Detroit Raps Montreal Club

DETROIT (AP) — The Detroit Red Wings turned hockey's "Game of the Year" into an avalanche of goals Sunday night to trounce the Montreal Canadiens 6-0, and clinch their seventh straight National Hockey League championship.

A corps of 70 policemen—more than twice the usual number—was sprinkled throughout the stands to prevent a repetition of last Thursday's ugly riot in Montreal Forum.

Despite the presence of the men in blue, the crowd had some fun, but all of it was harmless. In the second period a live baby octopus was tossed onto the ice; someone else set off a string of firecrackers.

It was small solace to the Canadiens but they left the ice with one honor. Bernie Geoffrion finished as the league's scoring champion with 75 points, one more than teammate Maurice (Rocket) Richard, whose suspension last week touched off one of the most heated controversies the game has ever known.

LANDING NET TIPS

WHEN USING A LIGHT-HOOPED NET TO LAND A HEAVY FISH, GRASP THE HOOP OPPOSITE ITS HANDLE SO HOOP WON'T BEND OR BREAK WHEN LIFTING THE FISH OUT OF THE WATER.

NET A FISH TAIL-FIRST IF IT IS HOOKED ON A LURE HAVING TREBLE HOOKS OUTSIDE FISH'S MOUTH. THIS PREVENTS THE HOOKS FROM SNAGGING IN THE NET'S TOP BEFORE FISH IS IN THE NET FOR A POSSIBLE ESCAPE. BE SURE THE NET IS COMPLETELY SUBMERGED UNDER THE FISH, AND HOLD THE FISH'S HEAD ABOVE THE SURFACE AS YOU LIFT THE NET.

NIT All-Star Team Named

NEW YORK (AP)—Maurice Stokes, All-America Dick Ricketts, St. Green, Johnny Horan and Ed Fleming. That's the Associated Press 1955 all-star National Invitation Basketball Tournament team.

Picking them was easy. Off what they showed in the week-long NIT, won Saturday night by Duquesne, there was no doubt they were the best of the lot.

It was Stokes, Maurice the magnificent, who almost single handedly carried little St. Francis (Pa.) into the semifinals. And it was not his fault that the Frankies missed getting into the finals.

He scored 43 points, rebounded excellently, fed beautifully and defended superbly as St. Francis finally gave in to Dayton in overtime. And he almost matched that demonstration in the third-place game, as St. Francis again fell short in overtime, 96-91, to Cincinnati.

Stokes was the unanimous choice of the NIT committee for the tournament's most valuable player award. What Stokes just missed doing to Dayton in the semifinals, Ricketts and Green of Duquesne accomplished in the championship game.

The Dukes, who had been fourth, third and the runnerup in succession in three previous years, finally clicked to whip Dayton 70-58—and Ricketts and Green scored 56 points between them.
