Lesser Defeats Romack In Doherty Golf Meet

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Pat Lesser, an old nemesis, defeated National Amateur champion Barbara Romack 6 and 5 Sunday in the 36-hole finals of the Helen Lee Doherty Golf Tournament.

The "Lesser jinx" held up Sunday as it had in the past.

Miss Romack has never beaten the 21-year-old Seattle girl in four match meetings.

"My putting and my irons made the difference," the elated Miss Lesser declared after ending the match on the 13th hole in the afternoon round.

This was Miss Lesser's second appearance in the Doherty. Last year she shot an 85 in the qualifying round and failed to make the championship flight.

Miss Romack, 22-year-old Sacramento blonde, played her poorest golf of the tournament. She was stuck close to par until the final round but had trouble all the way Sunday.

"I just wasn't hitting my shots today," Miss Romack said. She missed nine greens in the morning round and eight of the 13 in the afternoon rounds. That's where Miss Lesser's fine long iron game paid off to advantage.

All the spectacular shots were Miss Lesser's. She holed out a 60-foot four-iron shot on 18 for an eagle three, taking a 5-up advantage after the morning round.

On the 20th hole she canned a 25-foot putt for a birdie three to go 6-up and made another sensational shot on the final hole of the match. There she drove caught a fairway trap but she laid a six-iron shot 12 feet from the cup and two-putted for her par to close out the match.

we mean the ability to seat 35,000 plus people.

"2. Is the individual or group making a franchise application properly financed?"

"3. Will intelligent baseball people have charge of the new franchise operation? This is necessary for the successful operation of the new member and also for the protection of the other American League clubs.

"4. Has the individual or group cleared the way in his own league to eliminate any possible legal entanglements involving the American League?"

"5. Is it practical from a schedule and transportation point of view?"

"6. Is the city concerned situated in an area of such population as to warrant serious consideration?"

One of the "dry-run" schedules included two "West Coast cities" (obviously San Francisco and Los Angeles). According to the committee, the mileage would total 269,800 as compared to 137,788 miles in the 1955 schedule. More extensive use of airplane travel would be necessary.

Some Tough, Some Easy For Southern Division

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Southern Division teams of the Pacific Coast Conference left the league for weekend basketball games and found their opposition either woefully weak or far superior.

The University of San Francisco Dons, the class of the West, proved their No. 2 national (AP) ranking by whipping Stanford 76-60 and routing the California Bears 84-62.

In contrast, UCLA and USC found their competition far under par. The Bruins shelled Santa Barbara College 91-62 and trampled Cal Poly (San Luis Obispo) 84-55.

The Trojans found easy pickings in the tradewind country, blasting the Hawaii Navy All-Stars 68-23 and the University of Hawaii 76-43.

The only close matches involved Santa Clara, with the Broncos edging California 66-59 but bowing to Stanford 72-67.

The USC Dons, playing in the San Francisco Cow Palace, displayed a demoralizing defense and methodical offense in swamping Stanford Friday night and California in the next night.

Dons Win 12 Straight
The Dons put 20 on the score board before Cal could tally. Forward Jerry Mullen scored 23 points against the Bears, 24 against the Indians. The games extended the Dons' win streak to 12 straight.

The Stanford-Santa Clara game was tied five times. Center Russ Lawler paced the Indians with 23 points.

Causbie Tops Team Scoring

Neil Causbie, Willamette U's 6-7 sophomore center, is far in front of the others on the Bearcats basketball team in the matter of scoring points, according to latest statistics. Causbie has tallied 280 markers in 17 games for a 15.3 average.

The big Albany center is also leading the team in rebounding with 175.

Dick Hoy, Newberg senior and team captain is second in scoring with 187 points for an 11.0 average. No. 2 rebounder is Tom Gooding with 136. Gooding is third in scoring with 155, behind Dave Gray's 162. Pete Reed, out of action for the balance of the season because of stomach ailment finished with 142 points.

Jack Bishop, Salem sophomore has 108, Jerry McCallister, Mac-Hi soph has 82, and Daryl Gird, Salem junior has 48.

Willamette's current record for all games is 10 wins, 7 losses. The mark is 3-4 in Northwest Conference play.

Samuelstuen Captures Ski Jumping Crown
