Pay Hike Passes

WASHINGTON UN + Congress voted itself a 50 per cent pay raise Tuesday. The House stamped final approval on a salary bill which also provided increases for

federal judges and prosecutors. Acting quickly on a compromise measure worked out in conference with the Senate Monday, the House voted 223-113 to boost congressional salaries from \$15,000 to \$22,500 a year.

The measure now goes to President Eisenhower for virtually cer-tain approval. Eisenhower himself, as had a presidential commission before him, told senators and representatives in January the time had come to allow themselves more money.

Eisenhower didn't recommend specific amount. The \$7,500 finally agreed upon was the amount chosen by the Senate last week and retained in the settlement of differences with the House.

Congress last voted its members a raise in 1946, when the rate was \$10,000 a year.

The legislation as finally enacted retains a \$3,000 tax deduction designed to offset costs of living in Washington as well as back home. The 96 senators and 435 representatives also will be reimbursed for one round-trip home at 20 cents a mile.

Vice President Nixon and House Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex) will receive \$5,000 more than their present \$40,000 a year.

The over-all cost would be just shy of four, million dollars for Congress alone.
