Larry Chamberlain with 30 points was high for the night and paced his team to the victory. Next in the firing line came Ron Jones who dunked in 17 points for the victors. Chamberlain's point total included 16 converted free throws out of 19 attempts.

Both teams were equal from the field, each hitting 21 field goals, but OCE's four extra foul shots proved the difference.

The game was close throughout most of the contest, OCE going ahead at 15-14 on a field goal by Chamberlain and never again being pulled. It was 30-22 at the half OTL behind within four points several times but could get no closer in the second half.

OTL won the series opener Friday night, 66-54.

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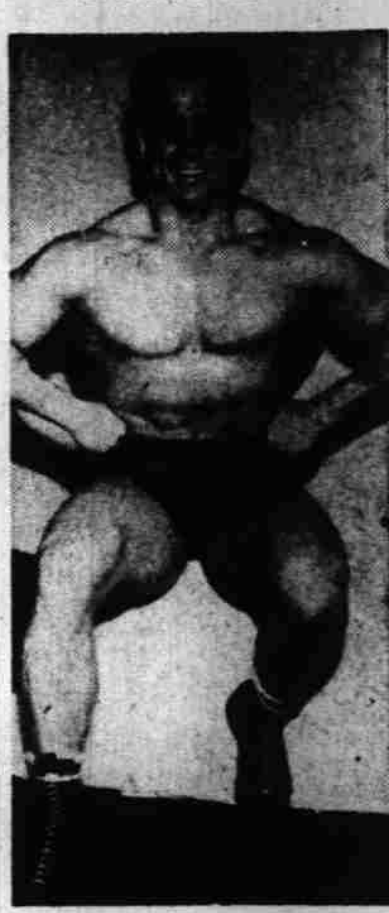
