U.S. National now serves Salem with four banking offices. Ladd & Bush-Salem at State and Commercial streets was established in 1940 following merger of the old Ladd & Bush bank with the U.S. National's own Salem branch which had been in operation since 1933. West Salem at 1117 Edgewater St. was opened in 1949.

Rep. Geary Sees Sales Tax Defeat

KLAMATH FALLS (UP)—Rep. Ed Geary, speaker of the Oregon House of Representatives, told the Chamber of Commerce here Saturday he did not believe any Oregon Legislature could ever put over a sales tax.

Geary, mentioning the sales levy as one of the proposals for meeting the state's impending budget deficiency, said there surely would be a referendum attack on such a tax.

He pointed out that the voters have five times defeated sales tax proposals and said he believed the only way a sales tax ever might be adopted is by the people themselves initiating it.

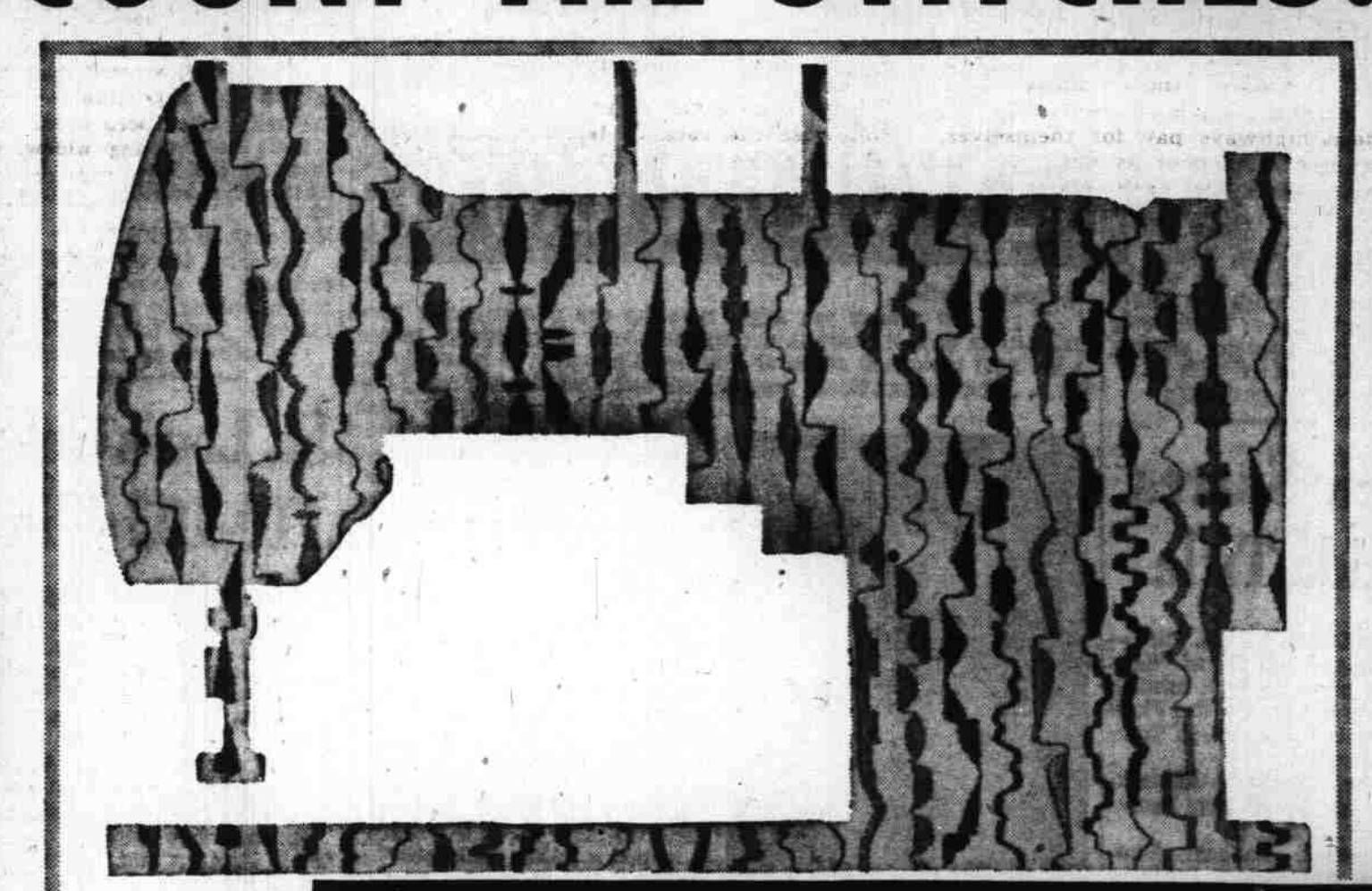
He has been in similar business for the past seven years following service in World War II and graduation from George Pepperdine University at Los Angeles in 1948.

Word of the grant was received here by William H. Carson, chairman of the library development committee. He said the University of Washington's school of librarianship will make the study.

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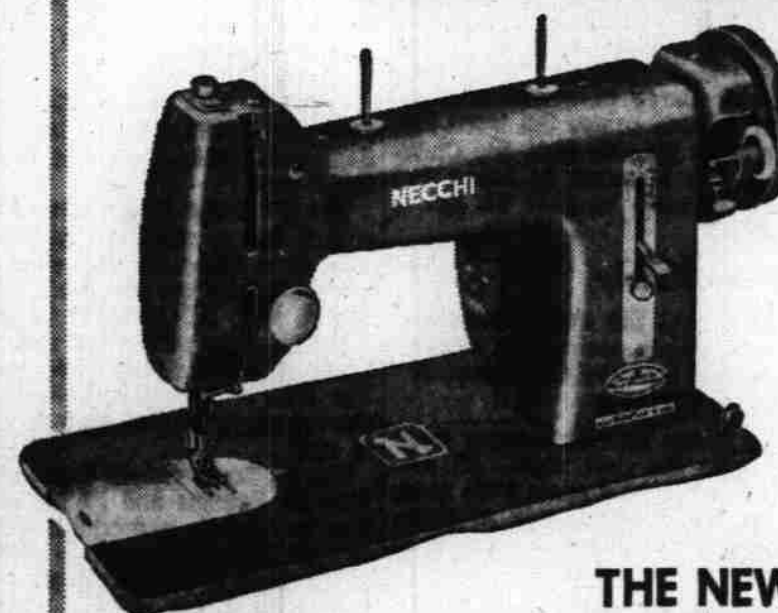
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
