Teacher Pay Under Study At Silverton

SILVERTON—Silverton school boards are studying a salary schedule set up by a committee from the Silverton Teachers Association, with the board expecting to reach some decision by its March 14 meeting. Dr. Howard Balderstone, superintendent of schools reports.

The proposed schedule set a minimum or starting salary, of \$3300 for teachers with a three-year certificate; \$3500 for those with the bachelor degree; \$3650 for bachelor's plus 45 hours, and \$3750 for master's degree with increments of from \$100 to \$150.

The present salary schedule has starting salaries of \$3200 for three-year certificate; \$3400 for bachelor's degree; \$3500 for bachelor's plus 45 hours work, and \$3600 for master's degree with annual increases of from \$50 to \$100.

The teachers also asked for a clarification of the board's policy on deducting salary for absences for reasons other than illness. The expressed sentiment of the teachers' group was that teachers should be paid the difference between their own wages and that paid to substitutes in such cases. The teachers also expressed interest in finding out what other schools were doing about extra pay for extra duties such as coaching and advisory work that requires "overtime" duties.

Dr. Balderstone reports that the board had already decided to not pay the teachers the difference between the two wages when absences were other than for illness. No action has been taken on "extra duties" pay, and the salary suggestions are being studied between now and March 14, the superintendent said.

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Two of Dallas Go to Aviation Council Meet

DALLAS — The fifth annual conference of the National Aviation Education Council was held February 24-25 in St. Louis, Mo., with Mrs. Lois Alsip, Dallas junior high school teacher, and Mrs. Gertrude Patterson of Monmouth attending from this area.

An outstanding speaker at the two day session, according to Mrs. Alsip, was Dr. John H. Furbay, director, Air World Education, of the New York office of Trans World Airlines and recipient of the 1954 Brewer Trophy award. In his speech on "Aviation and the Cold War" he discussed many developments in aviation being made in countries behind the Iron Curtain. Another interesting address was given by Jacqueline Cochran, only woman to fly a jet plane faster than the speed of sound. She spoke on "A Woman Looks at Aviation Education."

Mrs. Alsip and Mrs. Patterson are officers with the Civil Air Patrol in Salem and flew from Salem to Denver in a navigational training plane with Brig. Gen. Don Zimmerman, Dean of Faculty of the U.S.A.F. Academy. The remainder of the trip to St. Louis and the return trip to the west coast was made in air evacuation planes. These planes have seats on one side of the fuselage only so stretcher cases can be accommodated on trips from one hospital to another. Ordinarily these planes are not authorized to carry anyone except those persons in need of evacuation service, but the two local women were flying on Air Force aircraft with special permission from Washington headquarters.

Although aviation education has, for many years, been a topic of great interest to Mrs. Alsip and Mrs. Patterson, greater interest was created when they wrote prize winning papers in the 50th Anniversary of Powered Flight contest a little over a year ago. As winners, they were flown to Washington, D. C., and attended the Wright Memorial dinner on December 17, 1953.

Little Meningitis Victim Improved

Dallas Youths Cited in Theft Of Explosives

DALLAS — Three teen-age Dallas boys were cited to appear in justice court here Monday on charges of burglary or illegal possession of venison after their arrest by state police.

Two of the youths were linked to the week-old entry of the Oregon Portland Cement Powderhouse near Oakdale east of here last Sunday and theft of two cases of dynamite. The third, Walter Otto, 18, of Dallas, was charged with possession of the deer meat. State Policeman Kenneth Scripser said the deer, a doe and a young buck, were apparently killed two weeks ago near the burglary scene. Carcasses of the doe and part of the buck were found partially buried in the vicinity.

Scripser said the younger boys led police to a place nearby where the explosives had been cached. He said an attempt had been made two weeks ago to shoot the lock off the powder house. An axe was used to gain entry last Sunday.

Library Count Rises Despite TV Influence

JEFFERSON — Young people still are interested in reading good books, despite the popularity of television in their homes, or so it seems by the circulation figures given out by School Librarian Josephine Getchell. Book circulation in both grade and high school libraries is growing all the time.

The first semester circulation in the high school showed a big increase over last year, and already this semester shows signs of beating that record.

In the period from February 3 to 28, 572 books were loaned in the grade school, or an average of 32 books per day. This is a 2.1 average per student.

During the same period, high school circulation reached 542 books, or 30 per day, or 3.2 per student.

Miss Getchell divides her time between the high school and the grade school libraries, and is faculty advisor and play coach among her several after-school responsibilities.
