NW Loop Names Cage Standouts for Year

Both Elgin Baylor and R. C. Owens of the College of Idaho, Norm (Hawk) Hubert and Danny French of Pacific and Don Porter of Linfield landed berths on the 1955 Northwest Conference All-Star basketball team, announced Saturday.

The team members were selected by the coaches in the circuit, but they were not allowed to vote for members of their respective squads.

Baylor, Owens, Hubert and French were unanimous selections. Porter was within one vote of being such.

On the second team are Don Robinson of Whitman, Dick Hoy and Neil Causbie of Willamette, Del Klucker of Whitman and Bill Klucker of College of Idaho.

Honorable mentions went to Rex Gwinn and Bob Becker of Whitman, Loren Michelson, Gary Jackson and Hal Adair of Lewis & Clark, Daryl Girod and Dave Gray of Willamette, Dave Sanford of Linfield, Ed Ramsdell of Pacific and George Makini of College of Idaho.

Baylor is a freshman at C of I, which won the title with a record breaking 15-0 record. Baylor established new scoring marks for the conference also in his first year. Porter, Owens and French are juniors, and Hubert is the only senior.

This is the third straight year that Owens has made the mythical team. Hubert was named last year also.

Boxing Group Fines Gavilan

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. — The Miami Beach Boxing Commission fined former welterweight boxing champion Kid Gavilan and his trainer \$100 each Saturday for protesting they made to newspaper reporters after the Kid lost a close decision to Hector Constance here Feb. 23.

The five-man board ruled that their remarks, made in the dressing room after the fight, were "deliberate to boxing." Gavilan's trainer, Mundito Medina, admitted he shouted "crooks" and "robbers" at the fight, but he said he was talking to fans and did not mean to imply that any of the fight officials were included.

Gavilan, of Cuba, told the board he had little to say after the fight except that he thought he won it. Various newspaper reporters in their columns after the fight quoted Gavilan as saying "perhaps the officials here are honest, but they were not honest tonight."

Cardinals Hurlers Star; Giants Bow to Indians

For the third straight day, the St. Louis Cardinals' pitchers continued to display their effectiveness and the Red Birds posted their third consecutive exhibition baseball victory Saturday.

Rookie Luis Arroyo, veteran reliever Frank Smith and southpaw Paul LaPalme gave up six hits as the Cards defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates 3-1. St. Louis blanked the New York Yankees 7-0 Thursday and also edge the Yanks 3-1 Friday.

Smith, who was acquired from the Cincinnati Reds during the winter, was particularly impressive, was particularly impressive and may turn out to be the dependable relief hurler Manager Eddie Stanky is looking for.

In three innings, he retired nine of the 10 batters he faced and only one ball was hit out of the infield against him.

Arroyo, a Puerto Rican, started for the Cards and gave up the lone run and three hits. LaPalme, a knuckleball specialist who was with Pittsburgh last season, allowed his former mates two hits in his three-inning stint.

Stanky's single drove home Red Shoendienst from second base to put St. Louis ahead 2-1 in the fifth inning. Rookie Bill Virmond double in the seventh and scored on Solly Hemus' single.

The Milwaukee Braves went on an extra base rampage to blast out a 9-6 triumph over the Detroit Tigers. Eight of Milwaukee's 13 hits were for extra bases, including home runs by Bobby Thomson and Jim Pendleton.

Spahn Huris Win Warren Spahn was the winning pitcher and Ben Flowers, who gave up four runs in the first inning, was the loser.

Rookie catcher Pete Daley collected four hits to help the Boston Red Sox nip the New York Yankees 3-2. Daley's final safety batted in Boston's winning run in the eighth and sent the Yanks reeling to their third setback in a row.

New York has scored only three runs in 27 innings.

The Yanks led 2-1 until the eighth when Tom Gorman walked three batters in succession. Grady Hatton tied the score with a sacrifice fly and then Daley, who batted .275 for Louisville last year, singled to left. Tom Hurd was the winning pitcher and Gorman took the defeat.

Philis Top Redlegs Rookie Lou Ortiz bunted home the winning run as the Philadelphia Phils eked out a 3-2 victory over the Cincinnati Redlegs. Earlier in the game the 30-year-old second baseman, up from Rochester, singled home another tally.

Bob Miller, who yielded the Reds' two runs on Bob Thurman's homer, two walks and a single by Johnny Temple, gained the Philadelphia triumph—its third straight. Rookie southpaw Cliff Ross was charged with the loss.

The Washington Senators erupted for 10 runs in the seventh inning to rout the Kansas City Athletics 12-1. The Nats produced only three hits in their big frame, but were aided by seven walks by Hal Raether and Ed Bertschy. Maurice McDermott was the winner and Ted Gray the loser.

Cleveland, held scoreless for eight innings, tied the score in the ninth with a three-run rally, featuring a home run by Al Rosen. The Giants got only two hits off five Indians' pitchers. One was a three-run home run by Willie Mays in the first inning. The other was a pinch single by Eric Rodin in the 10th frame.

Against the Cubs the Giants collected only five hits off three pitchers, Bob Rush, Paul Minner and Sam Jones. The Cubs scored all their runs off southpaw Johnny Antonelli in the first three innings. Antonelli gave up six of Chicago's nine hits.

San Francisco Edges Beavers

CHICAGO (AP) — The Chicago Cardinals took a big step toward solving their quarterbacking problems Saturday by signing Billy Hooper of Baylor and Ogden Compton of Hardin-Simmons.

Hooper last year led the Southwest Conference in passing with 56 completions in 107 attempts for 818 yards and six touchdowns.

Compton was selected All-Border Conference quarterback in 1952 when he completed 51 of 94 passes for 729 yards and nine touchdowns.

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80 Cars Ready In Grand Prix

SEBRING, Fla. — At 10 a. m. Sunday, the flash of the starter's green flag will send 80 of the fastest sports cars in competition roaring away from the starting line in Florida's famous International Grand Prix of Endurance.

Before the brutal test of a man's nerves and a machine's durability ends in darkness 12 hours later, half of the fleet cars will have been abandoned in their pits—crippled by the hot and dangerous pace.

The deafening whine of powerful motors will shatter the traditional quiet of this small city in the heart of Florida's orange groves and will be heard around the world, for to sportsmen overseas this is the No. 1 sports event in the United States.

No gold is offered but famous drivers come from all over Europe and South America to compete in the Sebring race.

Their goal is the coveted points offered toward the world sports car championship. This is the only race in the U. S. in which such points can be earned. There are seven others—in Italy, Germany, France, Sicily, England, Mexico and Argentina.

Ferraris Favored Favored to grab the lion's share of the honors are the world-champion Ferraris from Italy in the unlimited class and in the smaller divisions, the giant-killing Osca of Italy and the tough Porsches of Germany.

British champion Stirling Moss drove one of the tiny Osca's to a startling triumph here last year when mechanical difficulties knocked the bigger cars out of the race.

For the first time since he came up to the big leagues with the Cardinals in 1938, Enos Slaughter's name is missing from the St. Louis spring roster.
