Boat Owners' Water Safety Meeting Set

Water safety and Coast Guard regulations will be explained to Salem boating enthusiasts at a meeting to be held Wednesday at 8 p. m. at the Salem Memorial Hospital chapel.

Officials of the Coast Guard auxiliary will be here to outline regulations in force for water traffic. The auxiliary is comprised of a group of small boat operators whose aim is to assist the regular Coast Guard in teaching safety to the small boat owner.

Death Claims Widow of Past State Justice

Mrs. Lorena Wise Burnett, 86, widow of a former chief justice of the Oregon Supreme Court, died Friday at Tracey, Calif., according to word reaching Salem.

Her husband, Judge George H. Burnett, was a member of the Supreme Court for a number of years up to his death some 20 years ago. Mrs. Burnett had resided in recent years with a daughter, Mrs. Florence Wise Emmert, in Tracey, Calif.

She was born at Rochester, Minn., Oct. 21, 1868. Mrs. Burnett was a member of Chadwick Chapter No. 37 of the Order of Eastern Star and of Nydia Temple No. 4 of Daughters of the Nile.

Surviving in addition to the daughter in the California city, is another daughter, Mrs. Frances Wise Matthews, Seattle, and several grandchildren. A son, Lawrence Wise, died several years ago.

Funeral services will be held Monday at Tracey.

Registration Date for State Planes Told

All aircraft not registered with the Oregon State Board of Aeronautics by April 30 will be subject to the state personal property tax, it was announced Saturday by Earl W. Snyder, board director.

Snyder also cautioned pilots that if they are to exercise their privileges as airmen, they must register with the board. Pilot registration fee is \$1, the fees being used to defray the cost of conducting search and rescue missions.

Registration fee is \$5 for aircraft having a CAA certificated gross weight of 2,000 pounds or under. The fee for craft of 2,001 or over is \$10, Snyder said.
