

Commission Upholds Liquor Board Refusal To Reinstate Employee

The State Civil Service Commission Thursday upheld the State Liquor Board's refusal to reinstate Carl Glos, liquor board's hearing officer, who was asked to resign for allegedly accepting cash gifts from a Portland tavern operator.

Glos resigned last February, then asked to be reinstated. The liquor board denied the request and the matter was referred to the civil service board.

Atomic Blast To Test Effect On Weapons

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (U) — The major weapons effect test of the 1955 atomic series is scheduled tentatively for Friday morning.

The Atomic Energy Commission set the 400-foot tower shot on Frenchman Flat for 9 a.m. But, just in case the weather is adverse, the AEC readied an alternate shot from a 300-foot tower on Yucca Flat for 4:30 a.m.

As and when it comes, three F30 jet drone planes will be subjected to the Frenchman Flat blast, which also will test the effects of blast, heat and radiation on three types of surfaces, including a specially built artificial lake.

The AEC said one or two of the remote-controlled drones may be shot down.

The AEC also gave these details of the forthcoming big test:

An undisclosed number of Army vehicles, road graders and tractors will be exposed at varying distances from ground zero.

The Army Chemical Corps has set up defense fortifications lined with lightweight diffusion boards. Crates of supplies will be exposed, as will the latest "hot-dry" atomic combat uniforms.

Air Force, Navy and Marine planes—100 in all—are scheduled to participate.

But attention will center on what happens to the jet drones.

Two of the drones will be taken so close in, the AEC said, it is possible they will be destroyed. The third is expected to survive.

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Oppenheimer Ban Opposed By Faculty

SEATTLE (U) — The University of Washington faculty senate announced Thursday it had voted 56-40 to disagree with the decision which banned Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer from the university campus this spring as a guest lecturer.

One faculty member in the 100-man senate did not vote and three said they could not make a decision.

At the same time the senate issued a statement expressing regret at "the damage done to the University by the decision . . . and the occasional intemperance in the resulting public discussion."

It said, however, it believed "the damage to the university can be repaired" and procedures can be worked out for cooperative action with the university president.

Oppenheimer had been suggested as a guest lecturer but his name was withdrawn at the request of Dr. Henry Schmitz, president of the university.

Dr. Schmitz has consistently refused to explain his ban of the atomic scientist beyond saying he felt his appearance on the campus would "not be in the best interest of the university."

The university has been in an almost continuous and bitter uproar ever since the ban was announced and two scientific meetings have been canceled because Eastern scientists have withdrawn in protest to the ban.

The faculty senate action was accompanied by a statement expressing the hope that the faculty be given an opportunity to participate fully in the discussion of university policies.

It said such assurance has been given by Dr. Schmitz and "We earnestly hope that our colleagues again feel free to join us from time to time for scholarly discussions on our campus."

Dr. Schmitz said he was gratified to learn that steps were being taken to end the "public discussion of a most unfortunate incident."

He said "there must be constant and continued collaboration, discussion, mutual trust and confidence between the university administration and the faculty."

"The only limitations upon the breadth and depth of this collaboration and participation is the preservation of the administrative integrity of the university and the statutes under which the university must operate. Concrete steps are being taken by me in the accomplishment of the above objectives."

Adams, former chairman of the Washington State Aeronautics Commission, said Thursday he will sit in on the hearing, which is expected to last two or three days.

A CAB spokesman also reported that special attention will be given at the hearing to functioning of the propellers of the ill-fated plane.

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Vaccine Report Planned Tuesday

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (U) — Next Tuesday morning, the world will know the success or failure of the Salk polio vaccine.

At exactly 9:10 a. m. (EST) in the Rackham Building on the University of Michigan campus, news-men will be given the story for immediate release.

What they will receive is a summary of the evaluation made by Dr. Thomas Francis Jr. of last spring's vaccine test on two million children.

New Lutheran Church Union Move Started

NEW YORK (U) — A broad, new move toward unification of all Lutheran churches in America was disclosed Thursday.

Proposals aimed at this goal have been advanced by the United Lutheran Church, the country's largest Lutheran body.

It announced that its president, Dr. Franklin Clark Fry, issued an "historic invitation" 10 days ago for such merger talks.

There are 17 Lutheran denominations in the United States, with 6,666,000 members.

There are currently in process various unity moves among a limited number of Lutheran bodies.

Eight Lutheran denominations already cooperate in wide areas of work through the National Lutheran Council.

Jury Acquits Medford Man

PORTLAND (U) — A federal court jury acquitted Stephen Gilbert Crippen, 44, Medford music store and coin machine operator, of a charge that he possessed gold bullion illegally last year.

Crippen admitted he carried a suitcase containing two bars and a vial of gold dust, valued at more than \$4,300, into a Portland hotel last July, but his attorney argued that he was acting only as a messenger for Wilbur M. Walls.

Walls, a Portland hotel owner, also has been indicted. He has pleaded innocent.

A third man, Woodrow Wilson Atwood, Medford taxicab driver, pleaded guilty. He is to be sentenced April 29.

Civil War Vet Survives Illness

DULUTH, Minn. (U) — A hospital spokesman said Thursday that Albert Woolson, 108, sole Union survivor of the Civil War, was resting comfortably after an illness which hospitalized him Wednesday night.

Rubber Strike End Nearing

NEW YORK (U) — A tentative agreement ending a six-day old strike against 19 U. S. Rubber Co. plants was reached Thursday night by the company and the CIO United Rubber Workers Union.

Some 33,000 U. S. rubber workers were involved in the walkout.

In Akron, Ohio, a URW spokesman said the union won 28 improvements, including liberalized vacations, an additional paid holiday, and no loss of pay when called for jury duty.

The vacation agreement remains at one week after a year, two weeks after three years, and three weeks after 15 years, he said. But, at the conclusion of the 10th year of employment, the employee will earn an additional day's vacation for each year thereafter until the 15th.

Wages were not at issue.

Fund Allocated for Aid to Dust Victims

WASHINGTON (U) — The Agriculture Department late Thursday allocated \$4,275,000 in presidential emergency funds to help farmers overcome dust storm damage in six states.

The money will be made available to farmers in Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas, and Wyoming to help them pay for emergency tillage—deep plowing to limit wind erosion.

40-Year-Old U. S. Pact With Russia Found

WASHINGTON (UP) — The United States has a 40-year-old trouble-shooting treaty with Russia which has lain dust-covered and forgotten in the cold war.

This came to light after President Eisenhower surprised everybody—including the State Department's official spokesman—by appointing a French historian to a commission set up under a similar treaty with Sweden. His action sent reporters to their history books.

There they learned that the United States at one time had such treaties—known as "Bryan Cooling Off Treaties"—with about 40 nations, including Russia. The agreement with Russia never was annulled and still is carried on U. S. books as technically in force.

The treaties were the pet project of William Jennings Bryan, who served as Secretary of State during part of the administration of President Woodrow Wilson. He felt the best way to head off serious trouble was to prevent it before it got out of hand.

Under the agreements, five-member commissions were set up to handle any dispute between the treaty signatories if it could not be handled through normal diplomatic channels.

The treaties ran for five-year periods and were automatically renewed unless "denounced" by either party.

Fire Balls Seen Over California

EUREKA, Calif. (U) — Balls of fire were reported seen whizzing across Northern California skies early Thursday.

In Eureka, Robert Miller told police he saw a "green fireball with a green tail" that looked like a fiery Christmas tree ornament shooting through the heavens at 12:57 a. m.

In Oakland, a bright green object traveling in a west-northwesterly direction was reported about the same time. Oakland International Airport control tower crewmen said the object was so bright the pilot of a plane thought it was a flare from another aircraft.
