When the couple left on their wedding trip the new Mrs. Hall donned navy blue crepe suit with navy and white accessories. The newlyweds will make their home in Portland.

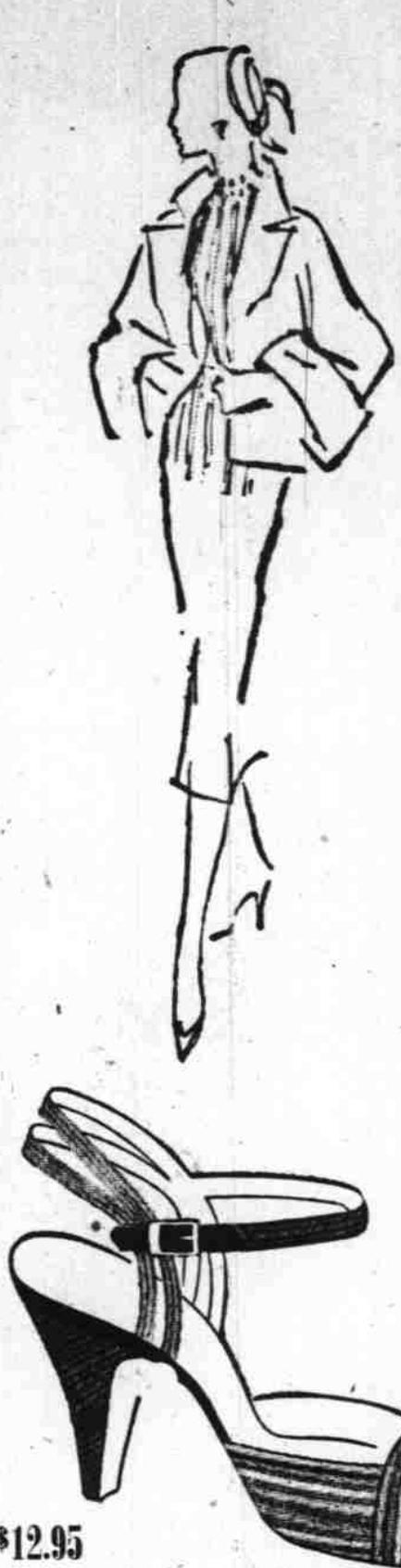
