

Reds Charged With Pulling Jets From North Korea Bases

PANMUNJOM, Korea (U)—The UN Command Friday night accused the Reds of hastily pulling out more than 150 Russian-built MIG jets from six North Korean bases to hide them from the eyes of neutral inspection teams.

U.N. Urges Israel, Egypt To End Fight

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (U)—The U. N. Security Council urged Israel and Egypt Friday to stop the fighting on their border in the Southern Palestine desert.

It invited Maj. Gen. Edson L. M. Burns, a Canadian who heads the Palestine truce mission, to fly here at once and report on what was to blame for the bloody clashes at Gaza and what can be done to stop them.

All the council members except Russia, which was silent, deplored the armed clash that killed 39 Egyptians and 8 Israelis last Monday night.

French Delegate Henri Hoppenot said it resulted from an "onslaught by Israel against Egypt."

Other delegates indicated they believed, on the basis of information available, that the clash was started by Israeli forces.

The Israeli delegation said that in the 90-minute council session there was "the tendency of many of the representatives to ignore the entire background" of the clash.

The call for peace on the Gaza front was made by Selim Sarper of Turkey, council president for this month, who said it represented the sentiments of the 10 delegates who spoke. The council decided to recess until General Burns can get here.

Jury Awards Damage Claim

A Marion County Circuit Court jury early Saturday morning decided in favor of plaintiff Mary Sawyer Marty in a damage suit brought against Safeway Stores, Inc., but awarded her only \$8,282.45 as contrasted to \$50,000 the complaint asked.

The jury deliberated almost eight hours before the verdict at 12:20 a. m. Saturday.

The plaintiff had also asked over \$1,300 in special damages for injuries allegedly sustained when her car was struck by a Safeway merchandise truck in January, 1953. Lloyd Kelsey, said to be the driver of the truck, was dropped as a defendant in a non-suit motion by the plaintiff earlier Friday.

The case was heard for two days by Circuit Judge George Duncan before going to the jury late Friday afternoon.

Police Cite Two Youths

Two Salem boys, ages 14 and 15, were booked Friday on shoplifting charges following a complaint from a downtown store, city police reported.

Investigation indicated that several packages of cigarettes, a cigarette lighter and a bottle of leather dye were taken from the store, officers said. The articles were recovered.

According to officers, the boys were questioned about other reported cases of shoplifting in the area. The two later were turned over to their parents and directed to appear in juvenile court on Monday.

said "continuous radar surveillance" by the UN Command established that the last MIGs disappeared the day before the neutral teams left to check on whether the Reds are violating the Korean armistice. He made the charge in a letter to the Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission.

Gen. Carter said radar checks proved that more than 150 MIGs were at the six bases just prior to Feb. 5—the day U. S. Sabre jets tangled with the MIGs over the Yellow Sea.

The UN side claims the MIGs attacked a UN reconnaissance plane, fled into North Korea when the Sabres appeared, were pursued by the Sabres which shot down two MIGs.

From that Feb. 5 incident stemmed a UN charge that the Reds had moved MIGs into North Korea in violation of the armistice. The UN command says aerial photos on the day of the armistice showed no Red planes at the six bases.

Peiping radio, in a broadcast heard Friday night in Tokyo, said Lt. Gen. Lee Sang Cho, Gen. Carter's Red counterpart on the armistice commission, handed the NNSC more proof of "repeated UN violations of the armistice agreement."

The broadcast said the "incomplete data" showed there have been 151 instances in which the UN Command sent its military personnel into North Korea "to carry out hostile acts." Additionally, the broadcast said there have been 73 cases of intrusion by allied planes.

Auto, Train Crash Victims Still Serious

HUBBARD — A Woodburn man was in "poor" condition Friday at Hutchinson General Hospital, Oregon City, following a train-auto collision Thursday evening near here. His wife was reported fair.

Mr. and Mrs. George H. Zeek, whose car was struck by a Southern Pacific passenger train at a crossing on the old Woodburn-Hubbard highway, 50 feet from their home, failed to rally from injuries suffered.

Zeek, 84, the most seriously hurt, was pronounced in critical condition by hospital officials. He suffered a broken leg, deep forehead cut and internal injuries.

His wife, Rilla, 79, was listed as in "fair" condition and suffering from broken ribs.

Man Freed After 11 Months in Jail Without Trial

KLAMATH FALLS (U)—Andrew Bushman, 51, was released Friday after spending 11 months in jail without trial.

Bushman, a carpenter, said, "I still don't know what it was all about."

Police jailed him last April on a morals charge. After that one indictment was dismissed as faulty and two were thrown out on the district attorney's motion. There also was other legal wrangling in connection with the case, three judges having jurisdiction at different times.

Finally Deputy Dist. Atty. Richard Bessley told Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg that two children who were to have testified against Bushman no longer could remember the case and recommended that the judge dismiss it. The judge agreed and Bushman was freed.

Idaho Solons Find Error in Tax Measure

BOISE, Idaho (U)—The 7½ per cent income tax increase bill — already passed by the House — started anew through both houses of the Idaho Legislature late Friday as lawmakers sought to adjourn.

The 33rd session already was one day past the scheduled closing date when a technical error was discovered which would have voided the income tax bill — last revenue-raising measure needed to balance the budget for the next biennium.

Floor leaders expressed confidence that it would clear both houses in time for adjournment sometime Friday night.

When the Legislature wiped out last session's 15 per cent income tax reduction earlier, it repealed a section of the tax code. The 7½ per cent increase was proposed through amendment of that section.

Had the original bill been passed by the Senate Thursday night, and the Legislature adjourned on time, the tax increase would have been void.

Both houses droned through a long string of bills during the day, putting off until the closing hours a vote on the income tax measure and a House vote on the \$15,000,000 minimum education appropriation.

Bend Soldier Dies in Wreck

COLUMBIA, Mo. (U)—One man was killed and another critically injured in a car-truck collision near here Friday night.

The dead man was tentatively identified as Lee Roy Acree, a soldier from Bend, Ore.

Critically injured was Herman Schnettler, 23, an airman from New York, stationed at Scott Field, Ill.

The driver of the car was S. Sgt. Arthur Lee Acree, 36, (no relation) also an airman stationed at Scott Field, Sgt. Acree is from Marshall, Ark.

He said he and Schnettler picked up the passenger, Acree, in St. Louis. The truck driver escaped injury.

Finnish Ship Taking Fuel To Red China

WASHINGTON (U)—United States officials expressed "grave concern" Friday that a Finnish tanker is carrying kerosene suitable for jet engine fuel to Red China.

The vessel is the Aruba, and is chartered to a Chinese Red shipping agency. It is reported in the Suez Canal area after picking up 13,000 tons of high grade kerosene at the Communist Rumanian port of Constanta.

Joseph Reap, a State Department press officer, said the voyage "cannot fail to evoke the disapproval of the Free World" coming as it does at a time of "tension existing in the Far East."

He said the movement of kerosene violates a May, 1951 United Nations resolution which calls on all countries to embargo strategic shipments to Communist China.

Game Group Formed By Olympia House

OLYMPIA (U)—The House Friday passed a resolution to create a bipartisan council to study the control and protection of game animals in the Northwest.

The resolution, which now must be approved by the Senate, would establish an interim legislative committee composed of three members of each House.
