

Oregon Chest Proposes New UF Members

The Oregon Chest, which has agreed to provide a campaign director for Marion County's next United Fund drive, has submitted several recommendations to the county group, including one that 22 new members be added to the Board of Directors.

Campaign director will be R. H. Vincent, who met earlier this week with board members.

Recommendations submitted by the Chest included drawing up definite solicitation districts. The question of how to handle the Salem fringe area remains undecided at present, but the Chest suggested it might be necessary to set up a separate district responsible for soliciting this area.

The state group also suggested that a joint budget for the Marion County and Salem United Fund be drawn up. This plan would involve consideration of countywide budgets of agencies that participate in both funds with a definite percentage split of the countywide budget of each agency being arranged.

The Chest also pointed out that if Salem workers are to solicit state employees in the next campaign and retain all proceeds, then Salem should take a higher percentage of the agency countywide quota than in the past.

A secretary during and just prior to the next campaign will be required, the report concluded.

Incubated Egg Sales Warning Given by State

The State Agriculture Department has issued a seasonal warning to hatcherymen and commercial egg breakers that every incubated egg sold or offered for sale must be stamped with the word "incubated."

This is required under the state egg law, which permits salvaging of incubated "clears" (infertile eggs) for sale to egg breakers provided every individual egg carries the word "incubated."

Eggs in this category are any which have been under incubation—natural or artificial—for more than 48 hours, according to O. K. Beals, chief of the department's division of foods and dairies.

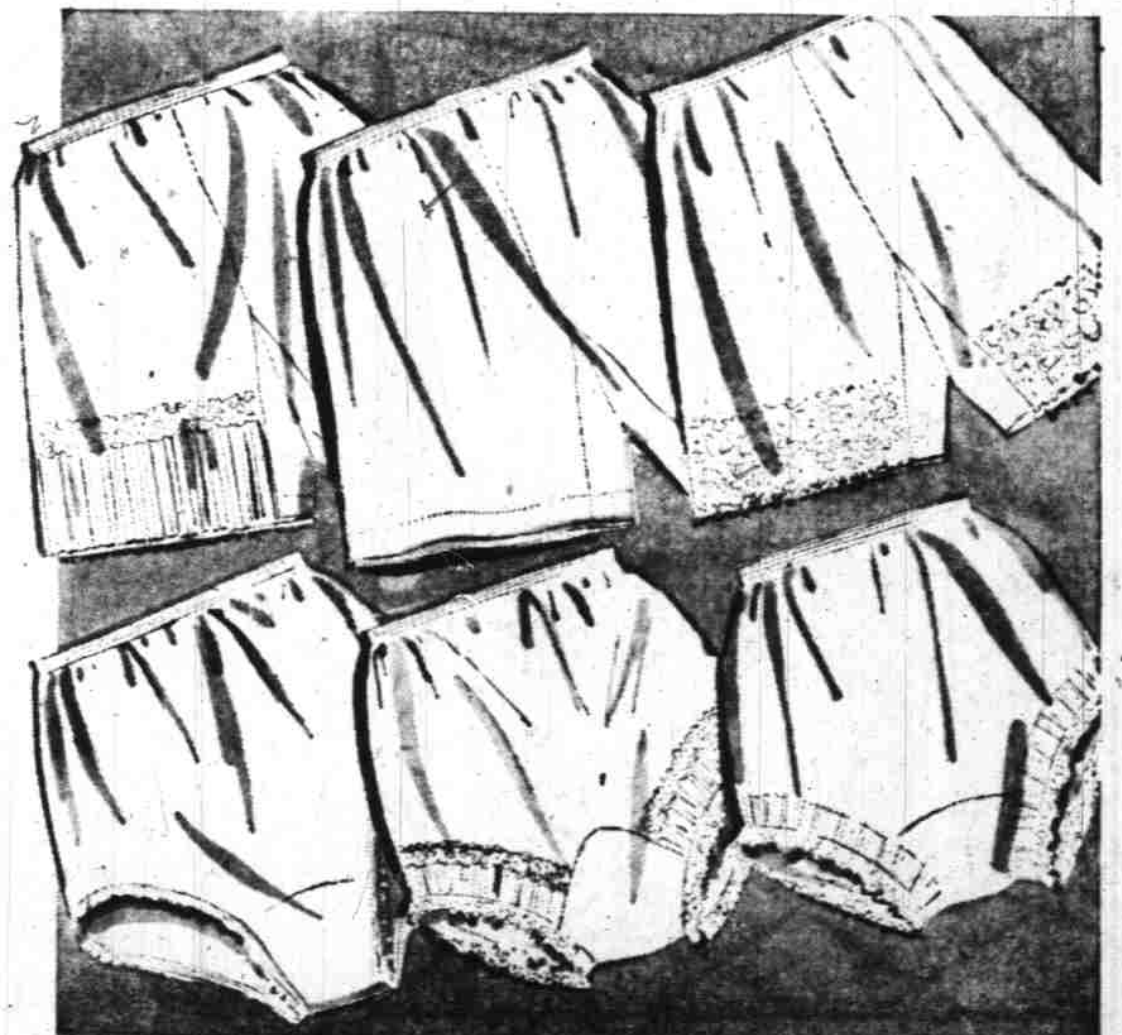
