

Demo Plan Aims to Cut Tax on Low Incomes, Boost Revenue

WASHINGTON — Senate Democratic leaders came up Wednesday with a new tax plan they said would cut the income taxes of low income families by \$90 million dollars a year while actually increasing federal revenue.

Taxes on stockholders and corporations would be boosted.

Majority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas claimed if Congress accepted the plan and the Eisenhower administration followed a "reasonably prudent" course the budget could be balanced in fiscal 1957.

The new proposal would substitute for a bill passed by the House to cut income taxes \$20 a year for every taxpayer and dependent beginning next Jan. 1.

The new plan would give each head of a household a \$20 cut plus \$10 for each dependent, other than a spouse.

Johnson explained that this provision could be used, however, only to the extent that it exceeds the advantages of income tax splitting now enjoyed by married couples, and that the general effect would be to limit the reduction to families with incomes below \$5,000.

Gasoline Price War Closes Dallas Station

DALLAS, Ore. — A Dallas service station owner, Donald Lloyd, has closed his station, Lloyd's Courtesy Corner Gas Service Station, as a result of the current price war in the Salem-Dallas area.

Lloyd said Wednesday night that his station closed a week ago when the Salem firm providing his gasoline refused to supply him unless he upped his gas prices.

Lloyd had earlier cut prices on regular gasoline to 23 cents and on premium gas to 27 cents.

Lloyd said he cut prices to be in line with Salem competitive prices. Since oil companies are subsidizing Salem's gas war, he said, Dallas should have some of the benefit of it, too.

Lloyd's gas supply company refused to subsidize him, maintaining that the price war had not spread to Dallas, according to Warren Doolittle, who heads the Salem office of the firm from which he gets his gas. Doolittle said he told Lloyd he would be supplied with gasoline at regular prices if he wanted it on that basis.

State Medical School Policy Friction Aired

Whether Oregon's organized medical profession has been kept in the dark about the state's medical school policy was debated Wednesday night at a hearing in the Capitol before the Senate education committee.

Defending their bill seeking to legislate an official five-member advisory committee to the medical school, representatives of the Oregon State Medical Society said they hadn't been consulted on policy and there had been a growing friction over the matter, especially over policy for the new teaching hospital.

Members of the State Board of Higher Education said they hadn't been aware of any such friction until very recently.

Never Suggested

Clyde Foley, executive of the medical society, said the doctors preferred not to go over the medical dean's head. He added, in response to a direct question, that the society had never suggested to the Board of Higher Education a volunteer advisory committee of doctors.

Among doctors appearing before the committee, Dr. Russell Kaufman, Portland, said a Multnomah County Medical Society poll showed 267 doctors favoring the advisory committee and 49 opposed.

Dr. Richard H. Upjohn, Salem, said the Marion-Polk Medical Society had taken no official stand but he had talked to many members and found no opposition to the bill.

Would Nominate

Under the proposed law, the Medical Society would nominate doctors for the governor to appoint to the committee. Several committee members and opponents of the bill questioned the wording which indicates the higher education must seek the advisory council's advice on all policy matters.

Dr. Charles D. Byrne, chancellor of higher education, said the state board had always been open to suggestions and criticisms but hadn't heard from the medical society for 23 years, until just recently.

He predicted the bill would create friction, cause long delays in policy matters and would be a "step backwards" toward the pre-1929 period in which each higher education institution was run by a separate board.

Mrs. Holtorff Of Lyons Dies

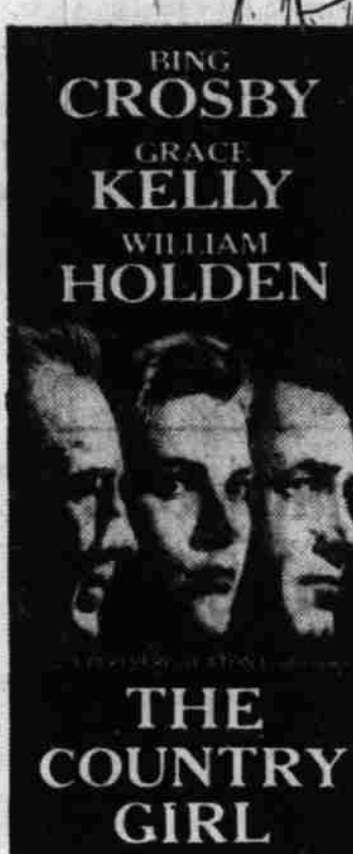
