and Oregon was ahead most of the way.

Terry Tebbs, BYU guard and smallest on the floor at 5-8, put his team ahead with a basket in the opening seconds, but Loscutoff tied it on a pair of free throws. Center Hersh Pedersen hit a basket but Oregon's Ray Bell countered with two foul shots, before guard Phil McHugh hit a driving shot to put Oregon ahead to stay, 6-4.

Shots by Max Anderson, Jerry Ross and Loscutoff built up a 10-point halftime for Oregon, 41-31. Brigham Young narrowed the margin as the second half opened but Oregon spurred to its longest lead, 53-37, after three minutes. Tebbs sparked a BYU rally but Oregon matched it and stayed ahead the rest of the way.

Tebbs led BYU scorers with 20 points, and Pedersen had 15. Max Anderson was second high for Oregon with 14.

Loscutoff's 35 points came on 13 field goals, including a number of tip-ins, and 11 free throws. The Oregon scoring record was 32 points set by Barney Holland against Washington State College last season. Loscutoff also set a school rebound record of 32, breaking the old mark of 26 held by Oregon's Bob Peterson, now playing with the New York Knickerbockers.

Loscutoff is the leading scorer rebounder in the Northern Division.

The McArthur Court scoring record was not threatened. It is held by Swede Halbrook, the 7-foot, 3-inch Oregon State center, who scored 51 points for Portland's Lincoln High School in the 1952 state tournament.
