

Gore Appeals for Cancellation Of Dixon-Yates Power Contract

WASHINGTON (AP)—Armed with a critical new report by an Eisenhower appointee, Sen. Gore (D-Tenn.) Saturday appealed directly to President Eisenhower to cancel the Dixon-Yates electric power contract.

The report was issued by the General Accounting Office, headed by Comptroller General Joseph Campbell.

The criticism was directed, not at the power contract, but at Ebasco Services, Inc., New York utility engineering company which has been proposed for the job of designing and supervising construction of the Dixon-Yates plant.

The report said construction costs of another power plant for which Ebasco had the construction contract ran 31 million dollars more than estimates.

The Appointee

Gore, in an interview, noted that the criticism came from an agency headed by an Eisenhower appointee. Campbell, who was recently appointed by Eisenhower, was formerly a member of the Atomic Energy Commission and in that position approved the Dixon-Yates contract.

Concerning the report on Ebasco, Gore said:

"I marked the important sections of the report for the President, and sent it to the White House by special delivery last night."

Gore's letter to the President said:

"In view of the contents of this report, I again suggest the advisability of your withdrawing your personal direction to the Atomic Energy Commission to enter into this uneconomical, unsound, and unwise contract."

Senate Fight

Gore has been spearheading a

Senate fight to prevent or to cancel the contract which the President directed the AEC to negotiate with a private utility group headed by Edgar Dixon and E. A. Yates.

"This Campbell report certainly gave it a blackeye," Gore said. "This shows that the taxpayers will pay through the nose in high rates if the Dixon-Yates move should go through because this all is the same outfit," he added.

Campbell's report dealt with an AEC contract to get power from a private utility plant at Joppla, Ill., in which Ebasco Services had an important part until eliminated.

The report noted that Ebasco and other companies, including some involved in Dixon-Yates, were or had been wholly owned subsidiaries of the Electric Bond & Share Corp.

'Ebasco Fiasco'

Gore and Sen. Anderson (D-NM), chairman of the congressional atomic committee, both refer to the Joppla plant as "the Ebasco fiasco" and Gore repeated

this in his letter to the President. Campbell noted in his report that "the Mississippi Valley Generating Company (known as the Dixon-Yates group) is considering using Ebasco for design engineering and construction of its power plant at West Memphis, Ark."

The comptroller general recommended against this, until a dispute over extra costs and fees on the Joppla plant is settled, or unless the government (AEC) is protected against higher costs and additional fees under the Dixon-Yates contract.

Russians Drag 4 Refugees From Hospital

VIENNA, Austria (UP)—Russian troops entered an Austrian hospital and dragged away four Hungarians, two of them bleeding and unconscious, who had crawled through an exploding mine field to reach freedom, Austrian police said Saturday.

They said the Hungarians were members of the same family. The police said one member of the family begged Austrian doctors to kill them with hypodermic injections as the Russians carried them away "like pigs."

8-Year-Old Girl

The family included a grandfather, his son and daughter-in-law, and a little girl about eight. The grandfather and the woman were injured seriously in their escape.

They had just undergone emergency surgery at a hospital in the Austrian town of Eisenstadt, near the Iron Curtain, when they were seized by the Reds.

Another man was reported killed in the attempted escape from Hungary. His wife was listed as missing.

Off Operating Table

Austrian police and hospital workers stood by helplessly as the Russians entered the hospital, ordered the Hungarians taken from their beds and drove away with them.

The chief doctor at the hospital, operated by the Compassionate Brothers religious order, warned that moving the wounded Hungarians might cost their lives.

They had just come off the operating tables and still were unconscious. They wore nothing but bandages.

Take Fruit From Child

Nurses tried to press gifts of oranges and bananas into the hands of the child before the Russians took the family back to Hungary.

A woman in a Soviet Army uniform barked that all gifts were forbidden and brushed the fruit away.

The four members of the family were identified as:

Istvan Bago, 60, a gardener, seriously injured in one leg by mine fragments.

Johann Bago, 33, his son, uninjured.

Maria Bago, 34, wife of Johann, seriously injured in both legs.

Ann Bago, seven or eight years old, uninjured.

PORTLAND (AP)—A bolt of lightning struck a power line Saturday, traveling to a Pacific Power and Light sub-station where it blew out a transformer and threw a workman 25 feet through the door.

He is Harold Judd of Vancouver, Wash., who suffered only a few bumps and scratches in the explosion.

Oscar Winner Mother of Son

NEW YORK (AP)—Eva Marie Saint, adjudged the best supporting film actress for 1954, gave birth Saturday to a son at Mount Sinai Hospital.

The wife of Jeffrey Hayden, a television director, she received an Oscar for her performance in "On The Waterfront."

Churchill to Leave on Sicily Trip April 12

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill will leave for a vacation in Sicily April 12, his aides reported Saturday night. All Britain believes it will be his first real taste of retirement after resigning the premiership some time next week.

Aides said the 80-year-old Premier plans "just to sit in the sun" for his first long rest in months.

A spokesman at 10 Downing St., Churchill's official residence, denied reports the Prime Minister had put back his 16-day trip by three days because of the illness of his friend Viscount Bridport, whom he plans to visit at Catania, Sicily.

"This is the first official indication of the Prime Minister's departure date," the spokesman said.

"There have been reports in the press he was leaving April 9, but these have never been confirmed by his office."

"The Prime Minister planned this visit some weeks ago, but until today the date was never finally set. He wants to spend the Easter week end in London."

Meanwhile, opinion hardened in this newspaperless capital that the Prime Minister will step down next week — probably Tuesday.

Current belief is that he will inform Queen Elizabeth II of his intention to resign when she and the Duke of Edinburgh dine at No. 10 next Monday night. The next morning he is expected to hand the resignation formally to the Queen at Buckingham Palace.

PORTLAND (AP)—One hundred and ten persons have asked a chance to testify in the Hells Canyon Dam hearing to be held in Portland by a Senate subcommittee Wednesday.

M. C. Mapes Jr., special counsel for the subcommittee, said 55 favor and 55 oppose the proposed federal dam in the Snake River.

He said not all may be heard, and advised prospective witnesses to prepare statements that can be left with the committee.

Henry Alderman, Portland, acting as co-ordinator for those favoring the bill, said, "The committee came out here to hear the little man. They should remember that when they get around to deciding who will be heard and who won't."

Chester K. Sterrett, co-ordinator for opponents, said, "I have been told we will both have equal amounts of time. I am sure the committee will be fair if they don't have time to hear all the testimony."

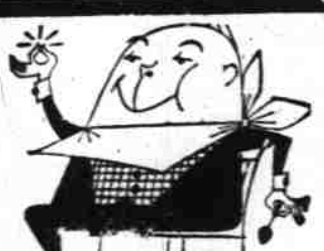
