

Budgetmakers Study Teachers' Pay Issue

School budgetmakers, taking their first long look at the 1955-56 cost of operating Salem schools, gave most of their attention Monday to proposals for new teachers and teacher pay boosts which would cost an estimated \$200,000 annually.

The five-member budget committee and the school board heard Superintendent Walter Snyder's request for 42 new teachers, including another assistant superintendent, and a proposal to revise upward the district's teacher pay schedules.

House Eyes 5 Solutions to School Needs

The house education committee decided Monday night to consider five possible solutions to the building needs of Oregon's 34 most distressed school districts, and to let the other districts take care of their own needs under present laws.

At the same time, the committee said Oregon should proceed independently of the federal government, because it believes that President Eisenhower's plan doesn't offer much relief to Oregon.

Oregon's total school building needs in the next five years are estimated at \$100,000,000 by the state department of education. The program, however, will be aimed at the 34 districts, which are hard up because they couldn't take care of their needs without exceeding the legal bonding limit.

Over Bonding Limit
The building needs in these 34 districts are \$6,000,000 more than their bonding limits. The rest of the new school houses could be built by districts which could bond within existing limits, which are 9 per cent of true cash value.

The five possible solutions to be studied by the committee are: Increase the bonding limits of school districts, give more basic school support to the distressed districts, issue state bonds, provide money from the state's general fund, or finance on the county level.

The committee decided to make its decision after the house taxation committee makes up its mind on a bill to limit bonding powers of counties, cities and school districts.

Committee members suggested that districts might operate two daily shifts, or might run 12 months a year. But these ideas were advanced only in case the people in the districts refused to vote new bonds.

Here are the 34 school districts which the state education committee says are the most distressed from the standpoint of needing new buildings for schools.

Albania Rejects U.S. Food Offer

MUNICH, Germany (AP) — Communist Albania rejected Monday President Eisenhower's offer of American food. The tiny Soviet satellite angrily accused the United States of slandering, intervention and attempting to overthrow the Albanian regime.

The Albanian government news agency ATA in a broadcast monitored by Radio Free Europe, said it was authorized to declare that "The so-called aid offered by the American government is unacceptable to the Albanian people who with contempt and disgust reject this foreign intervention into their own affairs."

Priest Terms Expulsion 'Retaliation'

NEW YORK (UP) — The Rev. Georges Bissonnette said Monday his unexplained expulsion from the Soviet Union may have been in retaliation to the United States for its refusal to renew the temporary visa of a Russian Orthodox archbishop.

The Roman Catholic priest said that "most diplomats and correspondents in Moscow" felt his expulsion resulted from American refusal to renew the visa of Russian Orthodox Archbishop Boris, who left the United States 10 days ago.

He said there was no other apparent reason for the Russians' sudden order for him to leave the country.

Father Bissonnette arrived here by plane from Stockholm and talked with newsmen shortly after clearing customs inspection. He appeared healthy and fit and at times seemed embarrassed by all the attention.

Father Bissonnette, 33, was met at the airport by his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. George Bissonnette, and a sister, Rose, 29, of Central Falls, R.I.

Senator Welker of Idaho Collapses

Complaint Filed to Test Ban On Solons Working for State

A member of the 1955 legislature, Dr. F. H. Dammasch, filed a complaint against the State Industrial Accident Commission Monday afternoon. Dammasch is seeking a declaratory judgment on whether he is violating the Constitution by serving as a member of the legislature and as a part-time physician on a fee basis for the Commission. Dammasch maintains he is not in violation.

Civil Defense Siren Sounds Simplified

WASHINGTON (AP) — New simplified signals will be used on sirens, horns and similar warning devices in event of enemy air attacks, the Federal Civil Defense Administration said Monday night.

The new system, effective at once, will supersede previous warning instructions.

The new signals are:

1. Alert signal — a steady blast of three to five minutes on warning devices.

2. Take cover signal — a wailing tone or a series of short blasts of three minutes duration.

The FCDA said the new signals were agreed upon by the United States and Canada.

Val Peterson, federal civil defense administrator, said the two governments agreed to the new warning signals because they believe "the public can be more readily trained to recognize them and to take appropriate action in accordance with local civil defense survival plans."

Signal Evacuation
The announcement said that in most target areas, the alert signal will indicate evacuation.

In most non-target areas, the same signal will mean that civil defense forces are to mobilize.

In both cases, the FCDA said, prompt specific instructions will be given over Conelrad radio frequencies of 640 and 1240 and by all other possible means of communication.

It will be the responsibility of the appropriate civil defense authorities to assign the specific action of either evacuation or mobilization indicated by the alert signal, the announcement said.

Take Cover Signal
The announcement added: "It will be the responsibility of appropriate civil defense authorities to assign the specific action of either evacuation or mobilization indicated by the alert signal. The take cover signal will indicate that attack is imminent and the public should take the best available shelter."

"FCDA will launch an intensive educational campaign to familiarize all citizens with the meaning of the signals, and to emphasize the life-or-death importance of knowing what they mean."

"The signals may be sounded in any order or sequence, depending upon specific local situations. It will be necessary therefore for every citizen to know the meaning in his local area of each of the two signals."
