### Stocks Keep Driving Ahead

NEW YORK — Stocks resumed their bull market drive ahead last week after a brief selloff and pushed up to new peak levels.

There were no fireworks in trading at any time, but the average gain was the greatest in four months.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks advanced \$3.70 on the week, the widest gain since the second week of last November. The average closed at \$162.60, highest level in its history. Last week the average lost \$1.00.

Leadership of the rise was excellent and strongly placed in major divisions like steels, railroads, motors and oils.

### Good Week For Bears in Grain Market

CHICAGO — It was another good week for the bears on the Board of Trade last week with only old crop futures being able to resist the downward trend.

Wheat closed the week 1 1/4 lower, corn 3/4-3/8 lower, oats 1/2-1 cent lower, rye 3/4-5/8 lower and soybeans 1/2-3/4 lower and lard 23 to 60 cents a hundred pounds lower.

Liquidation was present everywhere. It was particularly heavy on Wednesday in rye, which broke several cents that day and upset the rest of the market. In corn and soybeans it was less concentrated but more persistent.

Exports were very slender throughout the week and commercial demand limited for all cereals. Cash grain receipts were not unduly heavy.

### Idaho Solos End Session, Win Praise

BOISE, Idaho — The Idaho Legislature ended its 1955 session Saturday, two days late. It was lauded by Gov. Robert E. Smylie for having held the line on expenditures and for balancing the budget with a 9-million dollar general fund tax increase.

Adjournment came at 2:10 p.m. The final day was marked by House passage of the 15-million-dollar public school appropriation, and Senate defeat of a protest move by timber counties on the minimum education program.

Adjournment was delayed an hour and a half past the scheduled time. Speaker of the House R. H. Young Jr. adjourned the House at 2:06 p. m. Lt. Gov. J. Berkeley Larsen banged down the Senate gavel four minutes later.

Smylie, who received virtually everything he asked 62 days ago, went before a joint session shortly before noon to praise the legislators for their bipartisan approach — "with one exception" — to raising taxes.

That referred to the Democratic opposition Friday night when the final 7 1/2 per cent tax increase was approved, 25 per cent overall.

The governor departed from his prepared text in his reference to the possibility of a special session.

"The appropriations provided for some agencies, institutions may have been cut too deep.

"If that should be the case, we can face the problems which may arise from being either over or under in our revenue estimates. We can do this in a special session, or when we meet two years from now."

Smylie threw out a hint that he might veto some appropriation bills when he noted that the bills totaled \$65,000 more than those passed in 1953.

"The upward trend in government cost has been halted for a little while at least," the governor said.

"In this respect you have been one of the most economical legislatures that has met here in many years."
