

Joyous Christians Hail Resurrection

Joyous Christians the world over celebrated the resurrection this Easter Sunday with prayers for the help of a triumphant Christ to bring peace to the world.

Led by President Eisenhower, Americans in the gay line of spring turned to churches, shrines and outdoor services to hear again in song, pageant and sermon the glorious story of Christ's victory over death.

The rejoicing was universal. In Rome, St. Peter's Square filled with thousands of pilgrims, tourists and Romans to hear the blessing and address of white-robed Pope Pius XII. There was every prospect the number would reach 250,000 or more at the time of the pontiff's appearance at noon.

At the Church of the Holy Sepulcher in Jerusalem, where Christ's body was placed after it was taken from the cross, some 5,000 pilgrims including many diplomats from foreign lands, heard the story of the risen Lord.

The 40-day Lenten period ended at noon Saturday. Families stocked up on Easter treats and planned their festivities for the happy day.

The weather man forecast generally fair weather for most of the United States—good news for the Easter parades.

President Eisenhower arranged to attend morning services at the Washington. He visited Mrs. Eisen-

National Presbyterian Church in Dover, who is recuperating from a recent illness, at their Gettysburg, Pa., farm Saturday. She may remain at the farm for another 10 days.

Churches everywhere scheduled extra services to mark the day. Thousands of Americans planned to attend sunrise services in churches, outdoor amphitheaters, on mountain tops and canyon rims, in parks and city squares throughout the nation.

Traffic Upswing
The warming spring may fill nearby highways after the church services, but the National Safety Council doesn't expect the nation's traffic deaths to be any higher than any other Sunday in the year.

"Easter is the safest holiday in the year in terms of traffic deaths," Ned Dearborn, council president, said.

With fair weather 1 to 1 1/2 million are expected to watch the glitter of the annual fashion promenade along New York's Fifth Avenue. Thousands of children will shrill and laugh in the annual Easter egg roll on the great lawn in Central Park.

Holiday tourists from almost every land in Europe and the Americas streamed into Rome Saturday by road, train, sea and air. Thousands gathered at St. Peter's Basilica for the Holy Saturday high mass.

Ike Takes Quick Trip to Gettysburg

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower paid a quick visit to his Gettysburg farm Saturday. The President arrived at the farm at 12:30 p. m., had lunch with Mrs. Eisenhower and started back for Washington at 3 p. m., arriving shortly after 5.

The first lady, who has been staying at the nearly rebuilt farm home, remained there. The White House announced she will spend another 10 days at Gettysburg, resting and recuperating from a recent respiratory illness.

71 Exhibits in Win Honors Science Fair

Seventy-one winning entries Saturday were picked from among the 512 exhibits entered in the Salem School's Science Fair to be opened to public exhibition Monday and Tuesday at North Salem High School.

The 71 scientific exhibits will be taken to the Northwest Exhibition starting May 1 at Oregon State College, Corvallis. The district contest was coordinated by Mrs. Charles L. Mort, biology teacher at North Salem High. Entries were made either by classroom groups or individuals from the first grade through 12th.

Exhibiting periods Monday and Tuesday run from 9 a. m. to 9 p. m., less a 5 to 7 p. m. supper hour.

No Spring Floods Seen On Columbia

PORTLAND (AP)—For the first time in years the Columbia River poses no serious flood threat this year.

A joint forecast from the snow measurement experts of the Soil Conservation Service and the Weather Bureau River Forecast Service said Saturday that measurement on April 1 showed no serious flood potential.

Heavy precipitation in the northern part of the Columbia Basin in March, however, brightened the irrigation prospects, although the outlook for the entire summer is below average. The irrigation water shortage may be serious in some parts of the southern basin. The Snake River drainage area is the principal point of worry. There was little precipitation in fall and winter, and March was only normal.

As a result the Snake at Clarkston, Wash., is expected to carry a flow only 66 per cent of average. Because of a brighter outlook in the northern part of the basin, the Columbia is expected to carry a flow 82 per cent of normal at The Dalles.

High Cost Plague Turkey Growers, Specialist Says

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)—Turkey growers are in the highest cost-price squeeze in 18 years, poultry men from the Pacific Northwest were told Saturday.

Washington State College extension poultry specialist John Miller told a growers' conference that the turkey-feed price ratio was the most unfavorable since 1937 and 18 per cent worse than a year ago.

Bloch to Get Reed Degree

PORTLAND (AP)—An honorary degree of doctor of letters will be conferred on Ernest Bloch, renowned composer and conductor, by Reed College April 17.

Bloch is the founder of the Cleveland Institute of Music and has its director from 1925 to 1930. He is professor emeritus of music at the University of California at Berkeley. He now lives at Agate Beach on the Oregon Coast.

The Griller String Quartet, the resident quartet of the University of California, will perform Bloch's first and fourth quartets at the Reed ceremony.

Salem Woman Hurt in Crash

Mrs. Lillian Haytack, 875 McGilchrist St., is hospitalized at Chehalis, Wash., following a Saturday crash at Mary's Corner which killed a Bremerton, Wash., woman.

Mrs. Haytack, whose husband Benjamin emerged from the crash uninjured, suffered head and face cuts and a broken rib. The dead woman, with whom the Salem couple collided head-on 10 miles south of Chehalis, was Mrs. May Kitzinger. Mrs. Kitzinger's companion, Orrin Green, 24, Bremerton, was hospitalized also.

Drowning Feared In Willamette

PORTLAND (AP)—A pet Cocker Spaniel dog was found drifting in a fishing boat in the Willamette River Saturday and Harbor Patrol officers said they feared its master had drowned.

Arthur H. Webber, 58, Portland, set out with his dog for a fishing trip at about 1 p. m. Saturday afternoon. The skiff was spotted drifting in the channel three hours later.

The Harbor Patrol said there were indications that Webber may have fallen overboard while attempting to refuel an outboard engine.

LONDON (AP)—Mark Twain's books have become bigger sellers in Russia than ever, Moscow Radio said Sunday in a program beamed to North America. More than six million copies have been printed in Russian.

Sea-Going Raft Skipper Gets \$300 to Get Craft Out of Hock

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP)—DeVere Baker said Saturday he had received about \$300 in contributions to help him get his five-sided Lehi II raft from the U. S. marshal. The raft—built to drift from here to Hawaii—was seized on an \$826 writ of attachment Friday. The writ represented fines levied against Baker and the Lehi II scientific expedition for the ill-fated voyage last summer on the Lehi I without fog horns, bells and other safety devices.

Baker said he hoped to have enough money by Monday to satisfy the writ and recover his raft from the Coast Guard base at Government Island.

"When we set sail this time,"

he told newsmen, "we're going to carry two bells, two fog horns, in fact two of everything the Coast Guard wants us to have."

Baker and a two-man crew plan to drift the 2,400 miles to Hawaii on a diet of raw fish and distilled sea water.

His attorney, George E. McDonald, planned to go to Federal Court Monday and file a "third party claim."

He said he would try to prove the raft belongs not to Baker but to Alfred Martin, an Oakland hardware merchant.

"When the court realizes this I hope it will release the raft," McDonald remarked.

Baker had planned to begin his journey Easter Sunday but he said the start would be delayed several days while belly tanks under the raft are fixed.

He declared the tanks were thrown out of line by too fast a tow when the raft was taken into custody.

Infant A-Test Made; Second Shot Delayed

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Atom testers set off an infant device Saturday, then paused for the Easter weekend.

They had planned a double feature but the second test was postponed because the wind direction and speed turned unfavorable.

No experiment was planned for Easter Sunday. The next will not come before Tuesday, with a weather evaluation conference set for Monday morning.

Saturday's detonation from a 300-foot tower on Yucca Flat at 4:30 a. m. was watched by 24 British and Canadian observers. It was a device, evidently of small yield, prepared by the Atomic Energy laboratory.

Residents of Las Vegas 75 miles from the site, saw a white flash, fading to rich yellow, but there was no shock felt here.

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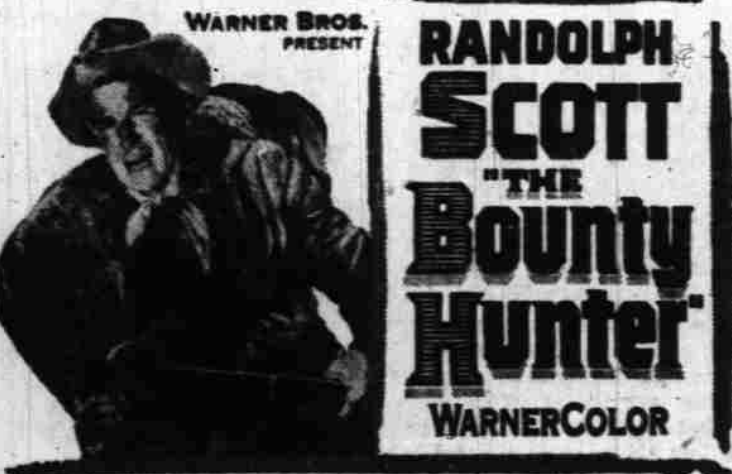
